Lenten Season Worship

Congregational Updates Announced in Worship March 17, 2019

First, the Church Board is moving forward with preparation for an intentional interim pastorate following the retirements of Pastor Tim at the end of August, and Pastor Jane at the end of November.

There are two types of interim pastorates - the first being simply an interim, and the second an intentional interim. A conventional interim pastorate is basically filling the pulpit until the new long-term pastor or pastoral team is ready to step in.

An intentional interim is generally recommended by Mennonite Church USA, for congregations after the conclusion of a successful long-term pastorate. We have been blessed to have two such pastorates.

From the guidelines written by the former MC-USA denominational minister, Nancy Kauffmann -"1 - The pastoral search begins by first taking the time to say a proper good bye to the former pastor. Give yourself time - to grieve that loss, - and to let go of the former pastor so that you can fully embrace a new pastor.

2 - Next, assess the health of the congregation. What does the congregation need to work on to prepare herself for a new pastor? This is a good time to "clean out the closet" and lay aside structures, habits, secrets,

underlying conflicts and anything else that holds the congregation back from growing in faithfulness to God. Putting the weight on the new pastor to make things better is not healthy for the congregation or for the new pastor.

3 - Embrace an interim period. This will give you time to work on a sound process for the pastoral search. Work with your conference to assess whether you need an intentional transitional pastor to help you work on deeper issues that may interfere with the health of your congregation." This is accepted practice when churches have enjoyed long and healthy pastorates.

Our congregation relates equally to Illinois Conference and Central District Conference. Doug Luginbill, Central District Conference Minister, has consulted with leadership in Illinois Conference (which is currently in a state of transitional leadership). It has been agreed that our congregation will be working with Doug as a primary support and advocate. Doug has presented the Board with several interested persons, and the Board is

beginning to sort through their information and make inquiries. Doug assures us we are on a good timeline and we hope to have an interim pastor or pastors ready to work with us beginning in September. Whether or not additional pastoral support will be needed upon Pastor Jane's retirement at the end of November has yet to be determined.

A reminder - according to MCUSA guidelines, it is generally understood that calling an interim is the responsibility of the leadership body of a congregation - in our case, the Church Board. There is no congregational interview or vote on an interim - intentional or otherwise.

The congregation will be heavily involved in the calling of future pastoral leadership when that process is underway. We look forward to your help and support in that endeavor.

As the Board continues its work on your behalf in calling an intentional interim pastor or pastors, we earnestly ask for your prayers - for clear vision and a calmness of spirit, trusting in God's intentions and leading.

The second item we have to share with you concerns the retirement of our lead pastor, Tim Schrag. Tim's final sermon will be preached on August 25. There will be a reception for him following the church service. The following Sunday, September 1, will mark the beginning of his retirement. On that Sunday, Doug Luginbill will be joining us for the sermon and the service will mark the close of Tim's pastorate with us here. A congregational meal will be served following the Sunday School hour and there will be plenty of time to visit with Tim and Sue then.

We wanted to ensure that these dates get on your calendars so that you can plan to attend. These are very important commemorative events in the lives of our congregation and in the lives of Tim and Sue. We hope that you are able to participate.

Plans for Pastor Jane's retirement continue to unfold and we will apprise you of dates as they are solidified.
