THIS Sunday, May 7th after worship during the CE hour

MCN is participating in Central District Conference's (CDC) "Sacred Listening" process on May 7th. Immediately following worship, we will share a light meal and will be sharing stories of our congregation with our "listeners" who are joining us from nearby CDC congregations. There are 6 prompts that will guide this process (found below.) Everyone is encouraged to share their voice. You can learn more about the process and read the prompts here.

The 6 prompts are:

- 1. Tell a story about a time when you were especially excited or grateful to be a part of your church.
- 2. The mission of Central District Conference is summarized as "Knowing Christ's love...Answering God's call." Share a story or two that you feel demonstrates God's love within your congregation.
- 3. We "support missional partnerships that make God's reign visible." How are you living out your congregation's vision in the community around you? Can you share a story that demonstrates this?
- 4. We want to "call and nurture wise, dynamic and compassionate Anabaptist leadership." How does your congregation nurture your gifts and the gifts of others?
- 5. We want to be communities in which "grace-filled relationships flourish." Can you share an experience when your congregation was blessed by its relationships with other CDC churches, or other communities such as camps or colleges?
- 6. Our Mennonite Church USA vision calls us to be communities of God's "healing and hope." As you envision your future as such a Spirit-led community, what would that look like in your context?

The Outreach Commission, at the request of Mama Bears, is giving \$500 in support of Camp Indigo Point. They are a residential summer camp that is specifically for LGBTQ+ youth. It is one of just a few camps like that, and it happens to be in Illinois. You can view their website here.

Worship Commission Notes



We reviewed our recent special Holy Week & Easter worship services with positive responses to all. We discussed at length concerns raised about potential for sharing germs in communion. Our discussion included spiritual, pastoral, and sanitary perspectives, & we noted that any method we use involves people handling plates or elements that others have touched. We also noted that several of our members have allergies to either gluten or grape juice. We want to be sensitive to concerns people have, but we also wonder if any method of serving the whole congregation really eliminates those concerns. So, we will provide options for those who have concerns. We will provide a station at the back with both apple juice & gluten free communion options. Each person is responsible for their own decision about taking communion, so if your concern is either allergies or germs, you can choose to go to the station to receive the optional form. Annual Evaluation of the Vision Team

Commission chairs, as well as chairs of the Spiritual Gifts Discernment Team and Vision Team, and all members of the Pastoral Team, recently completed the annual evaluation of the Vision Team (VT). The evaluation results were compiled by the Spiritual Gifts Discernment Team. Among the affirmations for the VT were the following: good followplans; a well-balanced, high-functioning team; regular, dynamic communication with the congregation; active engagement by team members in church life; and valuable regular check-ins with commissions. Some areas were submitted as areas for potential improvement and growth including: continued refinement of the understanding of the VT's role/scope of practice; increased efforts to be consistently proactive vs. reactive; increased support to pastors and timely attention to human resource matters; and refinement of ways to support commission members' understanding of their respective commission's goals and tasks while equipping and empowering commissions to carry out their work. There were both affirmations for the VT's efforts to be transparent and communicate with the congregation as well as requests for the VT to provide other methods of communication including more verbal updates. All evaluation input has been shared with the Vision Team to help inform and shape their work going forward.








Tomorrow, Thursday, May 4 at 12:00pm at the Normal Public Library

Menno Simons Sermon Prize awarded to German pastor



The University of Hamburg department of peace church theology has awarded the Menno Simons Sermon Prize to Joachim Leberecht, pastor of Evangelical Lydia Church in Herzogenrath, Germany. The winning sermon will be delivered during the worship service Sept. 3 at Hamburg-Altona Mennonite Church, followed by the public award ceremony. The sermon was originally delivered on Good Friday in 2022 as part of a Passion sermon series about dreams. Leberecht connects literary tales of dreams to the nightmare of war in Ukraine. The sermon recalls the sacrifice of Jesus on the cross, concluding that "we should no longer sacrifice people. It is enough once and for all." Leberecht laments the attitudes of church leaders amid the war and recalls conscientious objectors' testimony. "Through Jesus' death, we are freed and called to nonviolent resistance," the sermon concludes. **Read the full Mennonews.de article reprinted by Anabaptist World here.**

Indigenous activists share mixed feelings on Vatican repudiation of Noctrine



Steven Newcomb, who is Shawnee and Lenape, recalls first writing to the pope in 1992 to ask him to revoke the papal bulls behind the Doctrine of Discovery. That was Pope John Paul II. Two popes ago. So when the Vatican released a statement last week saying it repudiated that doctrine — which, backed by a series of 15th-century papal bulls, justified the domination by European Christians of lands already inhabited by Indigenous peoples — Newcomb said he wasn't terribly surprised. "I just think it's fascinating and it's really great because what it does is it catapults the issue to the world stage in a very prominent manner," said Newcomb, author of the 2008 book Pagans in the Promised Land: Decoding the Doctrine of Christian Discovery and co-founder and co-director of the Indigenous Law Institute. But Newcomb, like many Indigenous activists and organizations that have been outspoken about the continuing impact of the Doctrine of Discovery, has mixed feelings about the Vatican's repudiation. "They haven't even begun to come to terms with the true nature of what we're actually talking about," he said. The Doctrine of Discovery has received renewed attention in recent years as Indigenous activists have pushed for action to right the wrongs of colonization, and a number of Protestant mostly mainline — denominations have issued their own repudiations. The doctrine was first expressed by Pope Nicholas V in the 1452 papal bull "Dum Diversas," which — along with subsequent bulls "Romanus Pontifex" and "Inter Caetera" — created a theological justification for Christian rulers to seize the property and possessions of non-Christians.

Love in a time of climate change

Below is an excerpt from Basaria Sianturi's article for Mennonite World Conference (MWC). Basaria Dwi Febrina Sianturi serves at Gereja Kristen Muria Indonesia (GKMI) Sidodadi in northern Semarang, Central Java, Indonesia. **Read more** here.

I cannot forget the high tide flooding of 23-25 May 2022. As pastor of GKMI Sidodadi in Semarang in Central Java province, Indonesia, I still recount the anxieties and panic of the community. Our church building is just 10 minutes' walk from Tanjung Mas Seaport from where the flood came. Seawater ran down so fast, hitting the pier embarkment and flooding the area. Our church and people's settlements were flooded. The water level was as high as an adult's hip. We were shocked, especially those who worked near the pier.

During the high tide hit, 55 families of the GKMI congregation who live around the church suffered from the disaster. Some of them were forced to flee to another safe place. On the first and second day of the flood, these families could not have sufficient food because their houses were inundated by seawater. On the third day, the condition improved because they began to receive assistance from different groups and other GKMI congregations.

I believe that God wants us to serve one another with love in times of trouble. The apostle Paul says that we must "bear one another's burdens" because in this way we shall "fulfill the law of Christ" (Galatians 6:2-5). God's power was shown to our congregation during the tidal flood. We not only serve our members but also those in need.

No matter how solid the embankment is built, one day it will not be able to contain the strong waves and sea pressures of which volumes continue to increase as a result of global climate change. Our earth is suffering. Human behaviour has caused ecological damage. In addition, our greed brings about exploitations on earth. As God's people, we must remember that God gave humans the duty and responsibility to "work and care for" the earth and all that is in it. We must not destroy the earth's riches. We must restore these. If nature is angry, humans will receive its consequences.

Aimer à l'heure du changement climatique

Je ne peux oublier l'inondation suite au raz de marée des 23-25 mai 2022. Moi qui suis pasteure de la GKMI Sidodadi à Semarang dans la province centrale de Java (Indonésie), je parle encore de l'angoisse et de la panique de notre communauté. Notre bâtiment d'église est à seulement 10 minutes à pied du port maritime de Tanjung Mas, d'où est venue l'inondation. La marée a monté incroyablement vite, passant par-dessus l'embarcadère et la jetée et submergeant tout autour. Notre église et les habitations ont été inondées. L'eau est arrivée au niveau de la taille d'un adulte. Cela a été un choc terrible, surtout pour ceux qui travaillaient près de la jetée.

Le premier et le deuxième jour de l'inondation, ces familles n'avaient pas suffisamment de nourriture parce que tout était trempé. Le troisième jour, la situation s'est améliorée parce qu'elles ont commencé à recevoir de l'aide de différents groupes et d'autres paroisses de la GKMI. Comme ma maison n'a pas été inondée, j'ai pu cuisiner chez moi et distribuer des produits de première nécessité aux membres de notre assemblée locale et aux communautés environnantes touchées par la catastrophe.

Je suis convaincue que Dieu veut que nous nous venions au secours les uns les autres avec amour dans les moments difficiles. L'apôtre Paul dit que nous devons 'porter les fardeaux les uns des autres' parce que de cette manière nous 'accomplirons la loi de Christ' (Galates 6/2- 5). Dieu a manifesté sa puissance en aidant notre paroisse pendant le raz de marée. Nous servons non seulement nos membres mais aussi ceux qui sont dans le besoin.

Quelle que soit la solidité de la digue, un jour, elle ne pourra pas arrêter la force des vagues et les pressions marines dont les volumes continuent d'augmenter en raison du changement climatique mondial. Notre terre souffre. Le comportement des êtres humains a entraîné de graves dommages écologiques. En outre, notre cupidité provoque l'exploitation de la terre. En tant que peuple de Dieu, nous devons nous rappeler que Dieu nous a donné le devoir et la responsabilité de 'travailler et de prendre soin, de la terre et de tout ce qui s'y trouve. Nous ne devons pas détruire les richesses de la terre. Nous devons les restaurer. Si la nature est en colère, nous en subiront les conséquences.
