

### Annual Evaluation of the Vision Team

Commission chairs, as well as chairs of the Spiritual Gifts Discernment Team and Vision Team, and all members of the Pastoral Team, recently completed the annual evaluation of the Vision Team (VT). The evaluation results were compiled by the Spiritual Gifts Discernment Team. Among the affirmations for the VT were the following: good followplans; a well-balanced, high-functioning team; regular, through communication with the congregation; active engagement by team members in church life; and valuable regular check-ins with commissions. Some areas were submitted as areas for potential improvement and growth including: continued refinement of the understanding of the VT's role/scope of practice; increased efforts to be consistently proactive vs. reactive; increased support to pastors and timely attention to human resource matters; and refinement of ways to support commission members' understanding of their respective commission's goals and tasks while equipping and empowering commissions to carry out their work. There were both affirmations for the VT's efforts to be transparent and communicate with the congregation as well as requests for the VT to provide other methods of communication including more verbal updates. All evaluation input has been shared with the Vision Team to help inform and shape their work going forward.

# Vision Team Update





# Highlights from MC USA Executive Board Meeting

Delegates at the Mennonite Church USA convention in Kansas City, Mo., in July will consider a recommendation to adopt a triennial schedule for national delegate assemblies, which currently meet every two years. The MC USA Executive Board unanimously approved the recommendation at its meeting April 13-14 in Los Angeles. Leading factors in proposing a three-year cycle are "the pace of change and our capacity to effectively implement delegate decisions," said Glen Guyton, the denomination's executive director. Less frequent meetings could also save money. Guyton estimated holding two delegate assemblies rather than three in a six-year span would reduce the cost by 30%. Although the proposal only affects delegate assemblies, national conventions, which feature worship services and other events, likely would follow the same schedule, Guyton said. A triennial schedule has a precedent. The General Conference Mennonite Church, which merged with the Mennonite Church to create MC USA and Mennonite Church Canada in 2002, met every third year. In another agenda item for Kansas City delegates, the Executive Board voted to

In another agenda item for Kansas City delegates, the Executive Board voted to recommend changing the status of Everence and Mennonite Health Services Association from denominational agencies to ministry partners. In the new relationship, MC USA would have less oversight over Everence and MHS Association. Everence is a financial services organization that relates to several denominations. MHS Association supports Mennonite and other Anabaptist health and human service providers.


Another action reveals the Executive Board's role in events that led to the March resignation of Mike Sherrill, executive director of Mennonite Mission Network. By approving the minutes of their January meeting, the board made public an action taken after an executive session: "A vote of no confidence was given" on Sherrill, and the MC USA Executive Committee would "work in support of the MMN board to address the concerns discussed in the executive session."

The board discussed a decision by the resolutions committee not to bring to delegates a resolution that reaffirms a 2015 statement on forbearing with each other amid disagreement. Moderator-elect Jon Carlson of Leola, Pa., said the resolution was proposed by a progressive congregation in Virginia that wanted to reassure traditionalists that they are welcome and respected even though delegates passed an LGBTQ-affirming resolution in 2022. Carlson said the resolutions committee did not feel the resolution moved the conversation forward in a meaningful way because it restated what a previous resolution already said. Board members did not dispute the resolution committee's decision but discussed how they might change the perception that those who hold traditional views on LGBTQ issues are no longer welcome. Karen Zehr of Wichita, Kan., said reaffirming forbearance would be a good idea, but "maybe we don't need another resolution to do it." Carlson suggested, "If something like this needs to be said, maybe it is the Executive Board's responsibility and not the resolutions committee." Todd Lehman of Hesston, Kan., added that the underlying question was, "How can we as a church practice compassionate relationships with one another?" # In Memory of Ruth Wenger

The Brethren Mennonite Council for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender Interests (BMC) remembers and honors Ruth Wenger, who passed away March 23, 2023. Our care and sympathies go to Ruth's wife, Judy Wilson, Germantown Mennonite Church, and all who love Ruth, as we grieve her loss and celebrate her life. Ruth was active with BMC in the 1980s and 90s, serving on the BMC board for many years. She played a special role in the memorial quilt project, moving the quilt along each year as it was sold again and again at BMC auctions. Days before Ruth died, she was still fostering sacred connections among our BMC family: Ruth and Judy sent a quilt with their pastor to a retreat of queer Mennonite leaders, so that we could envelop ourselves in our gay and lesbian ancestors. Ruth is remembered as one who was always full of life and holy mischief. This story (found <u>here</u>) from 2017 captures that spirit, especially her commitments to intersections of lgbtqia+ and racial justice, as a leader in her church and in her neighborhood. # Pacifism and nonviolence should be a way of life

Below is an excerpt from Mennonite World Conference (MWC) general secretary César García's article about pacifism. Reprinted by MWC with permission from Konferenz der Mennoniten Der Schweiz/Conference Mennonite Suisse.

### Mennonites are sometimes accused of irresponsibility, even by other churches. In the face of a war, is it appropriate to continue to adhere to pacifism and nonviolence?

This question arises in any violent conflict, and it is easier to think about it when one is not directly involved. I think with pacifism, it's important that we stay completely with ourselves. We cannot demand a pacifist attitude from others, but only from ourselves. We can always ask ourselves: what do I do when I am under violent attack? Of course, the answer is difficult if I have never been in such a situation, and maybe I would react with violence. That is all too human. Nevertheless, I can hold on to the idea that for me, basically, the nonviolent way is the right way. **Read more** here.

# Depuis le début de la guerre, ceux qui s'engagent pour le pacifisme et la non-violence doivent soudain se justifier.
