

Fraud is on the Rise

In today's connected world, discerning between genuine communication and potential threats to your financial security can be challenging. The rise of text notifications, emails and social media messages overwhelms us with information, both legitimate and fraudulent.

The Federal Trade Commission reports consumers lost \$8.8 billion due to fraud in 2022, the largest losses originating from social media and phone calls. Mail and identity theft remain concerning trends, with fraudsters leveraging personal information mined from social media to impersonate victims.

Fraudsters thrive on misinformation and urgency, playing on people's fears and desires. To protect yourself:

- Scrutinize communications for red flags like misspellings, mismatched information and unexpected texts.
- Examine links and attachments before opening, verifying their authenticity. An example of what to look for includes an email signature not matching the sending email.
- Beware of threats of "missed opportunities" and requests to send money quickly. Urgency is a very common tactic for fraudsters.
- Independently verify the information through online research or contact with trusted sources.

Additionally, keep the following in mind to protect your personal information:

- Never log into websites such as online banking when sharing your computer screen.
- Exercise caution when providing sensitive information over the phone. Hang up and call back if you need to.
- Avoid sharing personal identification via unsecure methods such as email.
- Review your credit information regularly at annualcreditreport.com.

With unending streams of digital information, it's crucial to exercise caution and patience when dealing with financial matters. If you want to learn more, read a recent report published by the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau at <u>consumerfinance.gov</u> and search for the "Money Smart for Older Adults" Resource Guide. Your financial wellbeing is worth the extra effort to protect it.


MC USA Women in Leadership launches new podcast season

MC USA signs letter to Congress, asking for strengthened funding for Victims of Crime Act grants

Mennonite Church USA (MC USA) has signed a letter to Congress, along with 62 faith-based organizations, asking for strengthened funding for <u>Victims of Crime Act (VOCA)</u> grants. VOCA grants are the primary source of federal funding for victim services, including programs supporting victims and survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, child abuse, stalking, human trafficking, elder abuse, community violence, homicide and other crimes. The letter was written by the <u>Interfaith Coalition Against Domestic And Sexual Violence</u>, an organization convened by Jewish Women International that works to advocate for national legislation and public policies that protect all people from domestic and sexual violence, with particular concern for women and families. I was horrified when, on the first page, I found myself reading aloud about a God of fire and brimstone, a vengeful, punishing God. Yikes! I no longer count the cost, but I keep the flame burning

Lately I have been thinking about counting the cost. I have spent two decades struggling for the liberation of Indigenous people, yet those I advocate for remain imperiled. Do I have what it takes to complete the task? Or is it too costly? In my Christian upbringing, I was taught that counting the cost means evaluating whether an endeavor is realistic before committing to it. This is the logic of rationality, of safety. Before I invest in a risky venture, I should calculate whether I can afford to lose what I invest. If the answer is yes — if I have the time/energy/money to spare — then I should go ahead. If the investment is too costly, I should demur. This is how my investment began: Twenty years ago, I was a young re-searcher on a risk-assessment team. An Indigenous elder asked for my help. Her entire rainforest community had been removed from their village in the South American country of -Suriname because an economic interest had received a land concession from the government. It is perfectly legal for an economic interest to eject a community from its home if doing so is financially advantageous to the landowner — in this case, the government.
