

Church members killed in Myanmar bombing

Mennonite World Conference (MWC) issued a call to prayer to its member churches around the world the day after a military bombardment killed members of Bible Missionary Church, an MWC member church. MWC reported an aerial bombardment of a village in Chin State killed a dozen villagers March 30, including several members of the congregation and the local pastor's daughters. Many villagers were severely injured, including the pastor. Canadian Mennonite reported last summer roughly half of Bible Missionary Church's families were displaced. About 2,000 people had fled to jungles or mountainous areas for safety after the military seized power and civil unrest grew. Oregon snow turns eight-hour camp service project into five-day retreat



A small group of volunteers from Seattle arrived at Drift Creek Camp on Feb. 22 for an eight-hour middle school class service project. As the group arrived, snow began to fall. And fall. And fall. In addition to the highly unusual foot of snow that fell on that first day, countless trees came down like pick-up-sticks across the road. For nearly three days, five men who were trapped at camp cut through hundreds of trees from morning until dark. Staff found ways to put the kids to work in the lodge. They brought food for one day, leading to creative solutions using the More-With Less Cookbook to scrape together meals from what was left in the pantry. Feeling weary, camp staff used Facebook to put out a call for help. A few longtime camp supporters saw the post and headed out. Along the way, they met a group of local folks who knew of "The Mennonite Camp" but hadn't actually been to Drift Creek and also answered the call. The crew began clearing the road from Highway 101. By Sunday night on day 5, camp staff were discouraged and exhausted, although the Seattle group was able to ride in a truck over the snow to Lincoln City, where they could borrow a vehicle to return home. Eventually, Dennis Kauffman came from 2 hours away to plow the way to the camp with his tractor. Since the February storm, Drift Creek Camp has lost six rental groups that had planned to use the facility. The financial loss from these cancelations has been significant. "God's transforming call to intercultural ministry"

The Bible has several examples of God changing or updating the name or descriptor of God's servants because of their life experiences and the context of their calling.

I will change your name: In the Bible, when God changed a person's name, it was usually to establish a new identity. In Genesis 17, God changed Abram's name, meaning "high father," to Abraham, "the ancestor of a multitude of nations." At the same time, God changed Sarai's name, meaning "my princess," to Sarah, "mother of nations." When Jesus first met his disciple-to-be Simon, Jesus changed Simon's name, meaning "God has heard," to Cephas/Peter, meaning "rock" (John 1:42). When God changed people's names, it signaled that they were destined for a new mission in life. The new name was God's way of revealing a new aspect of the divine plan, which would be fulfilled through them.



This Canadians organize for LGBTQ inclusion

Advocates form In This Together, a support and resource group

When Pieter Niemeyer came out as gay in 2014, it was an isolating experience. "There really wasn't a lot of support from Mennonites in Canada, people or organizations to connect with for guidance," said Niemeyer, at the time a pastor of a Mennonite congregation. He reached out to the Brethren Mennonite Council for LGBT Interests, a U.S. organization that seeks to cultivate an inclusive church. They offered some assistance, but he wanted to connect with Canadian Mennonites who also identified as gay something that was hard to do. The experience prompted him and others to create In This Together (view their website here), a support and resource group for Anabaptists who are part of the LGBTQ community in Canada. The founders are Niemeyer and his partner, Mauricio Palacio, who are part of Toronto United Mennonite Church; Alissa Bender, pastor of Hamilton Mennonite Church in Ontario; Leah Harder of Community Mennonite Church in Stouffville, Ont.; and Matthew Froese of First Mennonite Church in Winnipeg, Man. The group began dreaming about a Canadian support network in 2019 after a conference called "Beyond Binaries: Creating an Affirming Church" at Waterloo North Mennonite Church in Ontario. The group continued to work while gathering online during the pandemic. They launched In This Together in 2022. They are being supported by Mennonite Church Canada in their efforts. "We have a very positive working relationship with them," Niemeyer said. "We want to be a place where individuals and congregations can find support and resources, and be a catalyst for change," Palacio said. Read the full Anabaptist World article by John Longhurst here.

"Peace is not just the absence of violence"

York serves in with Mennonite Mission Network in Bogotá, Colombia, with the Colombia Mennonite Church at the Seminario Biblico Menonita de Colombia and Justapaz, to accompany the Mujer y Paz (Women and Peace) project. My local church, Iglesia Menonita de Tesuaquillo, continues to be contextually active, living out a "here-and-not-yet" kind of hope, specifically through projects with Venezuelan families. We support families emotionally and financially on a six-month cycle, with spiritual support that continues. Every Wednesday morning, I walk to the Mennonite Center, where the church is located, to help with Venezuelan family interviews and assist with childcare for children ranging from newborns to four-year-olds, so their parents can fully participate in the discipleship classes offered by a local Mennonite pastor. I enjoy getting to know families on a deeper level, by spending three to four hours per week with their children.
