This Sunday, Kevin Chupp will preach a sermon titled $I \heartsuit Justice$ using Isaiah 61:1-11.


Isaiah brings good news for the people about their life situation and also their God. God will get to work to answer every misfortune with blessing because that's what God loves to do. How might we respond to such a God?

Mental Health First Aid



We all have mental health. According to the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI), approximately 1 in 5 adults in the U.S. experiences mental illness in a given year. That's 43.8 million people, or 18.5% of the population. But we all have mental health and we all struggle at times.

How do we identify the signs and symptoms in someone who is just beginning to experience a mental health challenge? How do we tell when things are getting worse? What do we do when it becomes a crisis?

Over centuries, Christians have built up a lot of misconceptions that contribute to stigma around mental health and discussing it openly. Some claim that mental illness is a sign of weakness. Some tell us to just surrender our mental illness to God or that it's just God's way of testing you and your faith. Some believe that illness, whether physical or mental, is punishment for sins. NONE OF THESE ARE TRUE! Mental heath disorders are the result of multiple genetic and situational factors and most disorders are highly treatable. Come learn the signs and symptoms and practice offering hope to those who are struggling.

HR9495 now goes to the Senate



HR9495, the "non-profit killer bill," was passed by the House on November 12. This bill, a response to the widespread protests against the war in Gaza, would give the Secretary of the Treasury the authority to unilaterally declare any non-profit a terrorist group, and strip it of its 501(c)(3) status. Such organizations as the US campaign for Palestinian Rights and our own MennoAction group immediately come to mind. This bill is an attack on our First Amendment right to free speech and dissent, and is of particular concern to peace churches like ours. If you feel led, please contact Senators Durbin and Duckworth and urge them to vote against this ill-considered bill.

On the streets with the Prince of Peace

We welcome Jesus, as he welcomes us, into the work of mending the world.

"I went under a sheet in the middle of Franklin Street in Chicago on a hot summer day, lying on my back and tucking the white cotton loosely around and under my legs, torso, head. Now five others and I were in submission to those around us, at their mercy. They were merciful: Joyce sat cross-legged by my head, made sure I was OK and provided water for me to drink. Jenn moved from one shroud to another to gently spray water on our hair and faces. Nida and other Palestinian women laid large, laminated images over us: Each bore a name, photo and description of a Palestinian killed by Israeli forces in Gaza. The women dipped their hands in red paint and left drips like blood on our shrouds and on the huge 'Stop the genocide in Gaza' banner on which we lay." Upcoming AMBS Courses for Guest Students

AMBS has some amazing courses during the second semester (Jan. 13 to May 2) that are open to guest students!

- Are you a history loved? Take *Global Anabaptist History and Theology* with Jamie Pitts or "Biblical Hermeneutics and the History of Interpretation" with Paul Keim.
- Are you interested in growing as a worship leader? Join *Christian Worship: Theory and Practice* with Rachel Miller Jacobs.
- Are you concerned about earth care? Take part in *Spiritual Practices: Water of Life* with Janeen Bertsche Johnson, which meets for five Tuesday evenings.
- Or want to go deeper in the book of Revelation? Take *Apocalypse Against Empire: The Book of Revelation* with Drew Strait.

There are a number of other great options you can look over here. Guest students who have not yet taken a course will receive a 50% tuition discount on their first three credits! Some of the courses are online and students can work on them at the time that fits their schedule. Other courses are "blended," and students can either be in the classroom or join by Zoom. A few courses meet only in person and on campus. There are one credit courses and three credit courses, and some of the courses can be audited.

MCC Action Alert

Background: A global shift from fossil fuels is critical to address the climate crisis. Enabling the flow of renewable energy into the U.S. transmission infrastructure reduces oil and methane emissions at a national scale. While purporting benefits to green infrastructure, the Energy Permitting Reform Act (EPRA) would lock in global emissions and toxic mining waste for years to come. The EPRA would open up federal lands and waters, including Tribal lands, to new leases for mineral, gas and oil extraction. Further, it would remove environmental protections and reduce environmental reviews and community consultation. The legislation would also fast track proposed liquefied natural gas export projects to the endangerment of public health with a disproportionate impact on already affected communities. In addition, renewable energy infrastructure projects have already been streamlined through the federal permitting and regulatory process in recent years, so such reforms are not needed.

Faith reflection: Seeing ourselves and our planet as God's creation and as an expression of God's love fuels our desire to treat all of it with respect. Authors examining how martyr stories have been used and abused

As the 500th anniversary of Anabaptism draws near in 2025, two Canadian scholars are writing books that ask questions about the role martyrology plays in that story.

One is Jeremy Bergen, an associate professor of religious studies and theological studies at Conrad Grebel University College in Waterloo, Ont. Raised on stories of Anabaptist martyrs, he grew up seeing them as heroes of the faith. But as he studied church history and theology, Bergen began to wonder what impact those stories had on him when it came to relations to Christians from other denominations. Through his new book, which has a working title of *Christian Martyrdom and the Unity of the Church* (Baylor University Press), Bergen is exploring whether telling stories of Christian martyrs — Anabaptists and others — impedes church unity by promoting a belief that one group is right while others are wrong.

Also writing a book on martyrs is Jennifer Otto, a historian who teaches in the department of religious studies at the University of Lethbridge in Alberta. The working title of her book is *Martyr Church: Re-Inventing Martyrdom in the Anabaptist Tradition* (Fortress Press). Otto, who is part of Lethbridge Mennonite Church, wants to "situate Anabaptist martyrology in the broader church story and look at how that story was understood in the 20th century," she said. She noted that although the early Anabaptists rejected the idea of saints, they meticulously preserved the memory of their martyrs by composing martyr hymns, preserving trial records and compiling collections of martyr acts like Martyrs Mirror. **Read the rest of John Longhurst's article for the** *Anabaptist World* **here.**
