As we finish the second verse of Paul's attributes of love in 1 Corinthians 13, we encounter a difficult one—love "keeps no record of wrongs." This reminds us of the common phrase "forgive and forget," which has some profoundly harmful consequences for vulnerable people. Instead, we are invited into a deeper understanding of forgiveness, described through the prophet Hosea, as he wraps up his graphic story of God's faithfulness amid people's unfaithfulness.

In the coming months, we, as a congregation, will be making decisions about our immediate pastoral needs. Some details to keep in mind as we consider our options:

- In 2021, our congregation strongly affirmed the plan for a commission-based structure and a pastoral team model.
- As we began the search for a pastoral team in the Fall, 2021, four individuals accepted the call to serve on an interim pastoral team. This team worked hard and effectively to support the commissions, teams, and subcommittees while covering many other pastoral roles for our congregation.
- Kevin Chupp was hired as a full-time pastor in the fall of 2022, with the understanding that he would be working within a pastoral team model.
- Final decisions need to be made as to how the invaluable work of our interim pastors will be covered when their service comes to an end.

The task at hand is to determine what would constitute a "permanent" pastoral team that would adequately support and meet the needs of our church as we function now and as we follow through on plans to grow and thrive. This will all be balanced with what is determined to be financially feasible for our congregation. The Vision Team invites the congregation to pray and imagine with us as we all discern together these next important steps.

Medical Debt Jubilee

You may have heard about the campaign for wiping out medical debt in Central Illinois on WGLT. Our local effort is being led by First Baptist Church of Bloomington, and we are planning to participate with their "Medical Debt Jubilee" weekend by hosting a special offering here on August 27th.

This is being facilitated by an organization called "RIP Medical Debt" who buys unpaid medical debt at \$1 for every \$100 of debt. The goal for our local campaign is to raise \$12,000, which would pay of 1.2 million dollars of medical debt! That may sound like a big goal, but we are already over halfway there, with over \$6,300 having been raised to date. We hope you will mark August 27th on your calendars, and will be ready to give whatever you can for this special opportunity to partner with the wider religious community to be a blessing to those in need here.

Mennonite Central Committee (MCC) School Kit Challenge: Notebooks and pencils are treasures for families around the world who have been forced to flee their homes or struggle to afford basic school supplies. Without these items, many kids in places like Syria, Ukraine and South Sudan can't get the education they desperately need. Let's start gearing up to do MCC School Kits at Mennonite Church of Normal

- The supplies are out at reduced cost at Walmart.
- Several items: 4 pens, ruler, & metal pencil sharpener (not at Walmart) are the most expensive. I can order online at a very reduced price in quantity. I would like to do this to keep costs down for each kit, but would ask you to contribute one dollar to cover the cost, for each kit.
- You can purchase the following items at Walmart:
 - 4 spiral notebooks (8.5 X10.5). 70 SHEETS ONLY = 35 cents each. (\$1.40)
 - 8 new unsharpened pencils = 47 cents for 10 pencils
 - 12 colored pencils (in a box) Crayola is best!! = 97 cents
 - ∘ 1 large eraser = 47 cents for 2

TOTAL = \$3.31, PLUS tax and \$1FOR ORDERED SUPPLIES

- The other 3 items we will get online as I said above. (4 pens, ruler, metal pencil sharpener).
- We will have the cloth bag available for your kits.
- More information will be coming. I am planning to challenge another smaller Mennonite Church to see if we can do more bags then they do. They did over 200 bags last year. MCC wants 10,000. Bags. I HOPE EVERYONE CAN HELP!!







Some can't sidestep war's hard choices

Russia's invasion of Ukraine on Feb. 24, 2022, marked a major escalation in a war that began already in 2014. Since then, those of us in North America have looked on in horror at scenes of cities laid waste, families fleeing their homes as refugees, waves of newly deployed weapons and caskets lined up in rows. Most news agencies report that at least 50,000 combatants and civilians have died in the conflict, with perhaps 300,000 suffering injuries. Barely remembered amid the carnage unfolding in Ukraine are violent conflicts in places like Afghanistan, the Central African Republic, Somalia, South Sudan and Syria. Pray for the churches who face daily pressure to conform to the logic of violence. Pray for our churches who are drawn to the seductions of Christian nationalism. And ask how you and your congregation can respond creatively, courageously and compassionately to the suffering of innocent people, even as we bear witness to the resurrection claim that life is more powerful than death. MC USA Interior Minister of Church Safety

MC USA names interim denominational minister of Church Safety and continues abuse prevention work.

Mennonite Church USA (MC USA) has named Nancy Kauffmann, former board president of Dove's Nest and longtime Mennonite church leader, as the interim denominational minister of Church Safety for MC USA's Church Vitality office, effective June 26, 2023. This new position was created so that the denomination could address the need for continued abuse education and prevention work. This need came after Dove's Nest, an abuse prevention ministry, dissolved May 31, 2023. MC USA will use the name Safe Church to continue and to expand on the work that Dove's Nest started, according to Michael Danner, MC USA associate executive director of Church Vitality. By August 1, many of Dove's Nest's resources, including the "Circle of Grace" curriculum, guidelines for setting up safe space policies, consultation services and a speakers' bureau will be available on the MC USA website. **Read more in MC USA's post here.**

Called to be Bad Podcast



Below is an excerpt from Mariah Martin's (she/her) blog post for Mennonite Church USA. The Called to be Bad Podcast is my attempt at creating a community steeped in safety, storytelling, and a refusal to accept the damaging and lazy binary of "good" and "bad." Called to be Bad digs into the intersections between good and bad, pure and profane, holy and ordinary. In each episode a guest reveals a "bad" topic they are passionate about. By "bad" I mean strange, scandalous, taboo, non-traditional — something that goes against the status quo of what it means to be faithful. If the Christian church has labeled a behavior, identity, theology or topic as bad, shameful or sinful I want to investigate why. We have had episodes on bad words, religious trauma, toxic secrets, leaving the church, purity culture, hell, shame-free sex and more. Below is the beginning of a Mennonite Church USA (MC USA) Menno Snapshot by Reverend Erica Lea-Simka (she/her/hers), currently pastor of Albuquerque Mennonite Church and the Southwest Representative for Mennonite Women USA.

One of the many reasons I chose to be Mennonite is the culture of hospitality. Between potlucks and the overall warmth in the congregations I have interacted with, I have always felt a sense of belonging ... to a point. Recently, I listened to a discussion about the Resolution for Repentance and Transformation, which was passed by delegates at the 2022 special delegate assembly, as compared to hospitality. The question of how congregations, conferences and Mennonite Church USA can be hospitable to LGBTQ people reflects embedded bias. Firstly, hospitality includes an essential power dynamic. There are hosts, who manage the space that guests are invited into. At the heart of the resolution, there is the need for former and current power holders, "hosts," to recognize their role and step aside, so there is equitable, just, space for LGBTQ Mennonites to also be "hosts." Living Into Repertance and Transformation



Below is the beginning of an article written by Randy Spaulding, pastor of Boulder (Colorado)

Mennonite Church and one of the leaders of Inclusive Mennonite Pastors.

In March, a group of queer, transgender and ally Mennonite leaders from across Mennonite Church USA (MC USA) gathered for a Queer Mennonite Visioning (QMV) retreat at Camp Friedenswald, Cassopolis, Michigan. We gathered to worship, sing, imagine, share meals, remember, connect and simply be. It was the first time in my 30+ years of Mennonite ministry, and as a gay Mennonite pastor, that queer Mennonites gathered in a denominationally supportive setting. There wasn't a crisis or a need to meet in secret or a fear that we would be told to leave. At the invitation of the Brethren Mennonite Council for LGBT Interests and leaders from Inclusive Mennonite Pastors, MC USA's Central District Conference (CDC) provided funding for the retreat, and Camp Friedenswald provided hospitality. This funding was made possible in large part through MC USA delegates affirming the Resolution for Repentance and Transformation in May 2022. CDC leaders shared that this was a concrete way to repent for past harms to the queer community and to enter into the work of repair.
