Let's start gearing up to do MCC School Kits at Mennonite Church of Normal

- The supplies are out at reduced cost at Walmart.
- Several items: 4 pens, ruler, & metal pencil sharpener (not at Walmart) are the most expensive. I can order online at a very reduced price in quantity. I would like to do this to keep costs down for each kit, but would ask you to contribute one dollar to cover the cost, for each kit.
- You can purchase the following items at Walmart:
 - 4 spiral notebooks (8.5 X10.5). 70 SHEETS ONLY = 35 cents each. (\$1.40)
 - ∘ 8 new unsharpened pencils = 47 cents for 10 pencils
 - 12 colored pencils (in a box) Crayola is best!! = 97 cents
 - 1 large eraser = 47 cents for 2

TOTAL = \$3.31, PLUS tax and \$1 FOR ORDERED SUPPLIES

Medical Debt Jubilee

You may have heard about the campaign for wiping out medical debt in Central Illinois on WGLT. Our local effort is being led by First Baptist Church of Bloomington, and we are planning to participate with their "Medical Debt Jubilee" weekend by hosting a special offering here on August 27th.

This is being facilitated by an organization called "RIP Medical Debt" who buys unpaid medical debt at \$1 for every \$100 of debt. The goal for our local campaign is to raise \$12,000, which would pay of 1.2 million dollars of medical debt! That may sound like a big goal, but we are already over halfway there, with over \$6,300 having been raised to date. Biennial Schedule Kept



Mennonite Church USA delegates vote to keep biennial schedule.

Mennonite Church USA delegates on July 7 narrowly rejected a recommendation to lengthen the delegate assembly cycle from two years to three. With 65.6% support, the resolution fell just short of the two-thirds majority needed to pass. The vote was 210 to 110. Delegates met July 7-8 at the Kansas City Convention Center immediately after the national convention of MC USA. The Executive Board, which brought the recommendation, estimated a triennial schedule would increase attendance and cost 30% less for both delegates and the denomination over a six-year period. It also would allow more time to implement delegate assembly actions. Although the recommendation dealt only with delegate assemblies, most of the discussion focused on conventions, which traditionally have been held with delegate meetings but do not have to be. **Read more in Paul Schrag's article for the** *Anabaptist World* here.



Ministry credential restored

Central District Conference of Mennonite Church USA has reinstated the ministerial credential of Keith Schrag 36 years after he relinquished it in 1987 during a ministerial meeting in which he was questioned for being a gay man. Central District restored Schrag's credentials June 23 at the conference's annual meeting, hosted at College Mennonite Church in Goshen, Ind. Schrag was ordained in 1971 in Wichita, Kan., and served as pastor of Ames Mennonite Church in Iowa from 1977 to 1987 and continued to pastor the congregation as a lay leader until his retirement earlier this year. The relinquishment followed Schrag's public acknowledgment of his sexual orientation as a gay man and his advocacy for the welcome of all into the church regardless of sexual orientation. He was also asked to step down from the Peace, Service and Justice Committee. The emotional and redemptive power of reconciliation played out in the life and ministry of Schrag, who continued his advocacy for LGBTQ people.

Conference minister Doug Luginbill offered a tearful apology on behalf of the conference and gave Schrag a certificate of ordination. "On behalf of the Central District Conference, I apologize for the pain, marginalization and separation that you experienced from the conference," he said. "We recognize your prophetic and pastoral gifts, walking with and ministering to many who were marginalized. You were a pastor to many throughout your nearly 60 years of ministry in Kansas, lowa and other communities. Today we recognize you as a credentialed leader in Central District Conference and Mennonite Church USA. Hear creation's grown, without anxiety CLIMATE SUMMIT

Creation is groaning. Climate change is warming the globe, and ecosystems are overwhelmed. That doesn't mean individuals should also be overwhelmed. Just over 300 attendees were called to action and hope — but not anxiety and depression — July 7 at the Youth and Young Adult Climate Summit in Kansas City, Mo. The new event for the Mennonite Church USA convention featured keynote speaker Talitha Amadea Aho. The author of *In Deep Waters: Spiritual Care for Young People in a Climate Crisis*, Aho spoke on Romans 8:22-26, lamenting the groaning of creation and hope for what is not yet seen. Aho said hotter and colder weather and the increasing intensity of natural disasters are theological concerns because poor people suffer more from severe weather's impacts. "There is one vocation we all share when it comes to the climate crisis," said Aho, pastor at Montclair Presbyterian Church in Oakland. "God calls us all to take care of one another." MennoCon23 opens with call to be transformed in God's image

Okanya: 'What is forming and shaping your love?'

On opening night of MennoCon23, the national convention of Mennonite Church USA, a crowd of about 1,300 heard a call to turn away from the world's habit-forming practices and be transformed by Jesus Christ. The biennial event, with the theme "Be Transformed," opened July 3 in the Kansas City Convention Center. Nelson Okanya, global missions president for the Center for Serving Leadership in Pittsburgh, spoke on Romans 12:1-2, which says believers should present themselves to God as "living sacrifices" who are "transformed by the renewing of your minds." Originally from Kenya, Okanya chairs the Global Mission Fellowship, a support network for Anabaptist-related churches and mission groups. He is a former president of Eastern Mennonite Missions. "I am the product of Mennonite mission," Oklanya said. "I am here because Mennonites went to East Africa in obedience to God. . . . A number are buried there. They gave it their all." He believes the church is able to shape God's people for sacrificial obedience if we set aside earthly loyalties. "He calls us to be agents of that salvation," Okanya said. "God has given us the ministry of reconciliation. How are we doing at that, friends?" Read more about Nelson Okanya's message in Paul Schrag's article for the *Anabaptist World* here.



Korean Anabaptists pursue justice in churches and beyond.

Peace churches exist in South Korea, but their numbers are tiny relative to the <u>numerous</u> Protestant and Catholic steeples that poke above the buildings in every community. The six Anabaptist churches in the nation today trace their roots to a Christian book study group in 1993 that sought a return to early church practices. Mennonite Central Committee operated a vocational school from 1953 to 1971 as part of its response to the Korean War. But no mission agency sent church planters, and no Mennonite church was established. The book study turned into Jesus Village Church, which was formed in 1996, followed by the Korean Anabaptist Center in 2003. It shares office space with MCC in Chuncheon. On June 4, after a joint worship service of two Anabaptist congregations, Jesus Village Church and Jesus Heart Church, KAC board chair Sang-Uk Nam explained about education and publishing projects the center carries out to introduce Anabaptist values in Korean society. "We also do book clubs and work to translate books about Anabaptism and peace, and that enlarges our network," he said. "I know people who hate churches but want to be a Christian. Still seeking peace, 70 years after war in Korea



Pain and division linger generations after armistice.


Kim Young-Ae carries a vision of peace and reconciliation that reaches far beyond the razor-wire fence hugging her island's coast. Gyodong Island is one of South Korea's most northwestern points, separated by only about a mile of water from the Democratic People's Republic of Korea, also known as North Korea. A bridge built in 2014 connects the island to the mainland, via a military checkpoint with gun-toting soldiers. The security measures are reminders that the Korean War technically continues, though fighting ended with an armistice 70 years ago this month. No treaty was signed to end the war, imparting a legacy of militarization and divided families that continues to this day. The war's active period, from 1950 to 1953, claimed some 5 million lives and displaced an estimated 5 million others. Confusion and panic reigned as the U.S. military dropped more bombs and napalm than in the entire Pacific theater during World War II. MCC seeks to be a reconciling presence with the people of two Koreas, resisting hostility and isolation. Based in Chuncheon, South Korea, it has a history of supporting orphanages and pediatric hospitals with canned meat and other resources, Stacy Nam (MCC's DPRK program director) said. Kim shares those goals on her island out west. Where others see a rusting metal building abandoned as a military observation outpost on the northern tip of the island, she sees the blueprint of a kids' camp that could gather youth from both sides of the water. Christ's call, God's love encountered

Speakers at MennoCon23 worship services July 6 suggested God's love can be encountered in seemingly awkward relationships that often overlap: those that involve different generations and different opinions. Such transformational relationships can also be a significant source of hope for the church's future. Spanning birth years from 1957 to 2005, a morning worship panel at the Mennonite Church USA convention in Kansas City, Mo., shared about where each person has seen the church at its best, how it has changed, and their hopes for what comes next.
