Eric Kurtz will provide the sermon this Sunday based on Matthew 25: 31-46 titled *Matthew 25: Listening to the overlooked and ignored.* The Matthew 25 passage about the sheep and the goats is a favorite among Mennonites and those who support MCC. But how do we remain faithful to Jesus' message in this passage? I think it's less about worrying if we're sheep or goats, and more about seeing the face of God in the "overlooked and ignored" (Eugene Peterson's translation).

Eric Kurtz is executive director of Mennonite Central Committee (MCC) Great Lakes. MCC is a worldwide ministry of Anabaptist churches that shares God's love and compassion for all in the name of Christ. MCC works with local partners in 47 countries in relief, development, and peacebuilding. Eric lives in Goshen, Indiana, with his wife, Carmen Horst, and daughters Elisa and Nayli. His family attends Walnut Hill Mennonite Church, where Carmen is co-pastor. Before joining MCC, Eric used his environmental studies background with the Elkhart County Soil and Water Conservation District and with rural indigenous communities in Northern Argentina.

The Vision Team met on Monday, July 11. Following the meeting, Vision Team has the following items to share with the congregation:

- 1. Vision Team received regular reports on the current activities of the Spiritual Gifts Discernment Team (SGDT), Pastoral Team Search Committee (PTSC), the Interim Pastoral Team (IPT), and the Commissions and discussed where support is needed.
- 2. Vision Team is planning for the weekend of August 6-7 when a pastoral candidate will be visiting. Vision Team is also drafting a plan (and working with the IPT) for how to best assign and transition commission assignments to long-term pastoral team members once onboarded.
- 3. Vision Team is reviewing and contributing to applicable portions of the draft Employment Manual prepared by the Administration Commission.

Update from Clara Unzicker

In June, we started the biggest event of the year at my service placement, called the Mundialito por la Paz (Soccer Tournament for Peace). This year marks the soccer tournament's fourth year, which includes 80-100 children ages 6-17. Children participating in the tournament are active in soccer practice and workshops that focus on nonviolence, teamwork, and conflict resolution. After several weeks of soccer practice and workshops, Creciendo Juntos held the inauguration to celebrate the beginning of the tournament. The week before, we spent several days sweeping and cleaning the soccer field and repainting the lines. It was a great team effort! All of the children changed into their uniforms, all generously donated by my host family, and were so thrilled to have brand new uniforms that matched their team. We spent the whole day at the soccer field watching the games between the different age groups. Many children play soccer all the time and are extremely talented. I actually ended up joining in two of the games to sub for someone who couldn't be there...and I was given a run for my money by several of the kids. We have continued with games the past week and will be finishing up with the tournament at the end of next week. Luckily, we've only hit one major setback, which happened last week, when the field completely flooded with water. It rained pretty hard one night and the drainage pipe to the ditch surrounding the soccer field was covered up by a piece of wood. We couldn't believe how high the water rose in a short time. The next day, thanks to the hard work of a group of kids, parents, and community members, it was unblocked and was left to dry for a few days. It was wonderful to see the community work together to help drain the field so that the children's games could continue.


Although I have been busy at my service placement, I have found time for some other activities...hiking, sightseeing, and a small trip outside of the city with some friends from church. Over the weekend, I wrapped up my time with my host family. Although it wasn't always easy to live with a host family, I am thankful for their hospitality and all of the things that they taught me about Colombia. Since it's now the time I would have been finishing up my time in SALT if I hadn't been able to extend my time with MCC, I have transitioned to live with another volunteer here. I'm looking forward to this new change.

It's strange for me to think that I was originally going to be returning to the US this week...I cannot imagine having to say goodbyes to everyone that has impacted me and played such an important role in my life in the past 11 months here in Bogotá. I'm so thankful for the chance that I have to continue my time here in Colombia until December, and I appreciate the continued support and prayers. Thanks so much! --Clara Unzicker

An Inside Look the Lois Jett Costume Collection

In the following days, once registration is completed, guests will receive an email with links to take the tour at their own leisure.


