


Quilt Project

"Last call" for Vision Team Nominations



Shelly's term as Vision Team Chair ends on December 31, 2025. She will be stepping down from the Vision Team at that time. Members of the congregation need to nominate a chair-elect (See [Ministry Description summary](#).) now who will join Vision Team in June, moving into the position of chair on January 1, 2026. This new member will join Shelly for the remainder of her term, Shannon, Ben, and Helen on the Team. The Spiritual Gifts Discernment Team (SGDT) is responsible for organizing the nomination and election processes for filling this position.

The process:

- Apr. 27–May 7 Nominations for Vision Team chair-elect are submitted.
 - May 8 SGDT prepares a slate of candidates including the names of the 5 people who received the most nominations. *
 - May 11 Election slate announced.
- May 11–14 Ballots are submitted. (Paper ballots and online voting available.)
 - May 15 SGDT reviews the ballots. The person receiving the most votes is contacted and invited to prayerfully discern this call. If that person declines, If that person does not feel called to this role at this time, SGDT will discern who to call next.

*One may not request that their name be removed from the slate. We want the Spirit to speak through the congregation in this process. You may not want to serve, but if the congregation calls you, we want you to prayerfully consider it. And if at that point it still does not coincide with your sense of call, it is appropriate to decline.

Oppose the Fragmentation and Defunding of Older Americans Act Programs

The Trump Administration's leaked FY 2026 budget shows a deeply troubling plan to tear apart the Older Americans Act (OAA)—a 60-year-old, unified system of support for older adults and caregivers—and split its programs across two different federal agencies. Instead of maintaining the OAA's coordinated delivery model, the Administration plans to:

- Move nutrition programs to the Administration for Children and Families (ACF),
- Move the rest of the OAA programs—like in-home care, transportation, caregiver respite, and elder justice—to the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), a large agency ill-suited to these community-based services.

At the same time, the budget proposes to zero out critical aging programs (including Long-Term-Care Ombudsman and elder justice programs like Adult Protective Services) that support older adults' health, safety, and independence. This is not efficiency—it's dismantling. We must speak up NOW to stop this plan. Tell Congress to keep OAA programs together and fully funded. Service of apology with John Linscheid

Sunday, May 11th at 4pm Central Time at Peace Mennonite Church

With John Linscheid, Brethren Mennonite Council for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender Interests (BMC) wishes to make our community aware of a Service of Repentance and Restoration to be held between John and Western District Conference (WDC) on May 11th in person and online. John had been Licensed Toward Ordination in WDC after beginning a pastorate Lawrence Mennonite Fellowship (now Peace Mennonite Church) in 1980. However, in 1984 after learning that John was gay, the WDC Ministerial Committee rescinded his ministerial credential and John stepped down from his role as pastor in discernment with his congregation, which was being subsidized by WDC. John plans to accept an official apology and receive an honorary ministerial credential from WDC. John will also offer remarks at the service, speaking to the wider church context and impacts harm in 1984. WDC's [announcement](#) includes their steps that led to this service of apology. The service will take place on Sunday, May 11th at 4pm Central Time at Peace Mennonite Church, 615 Lincoln Street, in Lawrence, KS. To watch via Zoom contact the WDC office at wdc@mennowdc.org to receive the zoom link. It is worth noting that while his formal credentials were stopped, John's ministry did not stop in 1984. In the decades since, John went on to continue fruitful and impactful religious leadership. Both John and his late beloved partner Ken White were active BMC leaders, spiritual teachers, and conveners of queer community. They played a key role in their local Germantown Mennonite Church's journey to affirm and bless LGBTQ people. As recently reflected in our [article about BMC's repair work with Camp Friedenswald](#), one apology or reparative process "does not absolve all the harm done to LGBTQ+ people or the church's moral injury." Yet it may be one fractal of healing, not only for queer and trans folks, but for the well-being of the entire church.

Why Oak Flat Matters: A Mennonite Reflection on Sacred Land

"In February I spent a week doing prayerful accompaniment at Oak Flat (Chi'Chil Bildagoteel) in Arizona, sacred land of the Western Apache. Sarah Augustine and the Coalition to Dismantle the Doctrine of Discovery encouraged Mennonite Men to pursue training to accompany Apache Stronghold as they advocate for the protection of Oak Flat and their religious freedom. I did the training and have served on the accompaniment team. This February I joined a Mennonite teammate at Oak Flat for daily prayer walks, camping on the land, communicating with and supporting Apache Stronghold, and experiencing God's creation firsthand. Each time I've gone to Oak Flat has been transformative. For a Midwesterner it has taken multiple days, multiple visits, and learning from the Apaches to get acclimated and begin to realize just how full of life this sacred land truly is. Even without verbal explanations, simply being at Oak Flat inspires gratitude, reverence, and prayer. That said, if Apache Stronghold had not shared history and background with me, I would not even begin to understand the depth of its sacredness." **Read the rest of Jon Zirkle's article for Mennonite Men [here](#).**

Federal cuts impact Washington congregations

"The termination notice arrived on Presidents' Day. Paris Rossiter had worked at the Federal Emergency Management Agency for a year and a half and had taken on a new role as a civil rights analyst about six months ago. That started a 12-month probationary period, making him subject to sweeping and indiscriminate cuts in the name of government efficiency by the Trump administration. With more cuts expected, congregations in the Washington, D.C., area are facing collective angst and grasping for hope. Staff Updates from the MCC US National Peace & Justice Ministries April E-Memo

- **MC USA visits DC:** On April 3, Galen accompanied Mennonite Church USA leaders Iris de León-Hartshorn and Jon Carlson to meetings on Capitol Hill to lobby for passage of the Protecting Sensitive Locations Act. Iris later spoke at a vigil on the eve of the first hearing in the lawsuit MCUSA v. DHS which seeks to limit the ability of ICE enforcement in churches.
- **Anabaptists advocate for clean energy and trees:** On April 10, Anabaptist Climate Collaborative and MCC hosted a climate advocacy training virtually and in Washington, D.C., for 20 Mennonites from nine states. Participants advocated in 15 congressional offices to protect clean energy tax incentives, such as direct pay for solar panels and [USDA tree planting grants](#). - **"Stones cry out" Peace Camp:** The "Stones Cry Out" Peace Camp was held in Akron, Pennsylvania, March 10-15, engaging topics of climate change, immigration and advocacy. The week included Wild Church sessions, a day on the Hill, and a song-writing session during which we collectively wrote the lyrics: Fueled by curiosity, Plant the seeds of empathy, When the "I" becomes the "we," The earth can breathe free.
