Informational Meeting Tonight

We have an exciting opportunity before us as a congregation. Our north wing, originally fashioned for Head Start use during the week, has stood idle this fall. Through a congregation member, we have a potential tenant for that space.

Many thanks to Jon Gundy for bringing The Autism Project to our attention. The Autism Project, known as TAP, offers services to children with autism in our community. The program offers services at no direct cost to families. Services include:

A supplemental early intensive intervention program for preschool age (ages 3-5) children with autism (approx. 9 children 5 days/week, 2.5 hours/day).

In-clinic direct services Individual family services Social Skills groups Parent support groups

They also provide: In-home direct treatment services In-school direct treatment services In-school consultation services

This program is run under the close supervision of Karla Doepke professor of Psychology at Illinois State University. Dr. Doepke will be here this Wednesday evening at 6:30 pm to share with us about the TAP program - how it runs and who it serves. This is an opportunity for you to listen to her and ask questions about the program. This is not designed to be a time for the congregation to discern whether or not this is something we want to do - it is simply an opportunity to hear from the program's director.

Following Dr. Doepke's presentation, the Board wants to facilitate a discussion regarding the Adult Sunday School program. Supervision for the Adult SS program has been moved between various entities and individuals in the congregation in the last 10 years or so. We need to come together to determine a direction and leadership for this program.

What do we envision for Adult SS? Is it time for a dynamic change? How will we manage this ministry moving forward?

Your contribution to this discussion is vital. This portion of the program will begin at 7:00 pm on Wednesday and finish at 7:30.

The Board is hoping for a huge turnout for both portions of this program, and you are warmly invited to put this meeting on your calendar right away. This Wednesday evening, Oct.16 at 6:30 pm. We look forward to seeing you there!


