Update from Vision Team on Dual Conference Affiliation at MCN

MCN's dual affiliation with Illinois Mennonite Conference (IMC) and Central District Conference (CDC) continues to be a topic that is raised for reconsideration. Understanding the rich historical reasoning for why MCN is affiliated with two regional conferences, the deeply held feelings for this arrangement, and practical considerations surrounding the affiliations, Vision Team has previously stated that any church decision to alter or reaffirm this dual affiliation would follow a process that allowed for input and discernment from the congregation.

As shared with the congregation in December, the Vision Team will be leading the congregation through this discernment process over the next few months, with a targeted decision around future conference affiliation to be made by July 1.

Where we started:

One year ago, Vision Team conducted an information gathering congregational survey to garner the thoughts and feelings held across the congregation. While no decisions were made from the results of that survey, the results were insightful. Here are a few results from the survey:

• 85% of survey respondents answered "No" to the question "Do you think it is

important that MCN be dual-affiliated in the future?"

• 70% of survey respondents answered "No" to the question "Would you have concerns with MCN ending its formal affiliation with one of the conferences?"

• When asked, "If MCN were to maintain membership with just one conference in the future, with which conference do you believe it should maintain membership?," 87% of survey respondents indicated CDC only, while 2% indicated IMC only.

There were many valid points and concerns raised in the survey responses. We know some people feel strongly about this issue. However, the survey results revealed a potential lean in direction among the congregation toward ending dual-conference affiliation and remaining affiliated with CDC only. As Vision Team prepares to lead the congregation through this discernment process, we think it is helpful to go in with this baseline understanding of where the congregation appears to be at with this topic. But again, no decisions have been made at this point in time.

Where we are:

What questions does this prompt in you? **ACTION ITEM:** We ask that congregants send ALL questions you may have to the Vision Team for processing and inclusion within a comprehensive FAQ document that will be prepared and shared. This FAQ document will also include questions Vision Team thinks the congregation would benefit from having answered and will be used to prompt discussion on certain aspects of this issue. **Please send your questions to Ben or Shannon by April 6.**

Where we are going:

The intention is to lead the congregation to a decision around future conference affiliation before July 1, 2025. Part of a potential decision to withdraw membership from a conference would be to discuss as a congregation how we exit a decades-long relationship peacefully and with love and grace.

A faith that makes room for all of me

"In the early pages of *Love, Auntie*, Shantell Hinton Hill describes a transformative meeting with a pastor about a decade ago. When she was 30 and sensing a call to full-time ministry, her pastor explained all the reasons why she could not be hearing God rightly. Even though she'd rebuilt the church's youth ministry program, wanted to serve God by serving others and had begun 'to discern the voice of God saying there was more for me,' still her pastor told her the Bible demanded she remain quiet in the church. He traced 'every single text in the New Testament having to do with women remaining silent' and insisted that Hinton Hill should not pursue seminary education or church leadership roles. A Message from CPT

In early March, President Trump <u>unambiguously threatened US universities</u>. Aiming to uproot campus solidarity for Palestine, he wrote "Agitators will be imprisoned/or permanently sent back to the country from which they came." Mahmoud Khalil was his first casualty, "the first", Trump promises, "of many to come". His wife has explained how, on 8 March, ICE officers barged warrantless into their home, arrested Khalil, hung up the phone on his lawyer, and threatened to arrest her too. "40 years after my parents immigrated here, and just weeks before I'm due to give birth to our first child, and I feel more unsafe and unstable than I have in my entire life" she said. "<u>US immigration ripped my soul from me when they handcuffed my husband and forced him into an unmarked vehicle.</u>"

Trump says he wants to drive antisemitism off campus and out of the country. Just a few weeks ago, however, his ex-Chief Strategist Steve Bannon told a reporter that "the number one enemy to the people in Israel are American Jews that do not support Israel and do not support MAGA... the biggest enemy you have is inside the wire". Trump meanwhile said of Democrat Chuck Schumer that "He used to be Jewish. He's not Jewish anymore, he's Palestinian." He has been condemned for using "Palestinian" as a slur, and for setting his own criteria for Jewish identity. He also reveals his worldview: the line between friend and enemy is drawn by race as much as politics. Palestinians and the "wrong" kind of Jews, honouring their histories and the consequent commitments, threaten his foreign policy. The Department of Homeland Security admits as much, justifying revoking Khalil's Green Card by citing the 1952 Immigration and Nationality Act, which enables the removal of migrants whose presence is thought to have "potentially serious adverse foreign policy consequences".

If people – by virtue of who they are – cannot accommodate themselves to his project, Tump will just get rid of them. Resisting this tendency, hundreds <u>rallied outside a New York courthouse demanding Khalil's release</u> as a judge blocked his deportation. Yesterday <u>police arrested 98 members of Jewish Voice for Peace</u> as they held a sit-in for Khalil at Trump Tower. As states' attempts at using illegal means to reach their ends are frustrated, where will they turn next? In 2024, a Palestine solidarity encampment occupied Athens Law School. Twenty-eight people were arrested, and nine of them, not Greek citizens, were held in a "pre-removal detention centre" as Greece attempted to deport them. Yesterday a court acquitted them of all charges. Today, in a planned parliamentary reshuffle, a new Minister of Migration has been appointed, Makis Voridis, who has <u>a violent history of membership</u> to fascist anti-Semitic groups.

Those demonstrating outside courts understand that the fight against the authoritarian turn is on two fronts: at home and abroad. CPT's Turtle Island Solidarity Network reports this week from a demonstration against the world's biggest mining convention, organised by the Prospectors and Developers Association of Canada. "The companies that find a home at PDAC have contributed to violence and destruction in every one of the contexts in which CPT works", they write. From Iraqi Kurdistan we publish an update on the violent suppression of a wave of strikes and blockades demanding withheld payment, a result of political bartering over oil revenue. And in Lesvos, we publish a statement from the #FreePylos9 campaign demanding answers from Europe's border patrol agency Frontex, which has tried to hide behind policy and protocol to justify its failure to assist over 600 victims of the Pylos shipwreck. As Turtle Island Solidarity Network reminds us, in order to build the world we deserve, we must disrupt business as usual.

The scramble to save critical climate data from Trump's war on DEI

"When the White House took down a critical environmental justice tool just three days into President Trump's administration, a team of data scientists and academics sprang into action. They had prepared for this exact moment, having created a list of 250 online resources widely expected to be taken down during Trump's second term. The Climate & Economic Justice Screening Tool, a platform created to help federal agencies, states, and community organizations identify neighborhoods heavily burdened by pollution, topped the list. The team worked quickly to re-create the tool using previously archived data and host it on a new website.
