Congregational Meeting Nov. 3

I want to first thank all those persons who came to the meeting on Wednesday evening to hear about the proposed use of our facility by The Autism Project. It was a great presentation with insightful questions. For those of you unable to attend, there are gold information sheets available for you to take on the table in the foyer. The conversation regarding Adult Sunday School was robust and exciting, and it provided suggestions, dreams, and hopes for our congregation moving forward.

Now I want to bring your attention to the upcoming congregational meeting being held on Sunday, November 3, after lunch provided here at the church.

A congregational meeting is designed to include both the presentation of reports and the opportunity for the congregation to respond. It is an important part of membership and a responsibility we ask you to take seriously. Please put this on your calendar now.

During this meeting, there will be four major items presented, and your participation is important.

- 1. The church spending plan for 2020 will be shared with an opportunity for you to ask for clarification and respond. This spending plan will look a bit different. Though we will have a full-time transitional pastor, we do not anticipate having our new full-time ministerial staff in place for the year. Consequently, some of our numbers will look significantly changed from recent years.
- 2. The slate of new Board and committee persons will be offered to the congregation for your affirmation. We greatly appreciate the work of those completing their terms and look forward with anticipation to those who are ready to start their work.
- 3. There will be a brief presentation about Gary Martin, our transitional pastor. This will be an opportunity to learn more about Gary and what his ministry among us may look like.
- 4. The Board is planning for an opportunity to clarify some misunderstandings and misinformation about the Pavilion Project. As it stands right now, the project is on hold for spring as our changing weather makes the use of the pavilion less likely for the upcoming months. We are wanting to address confusion regarding financing, placement, how this project came about, and how it might reflect our congregation's Vision and Mission statements. It is important that we hear from the congregation regarding your questions and concerns, your hopes and possibilities about this project.


