## Exodus 6, 19-20

## In a nutshell.....

God demonstrates faithfulness to the promises made to Abraham by rescuing the nation descended from Abraham, taking them out of slavery, and setting them onto the journey to the Promised Land. Again, the scope of God's purpose narrows to one family. A boy named Moses is born to a Hebrew family, eventually hears God call, and leads the Hebrew people in a great 'exodus' from slavery. After successfully fleeing Egypt, Moses receives the 10 Commandments in the wilderness at Mount Sinai. Despite challenges and occasional backsliding, the wilderness journey of 40 years brings the Hebrew people to the edge of the Promised Land.

# Main Themes of "Moses and the Exodus" (The Book of Exodus)

- 1. God remembers his promises and his people
- 2. A 'people' (Israel) is formed by a Mighty Act of Redemption
- 3. The memory of God's new people is short, and they are prone to look for quick relief for their difficulties
- 4. The Ten Commandments or 'Ten Words', are the core principles that are to shape God's people so that their lives will reflect God's character.
- 5. God lives in the midst of His people, with the Tabernacle that is portable and travels with them

### Of note.....

The Exodus event has been of particular importance in 'liberation theology', and within African American theology. The work of the Lord in 'remembering' the Hebrews in slavery, and delivering them out of their oppression, continues to strike a resonant chord around the world today with persons suffering oppression.

One might say that in particular, this offers an example of a group of persons currently 'finding their place in the Biblical Drama' (the subtitle of the "True Story of the Whole World" book).
