

A student organization on ISU campus is seeking to help all those dealing with monthly periods on-campus and we can help! The Period. student chapter is part of a larger organization called Period. We strive to do this through service, education, and advocacy, such as distributing period products to those in need, educating menstruators and allies about information surrounding menstruation equity, and advocating for systematic change. We focus on using gender neutral language to include all people who menstruate."

IT'S GOOD TO BE BACK! We've been back in full swing for over a month now, and it is so exciting to see the kids ready to learn more about Jesus, sing and play together. We recognize there are new faces, as well as some old faces that are attending more regularly now. As such, we wanted to share some updates and frequently asked questions!

- Who is responsible for Christian Education at MCN? The Christian Education Committee acts as a subcommittee to the Discipling Commission.
- What do we believe? At Mennonite Church of Normal we believe children are a gift from God. We want every child to love the Lord with all his or her heart, soul, mind, and strength. We want them to boldly proclaim that they are children of God and know that they are fearfully and wonderfully made by God. We are intentional about teaching God's amazing love for them in Jesus. We do this through children's time during the worship service, our Sunday school classes, children's choirs and special events. Our teachers are passionate about sharing the good news of Jesus and helping children establish a solid, biblical foundation of truth on which they can build their lives. We want them to:
 - become Jesus' disciples and recognize that Jesus is the same yesterday, today and forever.
 - understand that worship is not just about singing loud, it is living loud for our great God.
 - be the hands and feet of Jesus by shining their light brightly into the world and share the good news of Jesus with others.
- How are the classes and nurseries structured? We've established a fun place to learn about Jesus where your child's growth in that relationship is encouraged and nurtured. We have a kid-safe classroom policy, and all classes and nurseries are staffed by individuals who have been screened and approved for work with children. Parental participation is ALWAYS welcome!
 - Infant nursery (ages newborn-24 mo.): Available for use by parents during worship and staffed by volunteers during Adult Sunday school beginning at 10:45 AM. Note: This is a change for Fall 2023. There will not be volunteers during worship and welcome parental feedback.
 - Preschool nursery (ages 3-7): Available during worship and staffed by volunteers immediately following children's time during service. Parents are welcome to stay with their child or pop in and out as needed.
 - Gather 'Round Sing-A-Long: Immediately following service (10:45-11 AM), children ages 3 through 4th grade meet for a sing-a-long. This is a fun time for the children where they praise God together through song. After singing, the kids head to their Sunday school classrooms.

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- o Sunday school classrooms: We currently have two classes that run from 11-11:45 AM. Our Pre-K-1st (starting at age 3) grade class is co-taught by Carrie Stalter and Holly Zehr. And our 2nd-4th grade class is taught by Spring Neely. Occasionally, we will merge the classes for outdoor activities, crafts, and library time.
- What curriculum is being used? Our dynamic, Bible-based curriculum, Shine: Living in God's Light, is deeply rooted in Scripture and Anabaptist principles. It is copublished by Brethren Press, publishing ministry of the Church of the Brethren, and MennoMedia, publishing ministry of Mennonite Church USA and Mennonite Church Canada. Shine...
 - calls children to experience the transforming power of God's love and shine God's light in the world;
 - nurtures trust in God and invites children to follow Jesus;
 - encourages imaginative, interactive biblical storytelling;
 - explores the meaning of the Bible within the gathered community;
 - cultivates the inner life of the Spirit through spiritual practices;
 - expresses faith through lives of compassionate peacemaking and service.
- When are Family Fun Nights held? We have been partnering with the Community Life Commission to host a Family Fun Night each Spring and Fall. These nights are an opportunity to come together and share a meal, sing together, and participate in fun games and activities. Mark your calendars! We have an upcoming Family Fun Night, including pumpkin carving and painting, will be held October 27th. All ages are welcome! Look to the midweek for more details soon!
- How to get involved? We always need volunteers willing to help in the nurseries following a background screening. We also need assistance planning and volunteers for Family Fun Night. And, if you are interested in joining the CE subcommittee, we would encourage you to let us know. Please contact Holly Zehr, Carrie Stalter, or Spring Neely to get involved.



Stuckey Amish Presentation

THIS Saturday, October 14, 2023 at 10:00 a.m. at the Mennonite Heritage Center

About a century ago, Bishop Joseph Stuckey was the leader of a group of congregations in Central IL known as the Stuckey Amish. These congregations included Danvers, East White Oak, Meadows, Flanagan, Bloomington, Boynton, Washington, Congerville (now Rock Creek) and possibly others. After Rev. Stuckey's death, they eventually joined the General Conference Mennonites, now part of the Mennonite Church-USA. Some of these congregations no longer exist or no longer identify as Mennonite, but your congregation may include persons and their descendants who were once part of the "Stuckey churches" of Central IL. A direct lineal descendent of Bishop Stuckey, Dr. John Stuckey of the Washington DC area, has researched Bishop Stuckey and this movement in detailed fashion. He will be the main speaker at the Fall Meeting of the Illinois Mennonite Historical and Genealogical Society (IMHGS) on Saturday, October 14, 2023 at 10:00 a.m. at the Mennonite Heritage Center between Metamora and Germantown Hills on the south side of Illinois Route 116 east of Peoria (look for the big red barn). A discussion period and fellowship lunch will follow. Admission is free. This event is part of a series as the 500th anniversary of the Anabaptist movement approaches. It is our intent to record the meeting and make it available for streaming AFTER the meeting at the Facebook page of the Illinois Mennonite Heritage Center. War in the Holy Land - a MennoPIN Statement

Below is a statement from MennoPIN (Mennonite Palestine-Israel Network) on the recent war in the Holy Land. Learn more about MennoPIN here.

As people committed to nonviolence, MennoPIN strongly condemns the current violence carried out both by Hamas and by the Israeli military. MennoPIN urges an immediate ceasefire between Hamas and Israel and calls on the US and the wider international community to support a diplomatic solution to the situation at hand.

MennoPIN likewise recognizes that the Hamas attack was not unprovoked. For decades the people of Palestine have been oppressed by the violence and occupation of apartheid Israel against them with home demolitions, child detentions, separation walls, settler colonialism and violence, seizures of land and controls over water and food supplies. And Gaza has been an open air prison where Israel controls how much water, electricity and food Gazans can have. The extreme measures taken by the recent Netanyahu ultra-right government have made life increasingly hostile for Palestinians. The praxis of U.S. one-sided and national interest driven diplomacy and unwillingness to effectively address the apartheid reality have contributed deeply to these extreme measures. Additionally, the Biden administration's attempts to normalize diplomatic relations between Saudi Arabia and Israel have become the final straw for the militant Palestinian resistance. Ultimately, hopelessness breeds violence.

We pray for leadership that has the courage to address the problems, injustices and racism that perpetuates this violence. We especially pray for wisdom and restraint between Hamas and the Israeli government.

Dismartle the Israeli occupation of Palestine

Below is a statement from Community Peacemaker Teams on Israel's recent declaration of war.

On Saturday, 7 October, in a surprise attack, Hamas fighters broke through the prison walls of Gaza via air, land, and sea. This unprecedented resistance is the result of Israel's violent occupation of Palestine and the continuous human rights abuses that the Israeli military carries out against Palestinians in Gaza and the West Bank. This year alone, the Israeli occupation has killed 227 Palestinians, including 47 children. In mainstream media, the predominant narrative of Israel's occupation of Palestine has—for decades—been deliberately constructed on the pillars of colonial, imperial and racist discourse. The terms "terrorism" and "self-defence" are permeated with bias and weaponized to tell one story. CPT demands media outlets use journalistic integrity to appropriately address the historical events leading up to today's reality and to question state narratives. We also challenge everyone consuming the current media storm to educate yourself, be critical of your sources, and understand the power structures at play that have historically silenced Palestinian voices. A large majority of the international community is calling for Hamas' adherence to international law. CPT urges these governments to examine their hypocrisy of condemning Palestinian resistance to occupation while at the same time refusing to hold Israel accountable for the blatant flouting of international law through 75 years of occupation, apartheid, and ethnic cleansing. International human rights and humanitarian laws are not conditional. Violence is cyclical. As long as the Israeli occupation exists, Palestinian resistance will continue. A generation of Palestinians have lived their whole lives under military occupation with the constant threat of surveillance, detention, arrest, and murder while the United States funds Israel. CPT calls on the US government to stop the cycle: refrain from sending military ships and aircraft and stop the yearly \$3 billion in military aid which continues to perpetuate the Israeli occupation and apartheid in Palestine. Israel has declared a 'state of war.' The CPT Palestine team in al Khalil/Hebron is under a military-enforced curfew where the Old City is completely closed off and any movement in the city is threatened with gunshots. Israeli forces have shuttered all 260 checkpoints in the West Bank and killed 17 people, seven of whom are residents of the al Khalil/Hebron governorate. Israel has also ordered a complete siege of Gaza, cutting off water and electricity and prohibiting the entrance of fuel and food. Almost 600 people have been killed by Israeli bombardments, including 91 children, and over 120,000 people displaced. This Israeli declaration of war does not change anything for Palestinians. Israel's response over the last few days is being portrayed as retaliation against Hamas for the deaths and kidnappings of Israeli military and citizens, but Palestinians have been living this war for 75 years. CPT works towards collective liberation, and a society where the values of dignity, equality and peace are upheld and shared by all people. CPT continues to accompany our partners in nonviolent resistance and advocate that the safety of Palestinians and Israelis can only be achieved through complete dismantling of the Israeli occupation of Palestine. We demand a solution that includes equality not apartheid, demilitarization not occupation, and decolonization and freedom for all. p. 13 of 16

Sculpture for Mennonite Church USA Unveiled



Mennonite Church USA arranged for a sculpture designed and built by Emma Zuercher, a 2023 graduate of Goshen College from Apple Creek, Ohio, under the mentorship of John Mishler, sculptor and Goshen College associate professor of art. The sculpture was installed at the Mennonite Church USA offices building at 3145 Benham Avenue, Elkhart, IN. As Goshen College Maple Scholars, Zuercher and 17 other awarded students spent eight weeks focusing on a particular area of research alongside a professor who serves as both supervisor and colleague. Zuercher was chosen as the artist for this project. The 11-foot sculpture was built with aluminum from OmniSource Corporation, a processor and distributor of scrap and secondary metals. Zuercher describes the design as reminiscent of the burning bush and the pillar of fire in the Bible's Book of Exodus. She painted the piece with 10 colors to create complex layering resembling fire and motion. The continuity of color and repeating patterns is intended to draw the eye up. She also intentionally rubbed the paint off in places. Read the full article by Jane Morrow for Mennonite Mission Network here.
