### Tim Erdel

This Sunday, Tim Erdel will preach a sermon titled "The Happiest Day of My Life!" Tim Erdel, known by many as "Brother Tim" was a long-time professor of Religion & Philosophy at Bethel University in Mishawaka, IN, where he remains after his retirement serving as Archivist for the Archives & Historical Collections of the Missionary Church—originally named the Mennonite Brethren in Christ. In that role, and as a thinker in his own right, he has contributed to and embodied the Anabaptist awareness of that denomination. Brother Tim is no stranger to Central Illinois. After receiving graduate degrees from Trinity Evangelical Divinity School and The University of Chicago, he completed a masters and Ph.D. in Philosophy at the University of Illinois, where his spouse Sally (from Morton) also attended.

# Save humanitarian funding from rescissions

**Background:** This week, Congress is expected to debate a <u>"rescissions" package</u> that would rescind over \$9 billion of funding already appropriated for lifesaving humanitarian assistance, global stability, and peacebuilding. These cuts are in addition to the previously released <u>fiscal year 2026 budget request</u>, which includes a 13% increase in military spending and elimination of funding for several life-saving foreign assistance and peacebuilding programs, including Food for Peace. Cuts to U.S. foreign assistance exacerbate the <u>growing number of people internally displaced</u> globally and will lead to increases in trauma, famine, food insecurity and, likely, millions of deaths. Urge your members of Congress to recognize our moral responsibility to unconditionally prioritize assistance for vulnerable populations.

**Faith reflection:** God's love is generous and not calculating. In the Scriptures, Jesus repeatedly reminds us of our responsibility toward each other, especially in responding to basic needs and saving lives, describing how God blesses and rewards those who are compassionately generous to others (Matthew 25:31-45). God invites us to courageously love, be compassionate and share generously, the way God loves us.

# MDS responds to deadly Kentucky tornado

"Mennonite Disaster Service volunteers from Ohio removed damaged trees and debris in London and Somerset, Ky., after a mile-wide tornado tore through the area May 16. The National Weather Service confirmed a powerful EF-4 tornado passed through the area, reaching peak winds of 170 miles per hour and devastating multiple communities in its approximately 56-mile path. Damage spans Russell, Pulaski and Laurel counties, and at least 19 people were killed. The Somerset-London tornado was only the sixth EF-4 or EF-5 tornado in Kentucky in the past 50 years. The tornado was part of a deadly weather outbreak that spawned tornadoes in 22 states May 15-21. Among the hardest-hit states were Kentucky, Missouri, Oklahoma and Wisconsin." **Read the Anabaptist World and Mennonite Disaster Service article here.**

### Former MC USA Executive Director Ervin R. Stutzman dies at 72

Ervin R. Stutzman, 72, who served as Mennonite Church USA's second executive director, died on June 3, 2025. Stutzman was known as a talented leader, teacher and preacher, who was deeply committed to Christ and the church. He served as MC USA's first moderator (2001-2003) and second executive director (2010-2018). He played an instrumental role in the formation of the denomination as part of the executive board, led it through a difficult season of deep divisions and polarization during his tenure as executive director, and helped set a fresh vision and strategy as part of the team that developed the Purposeful Plan, in addition to convening the Future Church Summit before his retirement. **Read more from Mennonite Church USA** here.

# ICE detains mother after legal entry

Members of a Mennonite church in San Antonio, Texas, face increased fear and uncertainty after a member — a mother of four who entered the United States legally — was detained by Immigration and Customs Enforcement officers in late May. Iglesia Cristiana Roca de Refugio (Rock of Refuge Christian Church) is an immigrant-led congregation dedicated to assisting newcomers. Pastor Dianne Garcia said Maria (not her real name) has been an active member since arriving in September and signing the church's membership covenant. She led worship on a weekly basis.
