I have been having a really wonderful time so far in Colombia. I am so thankful for everyone that I have met and how welcome I have felt so far. I'm still settling in to my new life here, so there's lots more to experience."

What has been your best experience so far? "It's hard to find a singular "best experience" so far, but I would say that the biggest blessing and most important part of the experience for me so far here has been my host family. They have been so welcoming and helpful to me as I'm navigating this transition of living in a new country. They are very fun to be around, talk with, and play games with. We live in an apartment building that is occupied only by my host mom's siblings and their families. So, there is always aunts, uncles, and cousins around as well."

What's been a new learning about life or work in Colombia? "A new learning for me, and something that I'm adjusting to is the idea of time here. Being punctual is not as important as it is in the United States, and future plans are often more just "ideas." So I'm learning how to be less worried about whether or not I will be late to something."

**Have there been any rough patches?** "I am thankful that I have not yet experienced any significant rough patches. The most frustrating and challenging moments so far have been when I feel like I cannot clearly express myself in Spanish or that I have to ask several times for clarification. This can be very frustrating at times."

Is there a way that you have seen God at work? "The biggest way that I have seen God at work was two weeks ago, when we celebrated the International Day of Peace and Pan y Paz at my work, which is a day/event to promote peace within Colombia. During the week, we held workshops for the children promoting peace and non-violence. It was so powerful to see the children, many of whom have heard about, or experienced violence and conflict talk about how they can incorporate peace into their lives. At the end of the week, we held a community event where everyone was encouraged to bring an ingredient for soup. We chopped tons of vegetables and cooked three huge pots over fires outside. Then, we marched throughout the neighborhood with many members of the community, handing out bread. Getting to experience this glimpse of peace and hope within the neighborhood was very special for everyone."

**How might we be praying for you?** "One big prayer request would be for the children in the community where I work and those who come daily for activities. Most children in the neighborhood do not have in-person school or are not enrolled in school for various reasons. Virtual school has presented many challenges, with lack of access to technology and internet, and many parents are working during the day, unable to assist their children. So, the prayer request would be to keep these children in your prayers. Thanks!"

The next eight years were devoted to raising her children and being a homemaker. Mary Ann also worked for seven years at the Provident Bookstore. This was followed by 25 years as an administrative assistant at Select Capital Agricultural Services. She retired seven years ago and is enjoying retirement.

Mary Ann met George Scott at a Divorced Christians group and they had a fifteen year marriage before he passed. George was a train enthusiast and planned a three-week trip to Europe, including England. While on that trip, she also had the opportunity to visit with one of the foreign exchange students which her family had hosted. Brigitte had lived in Mary Ann's home for almost a year, so it was kind of a family reunion.

Daughter Missy lives in Normal and looks out for her mom. Son Mark lives in Wisconsin, and son Eddy is in California. She enjoys her four grandchildren. Missy's two girls live in Normal, Mark's son and daughter are in Wisconsin.

Mary Ann enjoys activities with a strong circle of friends who have supported each other over the years. This includes working out at Curves, and celebrating special events, including birthdays.
