Our theme for the Fourth Sunday in Lent is: "Deep in the wilderness: Called to deep healing." The wilderness confronts us with our vulnerability and exposes our wounds and our needs. We are called to deep healing by trusting in God, who calls us in love.



Joe Culpepper's sermon, ""Deep Healing: Have You Been Bitten by a Bronze Serpent?" is based on Numbers 21:4-9 & John 3:14-21. This fascinating story from the Israelites' exodus through the wilderness to the Promised Land raises some questions for us. What snake bite experiences have you had in your life? Are you experiencing one now? How has God helped you find in them healing and hope? Join us as we reflect and thank God together! Gary Martin has planned, and will lead the service.

As Lent continues, we will watch our bowl empty, representing the removal of what is weighing us down and preventing us from seeing what really matters.

Milepost 433 Signs of Spring at MCN

A year ago today, the Church Board met, spread across the fellowship hall, one per table to enable social distancing, to decide next steps in response to COVID-19. Two days later, the building closed, with staff posting signs and locking the doors. That day remains vivid in my memory.

Speaking metaphorically, Spring, Summer and Fall, 2020, never happened. It's been a winter wilderness, not wonderland, for twelve months. This Sunday, we will be reminded that God offers healing, even in the wilderness (Numbers 21: 4-9). While many unknowns remain, I see signs of Spring at MCN.

- A new vision is emerging, which reflects the work of eight vision groups in January. It has been challenging work, but I see renewed energy among those preparing the proposed statement, to be presented to the congregation on March 28.
- Half a dozen individuals have taken various courses recently through Associated Mennonite Biblical Seminary, with interest in sharpening skills for various areas of ministry in congregational life.
- Several individuals have been discerning new callings, and are now taking significant risks to pursue them.
- New small groups have enabled relationships to go deeper for 21 individuals, and resulted in greater clarity of spiritual gifts, passion and calling.
- Sharing after Lenten worship experiences, is going deeper than some of us anticipated.
- Significant gifts are emerging in worship services, especially among young adults, youth and even children.

Óf course, there are many other signs of Spring which I have not noticed, from my limited vantage point. Please share such signs, during sharing time on Sunday, or in Midweek. What are you seeing, which brings you hope for new life and abundant harvest? Gary Martin

COVID-19 Ceremony Planned


The first COVID-19 case in McLean County was announced by the health department on March 19, 2020 with the first death reported on March 22. Since then, at least 170 McLean County residents have lost their lives to the virus, and more than 14,400 people have had the virus. This has been a challenging time for all, but most of all for those who have lost relatives and close friends, and those who continue to suffer long-term health consequences.

To mark the anniversary of the arrival of the pandemic in the county, the McLean County Museum of History is partnering with Not In Our Town, Illinois State University, Illinois Wesleyan University, Heartland Community College, and local leaders and artists to present a brief ceremony at 5 p.m. Friday, March 12. Due to current Covid -19 restrictions only 50 people are allowed to attend in person; masks and social distancing will be required. People also can join virtually through the museum's Facebook page to view the live stream.

The museum also will be collecting nonperishable food items for the Immigration Project to help families in need in McLean County. Additionally, the museum is encouraging members of the community to participate in the ongoing Covid 19: McLean County Experience history project and the 12monthsin6words project (both of these programs encourage McLean County residents to share their experiences during the Covid-19 pandemic with the Museum). Highlights from Illinois Mennonite Conference Assembly

Delegates met via Zoom, last Saturday, for an introduction to Colossian Forum, an organization that seeks to transform cultural conflicts into opportunities for spiritual growth and witness. IMC is encouraging congregations to have several congregants trained to facilitate Colossian Way groups in each congregation. Delegates also approved a new mission effort in supporting Olak Sunuwar's (Living Waters Community Church) ministry to Nepali congregations across the world. IMC will provide Nepali Outreach Missions with \$12,000 a year.
