In preparation, we are all encouraged to engage in self-examination of both our relationships with God, and with others. Carle Mobile Health Clinic



The Mennonite Church of Normal is excited to partner with the Carle Mobile Health Clinic! You may have seen this rolling unit parked at MCN on a Tuesday. They are currently scheduled twice a month on Tuesday's to be at MCN. The Carle Mobile Health Clinic takes walk-in's as well as being a location for full-service affordable medical care for the entire family. Individuals of all ages are welcome to obtain services on the van. Patients will not have any out-of-pocket costs and can have private insurance, no insurance or Medicaid. The staff works with individuals to connect them to a medical home if they don't have one and will sign people up for Medicaid if needed. They offer lab testing, wellness care and physicals, treatment of acute illness, chronic condition management and education. There is also a social worker on the van that does a screening to refer people to community resources. Children can also receive school and sports physicals as well as immunizations on the van. Flu shots and booster shots will also be available.

Carle has partnered with the Tinerven Foundation and OSF St. Joseph Medical Center to have food boxes available for distribution and provide Smart Meals and nutrition information. The McLean County Health Department will also provide health and diabetes prevention information.





Stuckey Amish Presentation

Saturday, October 14, 2023 at 10:00 a.m. at the Mennonite Heritage Center

About a century ago, Bishop Joseph Stuckey was the leader of a group of congregations in Central IL known as the Stuckey Amish. These congregations included Danvers, East White Oak, Meadows, Flanagan, Bloomington, Boynton, Washington, Congerville (now Rock Creek) and possibly others. After Rev. Stuckey's death, they eventually joined the General Conference Mennonites, now part of the Mennonite Church-USA. Some of these congregations no longer exist or no longer identify as Mennonite, but your congregation may include persons and their descendants who were once part of the "Stuckey churches" of Central IL. A direct lineal descendent of Bishop Stuckey, Dr. John Stuckey of the Washington DC area, has researched Bishop Stuckey and this movement in detailed fashion. He will be the main speaker at the Fall Meeting of the Illinois Mennonite Historical and Genealogical Society (IMHGS) on Saturday, October 14, 2023 at 10:00 a.m. at the Mennonite Heritage Center between Metamora and Germantown Hills on the south side of Illinois Route 116 east of Peoria (look for the big red barn). A discussion period and fellowship lunch will follow. Admission is free. Please announce, promote and publicize this event which is part of a series as the 500th anniversary of the Anabaptist movement approaches. It is our intent to record the meeting and make it available for streaming AFTER the meeting at the Facebook page of the Illinois Mennonite Heritage Center. Mennonite Education Agency (MEA) is launching a new scholarship for BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, and People of Color) students within Mennonite Church USA (MC USA). The purpose of the scholarship is to help BIPOC students, who are active in MC USA congregations, attend a Mennonite college, university, or seminary. This is a \$4,000 scholarship. Each MEA-approved Mennonite institution may receive one scholarship in the 2023-24 academic year. As funds increase, so will the number of scholarships available. Le témoignage à Hong Kong et au-delà

Les membres de l'église se réunissent dans l'auditorium d'une école et entonnent des chants de louange en mandarin et en cantonais (la langue maternelle de la plupart des habitants de Hong Kong). Bien que de nombreuses églises de la région aient abandonné les cultes en ligne à mesure que les restrictions liées à la pandémie s'atténuaient, l'église mennonite Agape de Sha Tin, à Hong Kong, continue d'enregistrer et de diffuser ses cultes sur Facebook. «Certains de nos membres ont déménagé à l'étranger ces dernières années. Parfois, ils se joignent à nos cultes du dimanche pour pouvoir prier dans leur propre langue, et ils se joignent également à notre étude biblique sur Zoom», explique Esther Choi, déléguée de Hong Kong au Sommet Mondial de la Jeunesse (GYS). Le vieillissement de la population de Hong Kong affecte aussi l'Église: certains membres ne sont plus en mesure de venir à l'église. «Rendre nos cultes accessibles à ces personnes est notre façon de leur faire savoir que nous nous souvenons d'eux et que nous prions pour eux», dit Jeremiah Choi, pasteur de l'assemblée et représentant régional de la CMM pour l'Asie du Nord-Est. «Sans faire la moindre différence entre elles et nous», dit le pasteur de la jeunesse Leung Tak Kwan, prédicateur du jour, en citant Actes 15/9. Si le passage conseille de ne pas faire de discrimination à l'égard des nations païennes (qui ont suivi le Christ, mais n'ont pas suivi les traditions juives), le même conseil s'applique à l'égard des personnes qui sont trop malades pour se rendre à l'église par les transports publics, qui sont à l'hôpital ou qui s'ennuient tout simplement de leurs amis après avoir quitté Hong Kong. Indépendamment du lieu ou des incapacités physiques, la Parole de Dieu et la communion fraternelle se poursuivent grâce aux cultes en mode virtuel. Lire la suite.

Uniting people through technology



Church members gather in a school auditorium, singing worship songs in both Cantonese (the mother tongue for most people in Hong Kong) and Mandarin. While many churches in the region abandoned online services as pandemic restrictions eased, Agape Mennonite Church in Sha Tin, Hong Kong, continues to record and stream their services on Facebook. Some of our members have moved overseas in recent years. "Sometimes they join our Sunday services so they could worship in their own language, and they join our Zoom Bible study too," says Esther Choi, Global Youth Summit delegate from Hong Kong. As the population of Hong Kong ages, the church is also affected: some church members are not physically able to come to church. "Making our worship services available to them is our way to let them know that we remember them and are praying for them," says Jeremiah Choi, the congregation's pastor and Mennonite World Conference regional representative for Northeast Asia. "He made no distinction between us and them," says youth pastor Leung Tak Kwan, preacher of the day, quoting Acts 15:9. While the passage counsels not to discriminate against the Gentiles (who have received Christ but not followed the Jewish traditions), the same advice pertains to who are those too ill to take public transport to church, are in hospital or simply miss their friends after leaving Hong Kong. Regardless of location or physical challenges, with virtual services, the Word of God and the fellowship continue. **Read more here.**



Anapatist Community Bible Advisory Group

Nearly 600 study groups sent in some 1,600 pages of Bible study notes for consideration in the forthcoming Anabaptist Community Bible. In addition, Bible scholars and pastors wrote study notes to accompany each book of the Bible, and historians added biblical reflections from early Anabaptists. These three types of notes—community reflections from study groups, Anabaptist history notes from historians, and biblical commentary from scholars and pastors—will appear in the margins of the forthcoming Anabaptist Community Bible. Over an intense three-day meeting this past weekend, the Anabaptism at 500 advisory group was able to work through notes from the entire Bible. "It was a genuine review together, as we each brought our best wisdom to the text," said John D. Roth, Anabaptism at 500 project director. "The goal was not to eliminate the theological diversity in the notes but rather to ensure that many eyes reviewed the commentary, to eliminate redundancy, and to pare back to fit into the allotted space. It was a joy to work with such a gifted and committed group." Read more about their group review here.
