Reiman Family Laura Ingalls Wilder presentation: People of all ages welcome. Between 1870 and 1894, Laura Ingalls traversed the midwestern states of Wisconsin, Kansas, Minnesota, South Dakota, Iowa, and Missouri in a covered wagon. The Reimans covered most of that territory in eight days this past summer, pulling their cozy camper behind. Pam De Young Net Zero Energy Fund

Russell De Young established the Pam De Young Net Zero Energy Fund in memory of his wife, to help Mennonite churches install solar panels and move toward net-zero fossil fuel usage. "While I worked at NASA's Langley Research Center, in Hampton, Virginia, I was involved in researching aerosol — dust particles — pollution, using a lidar to transmit a pulsed laser beam into the atmosphere to detect aerosols and cloud heights and, then, calculate where the aerosol pollution was originating. The origin usually turned out to be the Washington, D.C., corroder, which was emitting pollution from the large number of vehicles located there. MC USA Executive Board focuses on reimagination and decisionmaking

The Mennonite Church USA (MC USA) Executive Board focused on healthy processes for denominational decision-making and reimagining organizational change at its meeting on August 22-25, 2024, in Greensboro, North Carolina, the site of the upcoming Follow Jesus '25 convention. Catherine Barnes, an affiliate faculty member of the Center for Justice and Peacebuilding at Eastern Mennonite University, Harrisonburg, Virginia, and freelance trainer, led a board development workshop on decision-making practices and systems. Executive Board members and staff engaged in roundtable discussions about ways to improve dialogue and enhance the effectiveness of decision-making within the context of MC USA's governance structure. **Read more in MC USA's news release here.**

A call for Mercury Justice

"Members of Asubpeeschoseewagong Netum Anishinabek First Nation (Grassy Narrows) are once again preparing to travel 1900 km to Toronto to call for mercury justice. The people of Grassy Narrows, led by mothers and youth, have been demanding government action for decades since a pulp and paper mill dumped tons of mercury into the English-Wabigoon River system in the 1960s. For decades, the provincial government claimed that remediation of the watershed was impossible. The community has continued to advocate relentlessly and has finally begun to win. The Ontario government, in 2017, promised to clean the river and committed \$85 million in funding. In 2020, the provincial and federal governments committed to financing a Mercury Care Home to provide medical and nursing care to people affected by mercury poisoning. Change is coming, slowly. The river cleanup is still at the stage of feasibility studies. Construction on the Mercury Care Home has just begun." **Read the rest of the article from Community Peacemaker Teams** here.
