On a weekly basis since June 1, there have been over 20 different individuals who have gathered in the MRC Community

Gerry Schrock has provided excellent leadership for this group and spent many additional hours on her own, both planning and assembling comforter tops. Other tops have been made by individuals working on them in their own homes, some have been donated by

friends of our church and MCC has provided some.

Participation in the Comforter Bash will go a long way in helping MCC in meeting its goal of 45,000 blankets, for the Ukraine and other areas of need, by the end of 2023. It is our goal to complete 50 comforters to help meet this larger goal. Over 50 women, men, and children are registered to participate in the two-day event. We can accommodate more volunteers even though the established deadline for registering is past. Financial donations to this project are also encouraged and will help with the expenses incurred.

From Your Vision Jean



Vision Team shared with the congregation in July that we feel it is time to transition to a 'permanent' pastoral team to meet the needs of our church. We invited the congregation to pray about this as we discern together how it will take place. Vision Team has been praying, thinking, and talking about this. Here is a summary of where we find ourselves now.

How much pastoral time does Vision Team think we need?

- One full-time (FT) person and three 1/4-time equivalents. This is our current arrangement, and it works well.
- This would allow the Pastoral Team to continue to provide the leadership and support needed by the congregation.

Why does the Vision Team feel we need this now?

- The congregation and the Vision Team cannot expect the current Pastoral Team to continue indefinitely.
- We need to plan now for the church's 2024 Pastoral Team expenses.

Who would be on the Pastoral Team?

• Pastor Kevin (FT), two 1/4-time individuals added to the staff, and another 1/4-time equivalent of unpaid lay coverage of the Team's responsibilities.

How would this affect the church's spending plan?

• Ending the service of our interim pastors and hiring two 1/4-time pastors would lead to an increase of about 6% (\$24,000) in the congregation's total spending plan if all other expenses remained the same.

How will we do this?

- All members of the Pastoral Team Search Committee (PTSC) that brought Pastor Kevin to us have agreed to continue to serve. (Thank you!)
- Doug Luginbill, Central District Conference minister, will facilitate this process.
- Vision Team, with input from the PTSC and the Pastoral Team, is developing a plan for hiring additional pastoral staff.
- Vision Team and the PTSC invite the congregation to meet with them on September 24 (following the Christian education hour) to hear more, ask questions, and offer input.

Peace & Justice Statements on Christian Nationalism, pt 2

Nationalism, and more specifically Christian Nationalism, are difficult terms to assign a hard definition to. Further, each contains positive elements but when carried to extremes are harmful, if not deadly, to individuals, groups, society and the nations themselves.

Some sociologists define Christian Nationalism as a blending of the previously separate Christian and American identities, thus blurring their distinctions. This blurring results in a cultural framework which views the two as closely related and seeks to enhance and preserve their union.

The culture of 'I am a Christian, therefore I am an American patriot' and the defense thereof is the basis of believing that the nation's identity is inseparable from its Christian heritage. As the nation around us changes because of social, political, geo-political, environmental, and migration issues, the Christian Nationalist will seek to maintain the status quo of the privileged state of the nation.

Christian nationalism is a political ideology and cultural framework that claims America was founded to be a "Christian nation" where Christians should receive special legal treatment not available to non-Christians. This merges the previously separate Christian and American identities, proclaiming that the only true Americans are the country's Christians (and a specific subset of conservative Christians, at that). This means that Christian nationalism is anti-Semitic and Islamophobic, and poses a threat to the religious freedom of America's Jews, Muslims, Indigenous peoples, mainline Protestant Christians, and more.

In her previous position, Stoltzfus Detweiler served as executive director for Hungry World Farm, Tiskilwa, Illinois, a non-profit organization that focuses on educating, inspiring and connecting people around ideas of food, agriculture and caring for the earth. Prayer-rising for Oak Flat

Save the date and start organizing to confront, through prayer, the forces of destruction facing Oak Flat with Community Peacemaker Teams (CPT).

The sacred land of Oak Flat is being threatened with destruction by the Resolution Copper mine. From the beginning, Apache Stronghold has grounded their resistance to Resolution Copper in the strength of their spiritual relationship with the land. Oak Flat is sacred and the presence of the holy has been attended by the Apache since time immemorial. Their resistance to systems of racism, capitalism, ecocide, and colonialism are fueled by prayer and ritual. Apache Stronghold asks people of all faiths and spiritualities to join them in this struggle. On 4 November 2023, Apache Stronghold will amplify these intercessions into a prayer-rising for the preservation of Oak Flat. Indigenous people will gather at Oak Flat to pray according to their ways. People of all faiths will join Apache Stronghold through prayer to confront the forces of destruction brought by Resolution Copper. Will you come to pray at Oak Flat on 4 November? Prepare yourself in prayer and plan your own transportation to this sacred site located an hour east of Phoenix, Arizona. 
MCC Peace & Justice: Call to Action

From Mennonite Central Committee

Background: According to the World Food Program, as many as 783 million persons are unsure of where their next meal is coming from, and more than 750,000 are facing famine-like conditions. The global hunger crisis is deepening. Every five years, the United States government reauthorizes the Farm Bill, a piece of legislation designed to address both domestic and international food needs. An important part of the Farm Bill is the Food for Peace program, which addresses the root causes of global food insecurity and malnutrition and helps to build resilience in vulnerable communities. Another important tool to reduce hunger is the flexible cargo preference, which enables faster and more cost-effective delivery of life-saving food assistance. Finally, U.S. food assistance policies should support sustainable local food systems.

Faith reflection: Scripture admonishes us to "satisfy the needs of the afflicted, then your light shall rise in the darkness and your gloom be like the noonday" Isaiah 58:10 (NRSVA).

Action: Ask Congress to include strong funding for the Food for Peace program in the 2023 Farm Bill. **Find a template message and an easy way to send it here.**
