 - If you or a loved one are immigrants of any status, here are some steps you can take to be ready for any situation involving (Immigration and Customs Enforcement) ICE.
- Know Your Rights When Interacting with Immigration Officers (ICE) Illinois
 Coalition for Immigrant & Refugee Rights
 - These are some very practical things to know about ICE—they have no right to enter your home or business unless they have a specific kind of warrant.
- Following Jesus During Challenging Times Mennonite Church USA
 - Wednesday, Feb 5th, 6pm (central) While the guidance for ICE officers has shifted dramatically in recent days, lawyers will share about ways churches can/have supported for people who are undocumented.
- The easiest and most effective way for U.S. constituents to make a political impact - <u>5calls.org</u>
 - As Representative Sorenson's office explained to those of us who advocated for ceasefire in Gaza, phone calls are very effective in determining which issues get the attention of politicians.
- Local Legal Services for Immigrants The Immigration Project
 - The Immigration Project has offices in Bloomington and offers free consolation and low-cost legal services for immigrants in our community.
- Reach out to the Outreach Commission
 - We are eager to use our resources to meet the needs created by this jarring time. You can email or call any of the members with your concerns or ideas, or arrange with Phil (chair) to bring them to the Commission directly (our next meeting is February 10th).

Wednesday, Feb. 5, 2025 at 6 pm Central Time



Lawyers from the Institute of Constitutional Advocacy and Protection will discuss the legal issues related to sanctuary, specifically focusing on section 1324, and will allow time for participants to ask questions. A Note from CPT

As I scrolled through the news about the ceasefire between Hamas and Israel, I came across this part of a poem from Gaza:

"When a ceasefire is announced, I will just run. No one ask me where. I myself don't even know. I will just run, and run. Maybe to a space in this city, maybe to my old solitude, maybe towards the sun. I don't know. The important thing is to arrive at a quiet place. A place that allows me to weep for a long time." — Hasan Qatrawi, Gaza. As I read about the potential ceasefire deal a few days ago, which has now been approved by the Israeli cabinet, I went through a roller coaster of thoughts. Finally, the killing will stop. No, this might just be a trick in the current global political theatre. Does this mean the occupation will end? Or is this just a longing, like Hasan, looking for respite? After fifteen months of bombings, this is welcome news, even though thousands of deaths later, it seems a little too late. Every moment of delay was calculated, every death avoidable. In fact, this same deal was available since July but lacked the right political pressure to be accepted.

Let us not be mistaken; the ceasefire is not an act of goodwill but a calculated political decision. Whether Biden or Trump should receive credit for brokering the deal does not matter because the United State's enabling posture toward Israel has not changed. On Wednesday, Trump's incoming security adviser, Rep. Mike Waltz, said Israel has the green light to keep attacking Gaza. Additionally, Israel has a reputation for finding excuses to reinitiate violence and back out of truces. While the deal was being negotiated, Israel escalated its violence, raining down bombs in Gaza. Suchitra Vijayan accurately describes Israel's strategy as one of "violence as policy, diplomacy as spectacle."

We need to be vigilant in the coming days, weeks and months because a fragile ceasefire does not mean the cruelty of the occupation will not continue. Israel Occupation Forces' military actions have intensified in the West Bank, paving the way and appropriating land for the development of new and expanded settlements. The apartheid regime under which Palestinians live will not change with the ceasefire. Justice and a liberated Palestine demand the end of Zionism and the end of the occupation. Justice also demands our global solidarity — our organizing and actions for peace need to intensify. For right now, I'm grateful for a ceasefire. I'm thankful families in Gaza can find some respite. I'm grateful Hasan can find a quiet place.

A Message from Mennonite Action

We have some big news. Mennonite Action is launching a series of coordinated actions throughout February and March — with a goal of taking action in at least 40 places across the US and Canada. We are calling on Mennonites, Christians, and friends to hold public, nonviolent, disruptive worship services to demonstrate that God's Love Knows No Borders.

We are boldly stepping into this moment because our political leaders have failed us. Reactionary populism is on the rise across the world, from the US to Canada to Germany. In response, our elected leadership is not offering a different vision. We aren't hearing enough strong, moral voices speaking out against the Trump administration's cruel deportations of immigrants, discriminatory policies targeting LGBTQ Americans, and recent calls for the ethnic cleansing of Palestinians from Gaza. There is silence in the face of the rising violence in the West Bank and both US parties' ongoing support of Israel.

But we will not be silent. Together, we will speak out against Christian nationalism, against tearing apart immigrant families, and against violence and occupation everywhere. We will take mass action for Palestine, for our undocumented neighbors, and for the safety of our communities. To get ready to take nonviolent action together, there are things you can do right now:

- Check out our brand new action toolkit. Our new "God's Love Knows No Borders" toolkit will equip you with practical information to hold a public action in your local community. Consult the toolkit for everything you need to know about messaging, recruitment, planning, and programming.
- Sign up for Peace School next Tuesday. On Tuesday, February 11, we are offering an action planning training during our ongoing Peace School sessions. This training is open to everyone, including people who aren't joining our entire February Peace School series.
- Join our Winter Term Peace School: This February, we will be holding weekly online trainings on Tuesday evenings at 7 pm CT. This training series will provide you with the concrete skills you need to organize in your local community around Mennonite Action's two major areas of focus: changing the "common sense" around western support for the genocide and occupation of Palestine, and publicly demonstrating an alternative to the Trump administration's Christian nationalist ideology. - Check out Mennonite Action's new podcast: We're excited to announce the launch of our new podcast, Front Light! The name comes from Dr. Vincent Harding, who implored Mennonites to be a "front light" in struggles for justice, instead of a "rear light." The podcast is hosted by two members of Mennonite Action's Pastoral Team, Jonny Rashid and Joanna Lawrence Shenk, and edited by a member of our Communications Committee, Ken Ogasawara. Taking action together is a form of public witness. We want to show our communities that there are Mennonites and Christians who say no to rising Christian nationalism, and who reject a cruel and violent theology that seeks to divide and exclude. Instead, we will demonstrate that we are not afraid to follow Jesus's call to side with the oppressed. We are not afraid to stand with our marginalized neighbors, even in these uncertain and often frightening times. We are not afraid because we know God is here — even now. Will you join us?
