

Beyond Trauma Care



#### MCC Great Lakes partners learn to practice self-care.

Renee Dodson loves her role as director of employment services at Lexington Rescue Mission in Kentucky. But last year she started to feel the signs of burnout and knew she needed to make some changes. The launch of a new co-hort program from MCC Great Lakes came at just the right time. "Beyond Trauma Care: Care and Concern for Yourself" is bringing together MCC partners from throughout the Great Lakes region to practice self-care with the help of trauma healing facilitators, spiritual directors and lots of personal practice. For Dodson, the co-hort has been a lifeline. "2022 was an extremely hard year personally and then also professionally," she said. Three of her clients passed away due to overdose or suicide, and two other individuals she had placed in jobs had relapses and violent outbursts. "I kept thinking, 'What have I done wrong?' The exhaustion was really hard." The co-hort has been an answer to Dodson's prayers. "MCC has been able to bless my soul is the best way to put it," she says. "The topics and support that they're giving literally brought tears to my eyes. It's such a gift. I really appreciate how it has been a blessing to me personally - that MCC is doing this and investing in people's lives that are helping other people. It's been life changing." # Sacred endings, beginnings

Below is an excerpt from Jim Shenk's reflection on green burials for Mennonite Men. On March 29, we gathered for a graveside service to honor the life of a beloved Akron Mennonite Church member, Priscilla Ziegler. This would be unlike traditional interments. We waited expectantly for immediate family and Priscilla's shroud-wrapped body to arrive. Few of the 250 family and friends had experienced this kind of green burial and its intimacy. Upon arrival, guests were handed a short description of green burials, written by Priscilla's husband, Don. During the reading of a poem, family members gently lowered Priscilla's body into the 5-foot-deep earthen grave. While a violist played sacred tunes, we were invited to approach the grave and drop fresh-cut flowers and a note of blessing or memory. The flowers and notes thickly blanketed Priscilla's body. Participants were touched by this sacred graveside experience. Many said, "This is what I want." The possibility of green burials in the Akron Mennonite Church cemetery grew out of conversations inspired by end-of-life workshops more than a decade ago. Don Ziegler, Jerry Shank and Dick Leaman designed an eight-session curriculum and led discussion for the more than 100 people who participated. Upon learning more about what happens to the human body when embalmed and the consequences for the soil and groundwater, many participants considered more environmentally friendly alternatives. A few of us advocated for green burials as an option in the church cemetery. Some wished to be buried in a biodegradable container such as a shroud, seagrass basket or simple pine casket. Our cemetery trustees learned that in Pennsylvania there is no legal requirement for a vault. Such requirements are individual cemetery rules, primarily to prevent settling of earth for easier maintenance. It did not take long for the trustees, led by Glenn Weaver, to approve green burials without vaults. Our cemetery is only the second in Lancaster County to offer this option. Glenn and his wife, Anne, led the way by making their own plans for shroud burial. The original idea of a memorial garden shifted to a focus on a nature preserve connected to our cemetery space. It would be a place where life and death are experienced holistically, symbolized in the chrysalis and the butterfly. The congregation affirmed this refocusing. What began as a conversation about end-of-life has evolved into a life-giving initiative that offers opportunities for coming generations. I have felt welcomed here

Hispanic Heritage Month began in the United States in 1968 as a week-long observance and was extended to a full month in 1988. As a Hispanic Mennonite pastor, working for Mennonite Mission Network gives me the opportunity to practice my Mennonite faith freely, which is a gift that I cannot take for granted. The freedom that I have as a Mennonite pastor has given me the motivation to start missions that can help the Hispanic community. With a missional focus on being able to listen and see what God is already doing in our local community, I can see how Hispanic churches relate with Mission Network's mission and vision, which is to equip the church to walk with the local community. For example, Mission Network has been helping the Hispanic community by supporting local projects. One of these projects is Piedra Viva (Living Stone) Mennonite Church in Elkhart, Indiana. This church focuses on peace, reconciliation and community-building. Another project is the podcast "<u>Un Momento De Anabautismo</u>," which was created out of the desire to make a communication channel in which Hispanic people could have a space to share their thoughts. Finally, one of the things I have valued at Mission Network is the way we cultivate peace through looking for ways to counteract violence in Latin American countries. 
Advent at Home 2023

The event took place during the orientation week for the seminary's newest group of students. As one of Mary's former students at AMBS, Jackie noted that Mary's mentoring represented a turning point in her life as a scholar. Mary, in turn, was mentored by a previous generation of faculty members during her studies at AMBS. Indeed, this scholarship and mentoring are integral parts of a long tradition of communal Christian scholarship at the seminary.
