

Updates from the Administration Commission

- We recently had a fire inspection from the Town of Normal. We got dinged on a number of items. We need your help to monitor and help maintain our safety. First, while the fire doors have door stops on them to hold them open, we can't leave them open. They need to stay closed. We're in the process of removing the door stops to make it easier to remember. In addition, we can't keep a rubber door stop handy as the fire inspector always notices. Second, the area behind and to the side of the organ seems to accumulate many items, including music stands. This can't happen as the route to the exit door needs to be available. Third, several exit doors are missing light bulbs; these are in the process of being replaced. Fourth, the pathway from the south door from the sanctuary was blocked with grasses and weeds, including the area around the air conditioners. These have been removed. The fire inspector will be returning to see whether we've corrected these issues or not.
- Lydia drafted a Preventive Maintenance Checklist for the church. The Commission is in the process of finalizing the Checklist for a living document that is updated as preventive maintenance is completed. Then, we should know when the next time the task is to be completed.
- Hopefully, you noticed in last week's Midweek that we are running about \$10,000 below our Spending Plan. Typically, we have run a deficit in the summer, however, in the last five years, it's not been this significant. We would appreciate your assistance in correcting the deficit.

Let's start gearing up to do MCC School Kits at Mennonite Church of Normal

- The supplies are out at reduced cost at Walmart.
- Several items: 4 pens, ruler, & metal pencil sharpener (not at Walmart) are the most expensive. I can order online at a very reduced price in quantity. I would like to do this to keep costs down for each kit, but would ask you to contribute one dollar to cover the cost, for each kit.
- You can purchase the following items at Walmart :
 - 4 spiral notebooks (8.5 X10.5). 70 SHEETS ONLY = 35 cents each. (\$1.40)
 - ∘ 8 new unsharpened pencils = 47 cents for 10 pencils
 - 12 colored pencils (in a box) Crayola is best!! = 97 cents
 - 1 large eraser = 47 cents for 2

TOTAL = \$3.31, PLUS tax and \$1 FOR ORDERED SUPPLIES

You may have heard about the campaign for wiping out medical debt in Central Illinois on WGLT. Our local effort is being led by First Baptist Church of Bloomington, and we are planning to participate with their "Medical Debt Jubilee" weekend by hosting a special offering here on August 27th.

This is being facilitated by an organization called "RIP Medical Debt" who buys unpaid medical debt at \$1 for every \$100 of debt. The goal for our local campaign is to raise \$12,000, which would pay of 1.2 million dollars of medical debt! That may sound like a big goal, but we are already over halfway there, with over \$6,300 having been raised to date. Indiana-Michigan adopts nondiscrimination policy for ministry credentialing

Indiana-Michigan Conference of Mennonite Church USA has adopted a policy to "not deny credentials to someone called to ministry . . . because of their sexual orientation, gender identity or marital status." Delegates passed the policy revision with 90.6% approval at the conference's annual meeting June 9-10 at Amigo Centre in Sturgis, Mich. The conference reviewed its policy on credentialing people in same-sex relationships after MC USA delegates rescinded the denomination's Membership Guidelines at a special delegate assembly in 2022. The Indiana-Michigan policy reaffirms congregations' freedom "to be the deciding bodies about their pastoral leadership." Congregations can "choose to call or not call as a pastor any person equipped for pastoral leadership." The meeting's theme was "Unity in Love," based on Philippians 2:1-5. Cyneatha Millsaps of Mennonite Women USA and Sharon Yoder, Indiana-Michigan Conference co-minister, preached on the need for listening and relationships. The Noctrine of Discovery Continues to Exploit

Members of Waterford Mennonite Church in Goshen, Indiana, USA, are baptized in a small pond behind the church that is home to beavers, fish and all kinds of insects. The Waterford Wetland, a 55-acre area of undeveloped land along the Elkhart River, is a source of pride for the congregation. A brief history of the land on the church's website begins in the 1950s, when a previous owner dug a pond to raise fish. But what about before that? Like most of the United States, the land owned by Waterford Mennonite Church was taken from the indigenous people who lived on it (in this case the Pokagon band of the Potawatomi) through treaties and forced relocation in the 17 and 1800s. Mennonite settlers didn't usually participate directly in the removal of indigenous peoples, but they often moved in soon after, setting up homesteads in places like Goshen within the first decade of them being vacated. "We're living on Potawatomi land here and it was not taken in a just way from the people at all," said Luke Gascho, a member of Waterford Mennonite Church who helped the church connect with The Coalition to Dismantle the Doctrine of Discovery. Anabaptist Climate group names executive director

Douglas Day Kaufman began serving July 1 as executive director of the Anabaptist Climate Collaborative (ACC). He previously was ACC's director of pastoral ecology. In that role since 2018, he led pastoral and leadership retreats on climate change, helping congregations reduce their carbon footprint and engage in climate action. Kaufman became passionate about creation care while serving as a pastor of Benton Mennonite Church in Goshen, Ind. He discovered pollutants compromise the Elkhart River, a frequent baptismal location. His commitment to theologically grounded climate justice advocacy deepened as he completed a master's degree in theology and ecology at the University of Toronto and became trained as an Indiana Master Naturalist. "Addressing climate justice is the critical issue of our time, and I am proud of the work we have done first as the Center for Sustainable Climate Solutions and now Anabaptist Climate Collaborative," he said. "I am pleased to be able to help sustain and grow the organization as we become both independent and more collaborative." Read the Anabaptist World article here.



Train trip to mark Canada migration

One hundred years ago, the first of 21,000 Mennonites who left the Soviet Union boarded a train in Quebec City for new lives across Canada. Some of their descendants and others will replicate that journey when they board a train July 6 for a trip that will conclude in British Columbia as part of "Memories of Migration: Russlaender (Russian Mennonites) Tour 100." The cross-country tour is the brainchild of Ingrid Riesen Moehlmann. She came up with the idea when her father made a last request to her before he died to find a way to celebrate the arrival in Canada of Mennonites who experienced civil war, famine and disease in revolutionary Ukraine and Russia. "That story was an all-consuming passion for him," she said. "He was afraid it was being lost and forgotten." Participants will re-enact the historic migration of the thousands of Mennonites who left communities decimated by violence and tragedy in the Soviet Union to come to Canada between 1923 and 1930. The tour will include stops in Montreal, Kitchener, Winnipeg, Saskatoon, Rosthern and Edmonton before ending July 25 in Abbotsford, B.C. It is organized by the Mennonite Historical Society of Canada, together with Canadian Mennonite scholars and heritage enthusiasts. In addition to lectures and music along the way, the tour will include a gala sponsored by the Canadian Pacific Kansas City Railway in Montreal and tours of Mennonite-related sites along the way. The Rev. Amos Brown, vice chair of California's reparations task force, calls for action



The Rev. Amos C. Brown is a civil rights veteran and onetime student of the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. Brown is the namesake of a fellowship that has brought young adults to Ghana with leaders of the NAACP and The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints to learn the history of slavery. Now, the 82-year-old senior pastor of San Francisco's Third Baptist Church is vice chair of California's Task Force to Study and Develop Reparation Proposals for African Americans, which released its final report on June 29. "If anyone says 'Y'all don't deserve nothing. Stop complaining. Pull yourself up by your bootstraps," he said, "I contend they are heartless and they don't know anything about that dictum that's found in all of the world religions. What is that dictum?: Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." Brown, Third Baptist's senior pastor since 1976, is particularly proud that his historic church affiliated with the National Baptist Convention, USA, and the American Baptist Churches USA, was the site of the first in-person public meeting of the task force. At its most recent meeting, held in Oakland, the task force recommended monetary compensation be part of the reparations that state officials consider when they receive the task force's final report. CREATION CARE Peace and Justice Ministries & MCCN

Mennonite Church USA (MC USA) Executive Board is strengthening its ongoing commitment to creation care and climate justice by expanding its Peace & Justice ministries to include Mennonite Creation Care Network (MCCN). The transition is the result of a mutual agreement with Everence®, an agency of MC USA that has previously provided administrative services for MCCN and continues to provide financial support, and Merry Lea Environmental Learning Center of Goshen College, which has managed the daily operations since its formation in 2005.
