Milepost 63 A NEW THING SPRINGS FORTH

Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old. I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert. Isaiah 43:18-19

To paraphrase Ecclesiastes 3: *There is a time to remember, and a time to forget.* Remembering past successes, is good—it increases our faith, and brings confidence. And we can learn from remembering past failures. But there is also a time to forget the past. This is such a season at MCN.

Remember past successes can prevent us from perceiving the new thing the Spirit is doing among us, because we assume that similar efforts will continue to work. Remembering past failures, can prompt the popular refrain: "We tried that and it didn't work." Former successes and failures alike, tend to accumulate baggage which gets in the way perceiving the new things of the Spirit.

The Spirit is doing new things at MCN. Do we perceive the Spirit at work?

- The congregation united behind a common vision, and a new way of being church together, in a reasonable amount of time.
 - An individual has responded to a call to pastoral ministry.
- The congregation called three individuals to serve in an uncharted assignment (Vision Team), and they said "yes."
- Five individuals, not having worked together much in the past, came together Monday night to discern two Spiritual Gift Discernment Team (SGDT) members. Because the Spirit put this group together, because each prayerfully prepared, and because the congregation was praying, two candidates emerged quickly with unanimous support.
- Healing and hope is flowing because the Spirit has called individuals into new small groups.
 - Unrecognized or under-utilized spiritual gifts are surfacing, to build up the body.

All of these new things the Spirit is doing, are showing us a way forward in the wilderness, and providing rivers in the desert in these uncharted times ahead. And these are just what I perceive from my vantage point. I know there's much more. What new things of the Spirit, are you seeing? Share such good news with others.

Butreach Committee Update

Food Drive – Since MCN is going back to in person services, the Outreach and Fellowship Committees plan to revive the Widow's Cruse as our method of collecting food to deliver to the Mount Pisgah Food Pantry. Please place donations in the grocery cart by the front door. If you prefer to contribute financially, please make a check payable to the Mount Pisgah Food Pantry and give to Marge Weaver, Fellowship Chair or me, Outreach Chair. The types of food and supplies that are in demand are Canned Vegetables, Boxed Mac n Cheese, Boxed Mashed Potatoes, Boxed Skillet Meals (such as Hamburger Helper), Peanut Butter, Jelly, Tissue & Paper Towels. Please let me know if you are available to deliver the food/supplies from MCN to the Mount Pisgah Church.

BN Welcoming - The Outreach Committee continues to work with BN Welcoming to authorize payments from a separate account to pay utility/rent expenses for immigrant families. This is an account that is separate from the Outreach Committee budget to which people both at MCN and outside MCN are asked to contribute. You may use the MCN website by clicking the PAYPAL button on the BN Welcoming tab, or by sending a check to MCN payable to BN Welcoming -MCN. For example, last week \$62.43 was paid to the City of Bloomington for a water bill, \$46.17 was paid to Nicor Gas, and \$45.12 was paid to Ameren Illinois for a local immigrant family from the BN Welcoming account.

Hungry World Farm - The Outreach Committee contributed \$250 to Hungry World Farm to help it receive electronic SNAP payments, and thus provide healthy, local produce to under resourced folks in Tiskilwa and at the Farmer's Market in nearby Princeton. This was done at the request of Lynn Reha and Andy Hedberg who are on its board.

<u>Peaceful Practices</u> is an adult Sunday School curriculum that the Outreach and Peace & Eamp; Justice Committees are proposing to offer in the Fall. The MCC program is designed to help individuals and congregations reflect on and practice how they engage with interpersonal conflict. Throughout the study, the reader will be introduced to (or refamiliarized with) tools that help them dialogue effectively. Jess Stoltzfus Buller, Peace Education Coordinator for MCC, indicated that she would work with us in remote sessions when I asked if she would do that. Jess indicated that the curriculum is scheduled to be released in July.
