

Focus on Youth Engagement

Mennonite Church USA's (MC USA) Constituency Leaders Council brainstormed strategies for strengthening youth engagement at its first meeting of the 2023-2025 biennium via Zoom on October 27, 2023. Forty-six leaders attended the four-hour meeting to worship, engage with Executive Board staff and discuss the challenges and opportunities of engaging young people. Moderator-elect Marty Lehman presided over the meeting, which was attended by leaders of area conferences, racial/ethnic groups, constituency groups and Executive Board staff. CLC representatives responded to questions related to youth engagement in Zoom breakout rooms and reported their findings to the larger gathering. Mennonite Women's Voices, 1972-2006



New Book

A new book on the experiences of women as leaders in the Mennonite Church from 1972 to 2006 is the latest volume to be released by the Institute of Mennonite Studies (IMS), the research and publishing wing of Anabaptist Mennonite Biblical Seminary (AMBS) in Elkhart, Indiana. *Proclaiming the Good News: Mennonite Women's Voices,* 1972–2006 contains stories of scholars, pastors, educators, administrators and other leaders who served in Mennonite congregations, organizations and institutions in the United States and Canada. Edited by Lois Y. Barrett, PhD, of Wichita, Kansas, and Dorothy Nickel Friesen, MDiv, of North Newton, Kansas, the book also explores how attitudes and practices regarding women in church leadership changed over time — drawing on survey data from 1972, 1989 and 2006. **Read more in an article published by Anabaptist Mennonite Biblical Seminary** here.

Delivering 300-year-old mail

Their descendants, especially those in Plain Anabaptist communities, don't want this legacy of mutual aid to be forgotten. Believing the story should be told in the words of the people who lived it, they decided Anabaptists today should have access to the letters, some more than 300 years old, that bear witness to their ancestors' generosity and faithfulness during persecution."

Eco-theology reconciles the church with nature

When human beings were created in Genesis, "This was the first mission of the human... to both enjoy but also to protect and take care of creation," says Danang Kristiawan. Danang Kristiawan is the pastor of the GITJ (Gereja Injili di Tanah Jawa) congregation in Jepara, Indonesia, and a lecturer at the Wiyata Wacana Theological Seminary in Pati. He laments that in many Mennonite churches in Indonesia today, environmental issues are seen as unrelated to faith and church. "The traditional Javanese view understands that there is a connection between humans and nature," he says in the video. "There are many local traditions or local wisdom that positively respect nature." But, Danang Kristiawan explains, when Dutch Mennonite missionaries arrived in Indonesia in the 19th century, they "were very critical of local cultural practices. As a result, the Christian community does not want to get involved with local rites and festivals for fear of syncretism." He wonders if Mennonites could begin holding each other accountable for harming the natural world. Read more here.

L'écothéologie réconcilie l'église avec la nature

Du temps de la création de l'être humain dans Genèse, «la première mission de l'être humain était... de profiter de la création, mais aussi de la protéger et d'en prendre soin», explique Danang Kristiawan. Danang Kristiawan est pasteur de l'assemblée GITJ (Gereja Injili di Tanah Jawa) à Jepara, en Indonésie, et chargé de cours au séminaire théologique Wiyata Wacana à Pati. Il déplore que dans de nombreuses églises mennonites d'Indonésie, les questions environnementales soient considérées comme n'ayant pas de rapport avec la foi et l'église. «La vision traditionnelle javanaise comprend qu'il existe un lien entre les humains et la nature », dit-il dans la vidéo. «Il existe de nombreuses traditions ou sagesses locales qui respectent positivement la nature.» Mais, explique Danang Kristiawan, lorsque les missionnaires mennonites néerlandais sont arrivés en Indonésie au 19e siècle, ils «étaient très critiques des pratiques culturelles locales. En conséquence, la communauté chrétienne ne veut pas s'impliquer dans les rites et les festivals locaux pour éviter toute idée de syncrétisme.» Il se demande si les mennonites ne pourraient pas commencer à se tenir mutuellement responsables des dommages causés à la nature.
