Overage Discussion

As was shared in the Annual Meeting and year-end financials, we ended 2024 with an excess of income over expenses of \$31,091. This current excess (Unrestricted Net Assets - Current on the Balance Sheet) is in addition to the accumulation of excess income over expenses from prior years (Unrestricted Net Assets - Prior Years on Balance Sheet). In 2018 a group called the Spending Plan Task Force was tasked with developing some policies around significant mid-year deficits as well as year-end overages, and as part of that made a recommendation for a formulaic approach to keeping a reasonable amount in that Unrestricted Net Assets line (funds that are in the checking/money market account but not allocated to any Balance Sheet accounts/funds/projects) from year to year, fluctuating with the level of the spending plan.

Given the growth of that line over the past 5 years, the Administration Commission is looking at what to do with that accumulation of approximately \$84,500 and looking for input from the congregation. For example, the last distribution of an overage (at the end of 2022) was allocated 10% to donations and 90% to Capital Improvement savings.

We have an aging building with numerous capital improvement needs. Some of our ideas include replacing leaking windows, repadding chairs, disability accommodations (recommendations forthcoming from the Safety, Access, and Accommodation subcommittee of the Administration Commission), and 10% donations. We have learned that in the last few years that our giving to Mennonite Church USA does NOT include Mennonite colleges or seminaries. We are open to the congregation's ideas.

After a period of two weeks of input, AC will develop a recommendation to be shared with the congregation. Please reach out to Mary or anyone on the Administration Commission to share any ideas or thoughts on ways the money could be used. Your prayerful input is much appreciated!

We survived February

"Inside a cramped minivan in a Target parking lot on a humid Indiana summer afternoon, my wise older sister helped me realize it was time to propose to my significant other. With a hefty portion of hope, and little idea where we would live or what we would do, we were married one year later. Powered by curiosity, we later moved across the country to start a career where everything was new to us. The whiplash came two months later when we planned a return trip, as it became clear that cancer was beginning to take my mother's life. A few months after that, another trip became necessary. We found a much more serious scene than we had expected. My mom, 57 years old, died minutes after we arrived."

Judge refuses to block immigration enforcement operations in places of worship

A federal judge declined a request on April 11 to block immigration agents from conducting enforcement operations at places of worship while a lawsuit filed by religious groups works its way through the court system. U.S. District Judge Dabney Friedrich in Washington handed down the ruling one week after Mennonite Church USA and more than two dozen other Christian and Jewish groups requested a preliminary injunction. Mennonite Church USA et al. v. United States Department of Homeland Security et al., challenges the Trump administration's decision to rescind a ban on immigration raids in places of worship. The faith groups represent millions of members and include the Church of the Brethren, the Episcopal Church, Presbyterian Church USA, Friends General Council, and several United Methodist bodies. Friedrich was appointed by President Donald Trump during his first term. The Associated Press reported she ruled that there have been only a handful of enforcement actions at places of worship and there was not a big enough threat of legal harm to justify a preliminary injunction. Ritual at Friedenswald marks journey of repair

Will our work of holy reckoning ripple far beyond?

"In the late 1990s and early 2000s, the Brethren Mennonite Council for LGBT Interests (BMC) hosted its annual retreat for young adults at Camp Friedenswald in Michigan. In 2005, the camp barred BMC from hosting Queer Camp on its grounds in response to increased backlash to gueer visibility throughout the church. Concerned people across BMC and Central District Conference of Mennonite Church USA spoke out against this decision. Mutual interest in mediation was stated but never occurred. This is not a linear story. Repair is not linear work. On a bright and chilly afternoon in November, 17 members of the Brethren Mennonite Council for LGBT Interests and Camp Friedenswald gathered for a ritual of repair. Our group included current and former members of our boards and staff, some of whom were involved in the organizations in 2005, along with invited leaders from Central District Conference. The gathering embodied reparative efforts the camp and BMC began nearly two years ago. In January 2024, a group of BMC and camp leaders spent time seeking a better understanding of what happened in 2005 and thereafter. We wanted to tell a fuller, more truthful story. Reviewing old emails, minutes, news clippings and articles from this era was painful and illuminating. Some letters were hard to read. We built a digital archive for this work of holy reckoning."
