




Connecting the dots

Lent is a time for personal reflection and renewal. At this rest stop, let's consider an implication for the faith community.

The Lenten Gospel readings leave us with contextual and theological whiplash. On Transfiguration Sunday (had we not been concluding the Ruth series), we would have encountered a glorified Jesus talking with Moses and Elijah—the ultimate mountaintop experience. Next, Jesus debated the devil in the wilderness, and then a devout religious leader in urban darkness. Then on to a risqué encounter with a woman at noon in a foreign land, another theological debate back in the city about healing a blind man, creating an unbelievable scene at a village funeral, and finally a dramatic political parade. What kind of example is Jesus providing?

Following Jesus will take us to all kinds of places, where we will encounter all kinds of people and issues. As individual disciples, we are formed by reflecting on each story. None of us can "be Jesus" today in this variety of contexts. But we can collectively, as the Body of Christ!

One take away from visiting 67 MCN households: the Holy Spirit has gathered a faith community with remarkable spiritual gifts, vocational expertise, and life experiences. MCN's potential is limited only by the quality and integration of our relationships with the God, each other, and neighbor. Most of our transition efforts will therefore focus on deepening and integrating these relationships. It will require doing most everything together, as a congregation. It will be a challenging "not business as usual" year!
