#### Lent 2021: Deep calls to Deep

"Deep in the changing sky: Called to deep wisdom" is our theme for the Third Sunday in Lent. In the patterns and glory of God's creation, and in God's commandments and promises, we are called to obtain deep wisdom. We will revisit The Ten Commandments (Exodus 20:1-17), which begin, "Then God spoke all these words..." Christians omit v. 2, and begin numbering the commandments at v. 3. In the sermon, *Ten Words* (*not nine*), we will focus on what Jews consider to be God's First Word (v. 2), and why v. 2 is crucial in understanding the remaining nine Words. In both the Exodus text, and 1 Corinthians 1:18-25, we see God's deep wisdom which undermines our assumptions, and takes us deeper than our efforts can lead us.

### After Worship Options

There are three after worship options: Standard Lesson with Darrel Miller (stay on worship link), Fellowship led by Lynn Reha (see invite below) and Lenten Sharing: How is God calling me to deep wisdom? (This personal sharing on the weekly Lenten theme, replaces the sermon discussion option.) (see invite below).

**Questions for reflection:** How is God calling you to deep wisdom? What area of your life needs God's wisdom?

We invite everyone to prepare additionally, by having a bowl with six stones nearby. We are invited to remove a stone each week, to represent a personal response to God's call. You may want to write a word on it, and put it somewhere where it can remind you of your response each day. As Lent continues, we will watch our bowl empty, representing the removal of what is weighing us down and preventing us from seeing what really matters.

## Milepost 426 What is an Anabaptist Christian?

*The Anabaptist Vision* (Harold S. Bender, 1943), shaped Mennonite understanding of Anabaptism for three generations. He summarized Anabaptism:

Christianity is *discipleship*: following Jesus.

The church is *community*: committed to Christ, and each other.

Jesus' followers have an ethic of love and nonresistance.

It is revealing that when Mennonites today are asked "What do Mennonites believe," the most common answer we give is, "we believe in peace." Coming in a distant second, is "community." A better response could be: "We believe in, and follow Jesus, who taught us to love God, each other, our neighbor, and our enemies."

Today, Bender's summary for many, has evolved into: Anabaptism means global involvement in social justice, peacemaking and relief work, grounded in selective reading of the OT prophets and Jesus' ministry, and participation in a community of like-minded people.

Bender missed an integral dynamic in 16<sup>th</sup> Century Anabaptism: bold missional zeal evidenced in witnessing to holistic faith in Christ, as they were martyred. Palmer Becker attempted to reshape Mennonite understanding of Anabaptism in his 2008 pamphlet, "What is an Anabaptist Christian?" It can be downloaded <u>here.</u> Becker summarizes Anabaptism:

Jesus is the center of our faith.

*Community* is the center of our lives.

*Reconciliation* is the center of our work.

Being a Christian from an Anabaptist perspective, integrates believing in Jesus, belonging to community, and behaving in a reconciling way. For Becker, reconciliation in Scripture, integrates social justice and evangelism.

Back in the 1980s, a movement began among new church starts, to remove the denominational label. It was considered a hindrance to growth in most denominations, including among some Mennonites. I observed that generally, Mennonite church planters who wanted the name removed, were not committed to being theologically Mennonite. Thus, a number of these left the Mennonite Church after a few years. And all too often, new church plants which kept Mennonite in their name, struggled to grow. But I would contend, what hindered growth was the failure to really *be* Mennonite, not the presence of the name.

In my opinion, we should not shy away from using the Mennonite or Anabaptist labels. But it is much more important to *be* Mennonite (Anabaptist), as Becker describes, than to rely on the brand. After someone checks out our website, Facebook page, newsletter or a worship service, would they clearly see that Jesus *is* the center of our faith, that Community *is* the center of our lives, and that holistic Reconciliation *is* the center of our work? -Gary Martin

## Welcome Home Building Re-entry Plans

Last spring, a Welcome Home Task Group was formed to develop a plan for re-entry into the building at some point in the future. The Task Group included Gail Fisher, Lotus Hershberger, Cindy Ropp, Mary Ann Watkins, and Laurie Vial. Currently the group has expanded to include Mary Dyck and Glenn Wilson. The Task Group developed a re-entry plan that was shared with the congregation in June.

The church building is in Region 2 of the Restore Illinois plan. While some church participants may reside in other regions, church re-entry will be determined by Region 2 metrics. Persons from other regions are asked to follow the directives of their region, particularly if there are higher positivity rates in their region.

Region 2 is currently in Phase 4 of the Restore Illinois Plan. This phase allows for gatherings of 50 people or fewer with this limit subject to change based on latest data and guidance. The Task Group will look for a minimum of 3 weeks of continuous:

- Test positivity rate  $\leq 6.5\%$
- Staffed ICU bed availability  $\ge 20\%$
- No sustained increase in CÓVID patients in hospital
- The status of the vaccination progress in the area will also be considered. To re-enter for worship, a vaccination rate of 75% would be preferred.

At this point, the Task Group, in consultation with the Church Board, will initiate a stepwise progression of re-entry into the building. This might initially begin with staff in the building, office open, committee meetings, and small groups from with-in/outside of the congregation. This would eventually culminate in re-opening the building for worship.

All changes to the building status will be communicated to the congregation through The Midweek.

Should any of the metrics we are watching move beyond the acceptable range, the building re-entry may reverse temporarily. This decision will be made by the Task Group, Church Board, and staff.

The Welcome Home Task Group appreciates the positive support we have received from the congregation. These are difficult times and we long to be together. We are eager to move forward with the plan as things become a bit safer.

**A new small group** focused on discerning passion, spiritual gifts, and callings will begin when enough express interest. The group will begin by sharing life stories, and then focus on helping each other discern gifts. It will meet on zoom, for 6 -8 sessions, unless other options become available. The schedule will be determined by those who participate. It's ok to join if you have already participated in one of the new small groups this past year. ### **Transition Process Update**

Twelve available members of the Church Board, Pastoral Council, ministry staff, and breakout session facilitators, identified three goal areas from the results of all eight groups, during their two meetings. They meet again on Thursday. We anticipate a congregational meeting in late March, to discuss the proposal which emerges from this phase of the process.

The Structure Evaluation Task Group (Spring Neely, Rick Harnish, Lauren Satchwell, Cindy Ropp, Bess Desch, and Gary Martin), meets next on March 15, and anticipates presenting a report for congregational discussion in April.

## COVID-19 Ceremony Planned

The first COVID-19 case in McLean County was announced by the health department on March 19, 2020 with the first death reported on March 22. Since then, at least 170 McLean County residents have lost their lives to the virus, and more than 14,400 people have had the virus. This has been a challenging time for all, but most of all for those who have lost relatives and close friends, and those who continue to suffer long-term health consequences.

To mark the anniversary of the arrival of the pandemic in the county, the McLean County Museum of History is partnering with Not In Our Town, Illinois State University, Illinois Wesleyan University, Heartland Community College, and local leaders and artists to present a brief ceremony at 5 p.m. Friday, March 12. Due to current Covid -19 restrictions only 50 people are allowed to attend in person; masks and social distancing will be required. People also can join virtually through the museum's Facebook page to view the live stream.

The museum also will be collecting nonperishable food items for the Immigration Project to help families in need in McLean County. Additionally, the museum is encouraging members of the community to participate in the ongoing Covid 19: McLean County Experience history project and the 12monthsin6words project (both of these programs encourage McLean County residents to share their experiences during the Covid-19 pandemic with the Museum).
