In a nutshell......

The story begins to reveal how God will respond to what has gone wrong in His creation. Through <u>one</u> person (Abraham), God will bring into being one nation (Israel), that will be a blessing to all the other peoples of the earth.

God's ultimate purpose extends with redemptive blessing to the whole creation. <u>From the</u> <u>beginning, God's people are to be 'missionary'', chosen to be a channel of blessing to others.</u>

Three Main Themes of "The Patriarchs" (Genesis 12 – 50)

1. God's promises to Abraham are reaffirmed to his son and grandson, "The God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob"

2. The stories honestly confront the sinful nature of those whom God chooses. There are bitter breakdowns in family relationships.

3. God overcomes many obstacles to work out a plan for the chosen people. -barrenness

General questions for Biblical reflection

5. How does the action in this passage fit into God's salvation plan?

Specific to the texts for this Sunday

1. Why are there seemingly always 'two sons' in The True Story of the Whole World (Cain and Abel, Jacob and Esau, older brother/younger brother)?

2. How is God's intention to be a "blessing to all nations" being realized in your life? Whom are you 'blessing'?

3. How is God's intention to be a 'blessing to all nations' being realized through MCN? Is it necessary that this happen through 'a people', not just through scattered individuals?

4. Are there areas in which you (or we) 'laugh' like Sara? "Sure, God makes promises in theory and in theory we say we believe them, but in real life.....?????"

5. Where do you find yourself in this story? With whom do you identify <u>in their weakness?</u> With whom do you identify <u>in their faith?</u>

6. These are stories of <u>journeys</u>.....movement.....transitions. Take some time to record major waypoints on your own journey of faith.
