Milepost 134 "Who wants to be a dependent?"

"But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you." John 14:26

As a TV game show concept, "Who wants to be a dependent?" would be a dog that don't hunt. Interdependent describes how we are to function within the Body of Christ: neither exclusively independent of, nor exclusively dependent on our brothers and sisters. Interdependent means integrating both dependence and independence.

But dependent does describe our relationship with God! God claims billions of dependents on the divine 1040. We may struggle with that, because it implies we can't make it on our own. But we can't!

Jesus promised a helper for his followers, for precisely that reason. In John 13 & 14, Jesus makes three commands: love each other (13:34), have faith in him (14:11), and obey his commands (14:15). Sounds simple on paper. In this Sunday's text (John 14:15-31), Jesus in essence says to his followers: "Don't try this on your own. Rely on the Holy Spirit."

Just outside our large kitchen window is an old picnic table. An amazing variety of birds (and other critters) come there daily for food and water. A bluebird couple, put on quite a show yesterday. Their two juvenile offspring had been flying on their

own for just a few days, but were still dependent on their parents for food. They stood still patiently for ten minutes on the edge of the table, as their parents repeatedly brought mealworms to their open beaks, from a dish just two feet away. When the parents left briefly several times, the juveniles would turn around to keep an eye on where they went.

We like to think of ourselves as grown up and able to feed ourselves. But in reality, we are always dependent on our loving Parent for daily bread (all of our needs). The Holy Spirit may at times deliver our daily bread through a brother or sister in Christ, who is using their spiritual gift. If you have experienced such a delivery, tell the deliverer, and others. That helps all of us discern our spiritual gifts. -Gary Martin
