Peace & Justice in Israel and Palestine December 12th and December 19th

I attended a mass zoom meeting of Mennonite Action on Tuesday, November 28th where I was introduced to Mennonite Action along with 800 other Mennonites who attend over 200 Mennonite Churches in the US and Canada. Mennonite Action is a movement of Mennonites bonded by a common belief that we have a responsibility to use our voices as powerfully as possible for the cause of peace and justice. It is mobilizing fellow Mennonites and Anabaptists across the United States and Canada to use creative nonviolent actions to demand a ceasefire, end the US and western funded occupation of Palestine, and build for a lasting peace.

The Outreach Commission is asking members and friends of the Mennonite Church of Normal to join Mennonite Action's next mass meeting on December 12th (use this link to RSVP for the meeting – don't be afraid to click it and sign up). For the Beauty of the Earth



On Sunday, August 27, Community Mennonite Church of Lancaster (Pennsylvania) was delighted to hold a blessing for their new mural, "For the Beauty of the Earth," created by Salina Almanzar-Oree, in her delightfully collaborative process. The mural is on the corner of Grant and Concord Streets in Lancaster City. Salina Almanzar (sah-lee-nah ahllmun-czar) (she/her) is a Puerto Rican and Dominican artist, muralist and educator. Her personal art and scholarship examine the intersections of Latinidad and feminism, often working with family photos and memorabilia and historical documents. **Read more about the process and the meaning found in the mural here**.

Nenomination-Wide Study Results

Research shows clergywomen find their work meaningful, powerful and distinctly vulnerable.

Amy Zimbelman, conference minister for Mountain States Mennonite Conference, and Elizabeth Johnson, PhD candidate at Duke University, Durham, North Carolina, presented the results of the study during a seminar titled "Gathering Stories, Envisioning Equity: Toward a Church in Which Women in Ministry Thrive" at Mennonite Church USA's MennoCon23 convention. "I've taken the role of asking hard questions within a church that I love very deeply, in hopes that we can do life together with even more kindness and justice," said Zimbelman in her introduction. The study includes qualitative information gleaned from in-depth interviews with 28 current and former pastors and quantitative data from a nationally representative web survey that is still in progress. Zimbelman explained a few foundations of their research, including the "understanding that women can and should be pastors, because the founder of our faith, Jesus, called women to preach, respected women as equals, supported women, was financially supported by women, etc." This was punctuated by spontaneous applause from the audience. "This research focuses on a marginalized group: women in ministry," she said, noting that the study intentionally overrepresents lesbian, bisexual and BIPOC women compared to the denomination as a whole, because "having multiple marginalized identities compounds mistreatment." Johnson explained that MC USA remains a male-dominated workplace, in which women in ministry represent a little under 35% of total active licensed clergy. "Women are underrepresented in roles like lead pastor and overrepresented in the roles that often come with less power and prestige, like associate pastor," she added. Despite this, clergywomen report that they find their work powerful and meaningful. In fact, 95.4% of women who have responded to the survey said that they are moderately or very satisfied in their jobs. Yet, clergywomen's ministry is also vulnerable, as one interview participant explained: "As pastors, we have power, and as women, we are vulnerable." Another participant said, "[I] thought that being pastoral meant I just had to listen while we were bullied and harassed." Zimbelman pointed out that there are very few built-in boundaries to protect pastors. Zimbelman said, "The good news is that change is afoot in our denomination structurally, and I want to affirm that." She cited the ongoing work on the Prevention and Accountability Project and the creation of a new MC USA staff position for denominational minister of Church Safety. Thurch for Kids with anth, Joo

Below is an excerpt from Denise Reesor's article on Christian Education for Differing Brains. Along with working as a school phycologist, Denise is a field associate for Anabaptist Disabilities Network and attends East Goshen Mennonite church. It's the beginning of a new school year and teachers in my school building are pulling out all the stops to prepare for their incoming students. As I pop into classrooms, teachers point out their quiet rooms, flexible seating options, visual schedules, and class rules displayed around the room. With 11% of children in the United States diagnosed with attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD), teachers are adjusting their instructional methods to meet the needs of these learners. ADHD is a neurological condition that impairs a person's executive functioning skills - planning, organizing, focusing, and inhibition control. In children this may manifest as difficulty sitting still, blurting out, carelessness, failure to finish tasks, tantrums, and sometimes aggression. While schools are learning how to adapt their classrooms and teaching techniques to accommodate children with attentional deficits, often church remains problematic. Traditional Anabaptist values include peacefulness, perseverance, self-sacrifice, and self-control. Our worship services are often orderly, restrained, and sometimes liturgical. Our church's way of being is often in direct contrast to that of a child with ADHD's way of being. With this disconnect, how do we ensure our children with attentional difficulties feel love and belonging in our congregations? Even more foundational; how do we create a space where parents of children with ADHD even want to walk through the doors?
