Book Review: Amplifying our Witness



Below is an excerpt from Cindy Warner Baker's review of the book Amplifying Our Witness: Giving Voice to Adolescents with Developmental Disabilities by Benjamin T. Connor.

In the introductory pages of Amplifying Our Witness: Giving Voice to Adolescents with Developmental Disabilities, Benjamin Conner writes: "This book is about the witness of the church and how a plurality of voices and perspectives enhances our understanding of God and our community's witness to that God." The premise of the book and Conner's work as a youth minister is that practicecentered ministry—in which friendships can develop—witnesses to the love and character of Christ with those within the church community and those beyond. Conner is a theologian, and his writing style reflects this. Though not as dense as many books on theology, I found some parts to be a bit challenging. Fortunately, these relatively short sections are offset by the fact that Conner's writing style is engaging and reflects his passion for youth ministry. The book also includes stories of individual youth, which add to the power and readability of the book. As a person involved in youth ministry, I found Amplifying Our Witness helpful and encouraging. It affirms the value of engaging youth in the practices of Christian life together: shared prayer, meals, work and service, and learning. When we are the church together, we embody Christ for each other and those around us. When each unique individual's voice is welcomed, we enrich the witness of the whole. The rule of ayri: reciprocal relationship

In Kichwa, there is a word, ayni, that describes the rule and practice of interdependence. "One does not exist unless the community exists," says Julian Guamán. In the Kichwa worldview, that community includes all of creation, not just humans. Ayni dictates that as members of the community, humans have a responsibility to be in reciprocal relationship with every other member, including plants, animals, water and soil. Ayni has practical implications for how Kichwas live their lives and is an important part of Julian Guamán's vision for the Anabaptist church. "In a world with climate change, with environmental crises, with an economic system that destroys nature and exploits people," Julian Guamán says, "we, as Mennonite churches, can be different, because Jesus Christ called us to love one another." **Read more here.**

Pilgrims confess historic wrongs

"I'm sorry that our mothers and fathers didn't see you when they settled here 100 years ago." With those words, Richard Thiessen, president of the Mennonite Historical Society of British Columbia, apologized on behalf of the society to representatives of the Semá:th First Nation (also known as the Sumas First Nation) near Abbotsford, B.C. The apology was made July 24 during a visit by participants in the "Memories of Migration: Russlaender Tour 100," which found people traveling across Canada by train to commemorate the arrival in Canada of Mennonites from the Soviet Union between 1923 and 1930. In the apology, which was made in a traditional long house at the First Nation, Thiessen acknowledged that some of the Mennonite immigrants who arrived in the Fraser Valley a century ago were able to take advantage of the draining of Sumas Lake. The lake, a resource and source of life for the First Nation for generations, was emptied by the British Columbia government to create fertile farmland for the new arrivals and others. Dalton Silver, chief of the Semá:th First Nation, accepted the apology and said it was "a step in the right direction." Noting that members of the Memories of Migration tour had "come a long way to be with us," he expressed thanks for how they took time to visit his community "and hear our stories." Silver added he hoped the apology would be the "start of a new journey of friendship and reconciliation together." The "Memories of Migration: Russlaender 100" cross-country train tour ran from July 6-24, starting in Quebec City and ending in British Columbia. The goal was to commemorate a century since the first of about 21,000 Mennonites escaped from the Soviet Union to find new homes in Canada.
