Sometimes we can feel overwhelmed by what is going on in the world, our nation, our families, even our church. How do we respond in our conversations with others? As people of faith, how can we keep from having a negative response & develop a positive one instead?

From our Transition Pastor, Gary Martin The Transitional Period Begins at Home!

WHAT? Gary Martin, our transitional pastor, would like to visit EVERY household, ideally at your residence, but if you prefer, at the church or another location. The visits will take place Jan. 22; Feb. 2-4; 9-12; 16.

WHY? These informal visits are the important first step in the transition process, enabling Gary to understand the congregation by first hearing each individual voice. It also helps him get acquainted and learn names. A composite report of the "congregation's voice" will be presented to the congregation early in March, along with recommendations for specific transition events through May, and a rough projection for transition priorities for the rest of the year.

Those in warmer climates during winter have the option of scheduling a phone visit.

To stay focused, please "do not feed the pastor." (Be assured, Gary enjoys meals in homes, but that can happen later). Visits will be about 90 minutes. Two individuals can schedule a visit together, if that feels more comfortable. Please schedule during weekdays, if you are available then, so evenings and weekends are open for those who work weekdays. When possible, Gary would like to meet when children are home, so he can hear their voices too. They are free to leave after a few minutes. And it's fine to schedule when children are away, if that's your preference.

Gary wants to hear whatever you want to share about yourself or the congregation, or any questions about the transition period. The questions:



Transition Period Objectives

The ultimate objectives for transition efforts are a quality search process for long-term pastoral leadership through thorough congregational preparation; and increased potential for healthy long-term relationships among congregants and between pastor and congregation.

Humans were created in God's image. One aspect of that is the potential to live fully in the present, unencumbered by past pain or anxiety for the future. It's a life-long journey. Congregational health involves that same journey toward more "fully present in the now" moments, by reducing energy devoted to the past or future anxiety. We live in the past when we focus on accomplishments, or are weighed down with guilt over failures. We live in the future when we allow anxiety about what could go wrong to limit or control us. Discerning vision for the future is essential, but that work is hindered if approached with fear or anxiety.

Thus, transition begins by reflecting on the MCN story: both celebrating accomplishments, and recognizing unresolved pain or conflicts. We begin that task on March 29, with "Re-membering MCN," a unique interactive story-telling experience. This experience, along with the household visit project, will likely surface several areas which need further attention so as not to impact the next steps.

The focus then shifts to clarifying and embracing our current identity: who we are and why we exist in 2020 (our mission). This will also involve interactive processes.

The third focus is discerning a specific direction (vision) for the next three years. This grassroots effort is the highpoint for many congregations in transition. When an energizing and congregationally owned vision is in place, the current structure will be evaluated by asking, "Is the current structure an adequate vehicle to carry MCN in the new direction?" The pastoral staffing model will be an integral part of this work.

With the completion of these three foci, the search process begins, with potential to move more quickly than the norm. Whenever possible, transition work attempts to build on what exists. We won't re-invent the wheel.

This has been a generic overview! A specific plan and timeline, based on the results of the household visit project, will be presented to the congregation on March 8. If you have not signed up for a visit, please do so! A high percentage of congregant voices is essential, to accurately project a transitional plan.

Studies show that youth who grow up in religious communities have lower rates of suicidal ideations than youth who do not. However, for one segment of the population, the statistics are opposite. LGBTQ persons who mature in religious contexts experience higher rates of suicidal ideation and attempts than LGBTQ persons outside the church, according to research by Jeremy J. Gibbs published in 2015.

A note from the Worship Committee


