

If you receive a suspicious email or an unexpected request for gifts cards/money/gifts from anyone, you should always contact that person through another means (such as a phone call or text message) before replying, purchasing anything, or sending personal information.

Children's Time Recipe

Here's the recipe that goes along with Sunday's Children's Time. Make and enjoy!

Chocolate Oatmeal Cookies


Ingredients:

2/3 c mashed bananas 2/3 c chocolate chips

1 1/2 c quick oats

Instructions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350.
- 2. Add mashed bananas and chocolate chips in a microwave-safe mixing bowl. Heat at full power in 30 second intervals, stirring in between until chocolate is completely melted and smooth.
- 3. Stir in the oats until evenly mixed.
- 4. Use a 1.5 T cookie scoop to scoop up the mixture and place on the cookie sheet, spacing cookies about 1.5" apart.
- 5. Using the back of a spoon, flatten each ball.
- 6. Bake for about 10-11 minutes. Let cookies completely cool on cookie sheet before removing.
- 7. EAT AND ENJOY 😉
- 8. Store uneaten cookies in the fridge or freezer.

Brethren plan silent reflection, confession this summer

The Church of the Brethren is planning a "time of silent personal reflection and confession" at its July 4-8, 2023 Annual Conference in Cincinnati based on a recommendation adopted last year to hold a service of confession and repentance regarding relationships with one another and exclusion of LGBTQ people. Church of the Brethren Newsline reported (read the article here) 19 of 28 members of the denomination's Standing Committee voted March 7 to read the recommendation at the Annual Conference and have quiet reflection. The committee chose not to approve two other options to either proceed with the confession and repentance proposal or to admit that the denomination is not ready for such a service. A motion to start a multiyear process of confession and repentance was voted down. Discussion of the recommendation, adopted by the Standing Committee last July, has revealed sharp differences (read more here) among district delegates. The recommendation states, in part: "Theological differences around human sexuality have too often been manifested in bullying, violence and a general sense of dismissal toward one another and specifically toward our LGBTQ+ brothers and sisters. We must redouble our efforts to live out these differences, as individuals and through our systems of governance, in ways that preserve the humanity, dignity and deeply held spiritual convictions of all. 
#NoDraft Video/Essay Challenge

Peacemaking emphasized in new storybook Bible



Come to God's peace table, where there's room for everyone.

From beginning to end, the Bible reminds us that we are made in God's image and that God's table has room for us all. God's presence and peace become real to children of all ages in *The Peace Table* (Shine, July 2023), a comprehensive family storybook Bible with artwork from 30 illustrators. Authors Chrissie Muecke, Jasmin Pittman Morrell, and Teresa Kim Pecinovsky offer biblically faithful retellings of 140 stories from Scripture. Alongside each Bible story they include prayer prompts, questions, and action ideas to guide family reflection and conversation. Twelve "peace paths" encourage children to explore the ways that peace themes are woven throughout the Old and New Testaments. A resource section includes ideas for how to experience peace with God, self, others, and creation, as well as maps, background information on the Bible, interactive ways to pray, and prayers for many occasions. The Peace Table will be the source of the Bible story for Elementary classes for the next three years of the Shine curriculum beginning in Fall 2023. "The Peace Table is an excellent resource for families and faith communities who want their children to love Jesus, grow in faith, and become peacemakers who change the world," says Chrissie Muecke, author and Shine editor.

Will Congress keep hanging humanity on the Pentagon's iron cross!

It's budget season in Washington, and people of faith should pay attention. Over the coming months, Congress will face — and make — critical budget decisions that could drastically reshape our country. The old axiom that budgets are moral documents is true. So now our leaders, as well as the values our country proclaims, will be put to the test. On March 9, President Biden released his budget for the next fiscal year, urging Congress to fund the White House's \$6.9 trillion in priorities for 2024, make corporations pay more of their fair share in taxes and approve his plan to reduce the deficit by nearly \$3 trillion over the next decade. Republicans in Congress quickly pushed back and declared it dead on arrival. Making matters more challenging, the already contentious spending debates are complicated this year by a looming deadline to lift the debt ceiling. If not, the United States could default on trillions of dollars in accumulated federal debt. But who will pay the real costs in the process? Some in Congress are demanding deep cuts to vital programs that people rely on every day in exchange for raising the debt ceiling. Childcare, health care, education, jobs, environmental justice and international peace building are all potentially on the chopping block. Not even children are immune. A funding cut to SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) will send more of our children to school and bed hungry. That can't be an answer. It can be hard to see a way to reconcile the competing demands to cut spending, reduce our growing debt and invest in the programs our country needs. But there is one place to rein in excessive spending hiding in plain sight: the Pentagon. The current Pentagon budget is already at a staggering \$858 billion. Congress consistently piles on tens of billions on top of what the president requests in the name of national security. This is encouraged by the Pentagon's "unfunded priorities lists," where the military submits wish lists to Congress, asking for additional funding beyond what the president requested. Last year, those lists totaled \$24 billion. No other part of the federal budget gets the same opportunity to push for more funding. For 2024, President Biden requested the largest military budget in history — \$886 billion. But runaway war spending is not inevitable. It is a choice Congress makes every year. If Democrats and Republicans want to find common ground on reducing federal spending, they should start by cutting weapons systems, ships and equipment that don't work or that the Pentagon doesn't want or need. Moreover, we must invest in addressing the greatest threats we face — climate change, global disease, economic decline and violent extremism. The Pentagon budget should not be allowed to endlessly expand with few to no questions asked and scant pushback given. Elkhart County Mennonites unite to open faith-based immigrant legal aid center



After more than two years of preparation, La Posada Immigrant Aid (find their website here), a new faith-based immigrant legal aid center located in Sunnyside Mennonite Church in Elkhart, Indiana, is open for business, largely due to the support and collaboration of several Mennonite Church USA (MC USA) affiliated churches, conferences, schools, organizations and individuals. Naun Cerrato, founder and co-pastor of Piedra Viva Mennonite Church — which also shares space with Sunnyside Mennonite Church — and an immigrant himself, noticed that Elkhart County, Indiana, had a need for low-cost immigrant legal services. Cerrato reached out to other Mennonite congregations in Elkhart County for support, and in 2020, the board for La Posada was formed, with Cerrato as the board chair. In February, La Posada received accreditation from the U.S. Department of Justice to act as legal representatives in immigration cases. The organization's reach is still limited for the time being, though, as they continue to search for an attorney, and office manager, to join the staff. **Read the rest of Kessica Griggs' article for Mennonite Church USA** here.

Indiana-Michigan Mennonite Conference Begins Reparations for Harmful Credentialing Interviews

Conference seeks accountability, repair through listening and response invitation.

The Ministry Credentialing Team (MCT) of Indiana-Michigan Mennonite Conference (IMMC) has become aware that some credentialing interviews of the past have caused harm due to institutional tension and fear. Though the credentialing approach of MCT has moved toward one of collaboration and trust in congregational discernment, there is a desire within the team and the conference to create spaces to hear stories, extend an institutional apology, and offer grace and healing through a shared ritual. The first step in this journey is the release of this letter inviting those who have been negatively impacted to participate in listening process. "We hurt people, and MCT hopes to listen, learn, and (where possible) repair and restore what has been broken. It is our intent to open up a listening process to allow anyone who was negatively impacted to share with us in the format that feels most comfortable to them: written or in person, anonymous or named. We acknowledge that people who wish to share with us may not be the interviewee themselves, but their loved one, their mentor, or someone else affected by our unfair practices. We are committed to hearing these stories from those willing to share them." This is intended to be the first step on a road toward repair as an institution and marks an important point in the history of a conference seeking to live out our vision as a "Community of Congregations, Centered on Jesus... Acting through Grace, Love, and Peace..."
