

Launching Women's Ministry at MCN



Saturday, September 23 at 10 am

Community Life Commission (CLC) has developed a plan for moving forward with a Women's Ministry based on results of the questionnaire that was completed in the spring. The results showed that many women in the church are interested in participating in such a ministry and that there are many different interests to explore.

The Commission has planned for a Launching of Women's Ministry event to be held on Saturday, September 23 at 10:00 am at the church. Jane Roeschley, MACF Threshold Ministries – Spiritual Direction, Retreat, Pilgrimage, will be presenting a talk entitled Women's Wisdom Across the Seasons. This talk will draw upon Celtic places and stories as we think about women's wisdom in the seasons of women's lives, and how sharing our wisdom strengthens and enriches our community with one another.

Following Jane's presentation, CLC will share more about the initial plan for Women's Ministry. Starting out, there will be two kinds of groups meeting. One is for Bible/book study and the other is for Sewing and more.

This coming Sunday, the Journey Groups (Adult Christian Education classes) will begin meeting again after Worship. As a component of Women's Ministry, a women's Bible/book study will be offered for women interested in using the book, *Brave and Beloved: A Bible Study for Women Exploring the Wisdom and Diversity of Women in the Bible* by Meredith Storrs. This book looks at the way God weaves the lives of 30 women in Scripture into the redemption story. Reviewers said it is not a "flowers and teacups" Bible study of women, but, using culture and historical context, gives a full picture of these very human women beyond a one-dimensional view. 

Administration Commission Updates

- Head Start has been slow to communicate with us about updates. They have an interim director and don't know when they will be starting classes in our building.
- We had a major water leak in the Head Start hallway last week. It took several tries to figure out what caused the problem. At first, we thought it was a plumbing problem. It was not. It was a condensation drainpipe from one of our furnaces; it cracked and drained gallons into the hallway. The pipe has been replaced.
- Lauren Satchwell and Mary Dyck attended a program on "Protecting Places of Worship Forum" sponsored by the Department of Justice. They learned about a free evaluation that we can request from the US Department of Homeland Security. We've arranged to have the evaluation completed in September. They also shared about a grant application to update some items, if need be.
- There have been requests for picnic tables by the playground for families to use for picnics in the summer. We are working to make this happen.



Construire la paix après un désastre

Below is an excerpt from an article by Mennonite World Conference.

«Ton manuel a fonctionné!» a déclaré Darnell Barkman à son ancienne professeure, Lisa Schirch, après que les eaux aient envahi sa région en novembre 2021. Le pasteur de l'église mennonite unie de Yarrow, en Colombie-Britannique (Canada), a fait appel à toute sa formation sur la construction de la paix pour coordonner les interventions en cas de catastrophe. Au cours des dernières décennies, les plus pauvres de l'Église mondiale ont été directement touchés par le changement climatique, apprennent ses étudiants. «Aujourd'hui, le changement climatique arrive à notre porte, en Amérique du Nord. Notre argent et nos ressources ne sont clairement pas suffisantes pour nous protéger des catastrophes», déclare Darnell Barkman. Mais lorsque la tempête a touché ses voisins, la formation de Darnell Barkman sur la planification de la construction de la paix et l'évaluation des conflits lui a permis de coordonner une réponse communautaire interéglises. Les étapes d'une intervention en cas de catastrophe sont similaires à celles lors de conflits armés, explique Darnell Barkman. Il faut d'abord un cessez-le-feu, puis évaluer la situation, nettoyer les dégâts et reconstruire. Lire la suite.

"Your textbook worked!" Darnell Barkman told his former professor Lisa Schirch after floodwaters overcame his region in November 2021. The pastor at Yarrow United Mennonite Church in B.C., Canada, implemented all his peacebuilding training to coordinate disaster response. For the last several decades, the poorest parts of the global church have been impacted by climate change directly, her students learn. "Now, climate change is coming to our front door in North America. Our money and resources are clearly not enough to protect us from disaster," Darnell Barkman says. But when the storm affected his neighbours, Darnell Barkman's training in peacebuilding planning and conflict assessment equipped him to coordinate an inter-church community response. Disaster response follows similar steps to armed conflict, Darnell Barkman explains. First, you need a ceasefire, then you do an assessment, clean up the mess, and rebuild. "Bibles for China" Scam

Bibles for China scam defrauds Anabaptist communities of more than \$30 million.

Federal prosecutors have issued an arrest warrant for Jason Gerald Shenk, 45, for allegedly defrauding conservative Anabaptist individuals and groups of more than \$33 million in donations meant to send Bibles and other Christian literature to China. The U.S. Department of Justice alleges Shenk obtained about \$22 million from one charitable organization and \$10 million from another from 2010 to 2019 for printing and distributing the materials. Instead, court documents unsealed Aug. 1 allege Shenk used the funds for sports gambling, gold and gemstones, life insurance policies in various names, stock purchases, funds for his family farm, credit cards and a real estate development in Chile. Department of Justice public affairs officer Barry Paschal confirmed "a large number of the individual donors were from the Amish and Mennonite community" in Ohio, Pennsylvania, North Carolina and Ontario. Weston Showalter, a spokesperson for Christian Aid Ministries, confirmed on Aug. 4 the organization is one of the two charities specified in the indictment. Based in Berlin, Ohio, CAM is a mission and relief organization supported by Amish and conservative Mennonite groups. **Read the rest of Tim Huber's article for the** *Anabaptist World* here.

MC USA Archives



Below is the of Anicka Fast's article for Mennonite Mission Network about the work she has done in Mennonite Church USA's archives. Fast, who ministers through Mennonite Central Committee, Mennonite Mission Network, and Mennonite World Conference, finds joy, sheds tears and dreams of intercontinental, interchurch research in the Mennonite Church USA Archives.

During a busy two-week trip to the United States, I managed to reserve a day and a half to spend some time in the Mennonite Church-USA Archives in Elkhart, Indiana. I planned to consult the records of Africa Inter-Mennonite Mission's (AIMM) work in the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC). I became familiar with this collection while doing my doctoral dissertation. The collection contains 139 linear feet of materials that were created between 1905 and the early 2000s. Between 2016 and 2020, I had spent days on four separate occasions frantically scanning these documents for my dissertation research. I had scanned more than what was relevant to my own research, hoping that the scans would one day be useful for Congolese Mennonite historians, and indeed I have had opportunities to share those scans with researchers in DRC. This visit, however, was different. This time, I was coming to look for photos of seven Congolese Mennonite men and women whose biographies will be featured, along with nine others', in an upcoming book to be published in Langham's Global Perspectives Series. These seven people had been members of the Communauté mennonite au Congo (Mennonite Church of Congo, CMCo) or the Communauté évangélique mennonite (Evangelical Mennonite Church, CEM), two church communities that were closely associated with the work of the Congo Inland Mission, founded in 1911 and later renamed Africa Inter-Mennonite Mission. Participants from a history-writing workshop we hosted in DRC in March were now busy researching and writing these biographies, and as one of the course instructors, I had promised to look for photos, and perhaps other archival materials, to assist in their research.
