There will be a service of anointing for healing in worship this Sunday. This is an ancient prayer practice of the church. Anointing is a means of giving an outward sign of the prayers of the Body of Christ for God's loving care to be present to a need – physical, emotional or spiritual. When you come for anointing, you may receive the sign of the cross with oil on your forehead or back of their hand. If you wish, you may share with the person doing the anointing something for which you a praying for healing – for yourself, for someone else or for the world.

Wild Church for All People

"My vision for starting a Wild Church in my hometown came in the middle of COVID isolation, and intersected with a desire to be more active in climate advocacy and a desire to include people who will likely never step foot inside a traditional church. Even though the group that currently practices Wild Church is mostly made up of those in traditional churches, it still scratches an itch not satisfied in indoor worship. Once upon a time in my life, I interviewed people interested in international ministry. One of the predictable answers I would get to the question, "What helps you connect with God?" was spending time in nature. I believe we are created to recognize God in Creation. Nature does not exist for humans to extract resources to fuel our consumeristic lives. Following indigenous wisdom, nature and humanity were meant to live in mutuality and respect. One of the things I love about Wild Church is that it is widely inclusive. For those who have issues sitting quietly for extended periods of time, Wild Church invites movement through hiking. Or body prayer. Or making snow angels. It is very participatory and active. We have a sharing time at the end and anyone can add to the wisdom of the moment." Peruvian rainforest clearing could lead to many trials

"Conflicting stories regarding the clearing of Peruvian rainforests for agricultural usage have resulted in criminal charges against nearly four dozen Low German Mennonite men and allegations of attacks and arson by local Indigenous groups. <u>Agence France-Presse reported</u> Peruvian prosecutors charged 44 men from Masisea Colony with destroying 2,209 acres of forest and requested sentences of eight to 10 years each. Their lawyer, Carlos Sifuentes, said the land was already cleared when the colonists bought it. AFP says if the cases proceed it would be the first trial of Mennonite colonists for environmental crimes in Latin America." **Read the rest of the Anabaptist World article here.**

A Farmer's Vision: The Schowalter Foundation

From his cluttered rolltop desk in his Newton, Kansas, home, Jacob A. Schowalter often wrote out letters to nonprofits, churches and Christian institutions, bestowing sizeable monetary gifts to the organizations. He'd use new parchment for these letters - a rare indulgence for Jacob, who was a frugal man. When he wrote out speeches, poems, and Sunday school lessons, he often used the backs of used envelopes or scrap paper. Throughout his life, Jacob spent little on his own comforts, and instead, often prioritized charitable giving over much else. By the time he died in 1953 at the age of 73, Jacob had amassed an estate of over \$1 million – most of which would be used to establish the Schowalter Foundation. Over the past 70 years, this foundation has provided more than \$27 million in charitable distributions to Anabaptist-affiliated organizations and local ministries. MC Canada meeting to return discernment to delegates

Mennonite Church Canada's 2025 Gathering will meet July 2-5 at Rockway Mennonite Collegiate in Kitchener, Ont. Gathering 2025 will enact recent decisions by the Joint Council to adjust how regional churches and the nationwide church conduct business together. The event will return the nationwide agenda to regional and congregational delegates. A denominational restructure in 2017 sought to shift nationwide discernment to annual gatherings of regional churches, but this goal did not pan out as hoped. Delegates will be appointed by congregations and regional churches to discuss vision and priorities. Delegate input will then guide the Joint Council in its decisionmaking. Assistant moderator Bruce Baergen acknowledged last year that "it has been too difficult to expand the Regional Church Annual General Meetings or truncate the Regional Church agenda to make space for congregational discernment on nationwide agenda." The people who raised me

"On Jan. 20, President Trump put an immediate 90-day freeze on all USAID money. Though it only accounts for 1.2% of all U.S. federal spending, USAID is 75% of U.S. nonmilitary charitable giving around the world. It's never a great feeling to know that your country, one of the wealthiest in the world, is withholding help to hungry and sick people, but I became even more troubled by the response from my home community. The good people who raised me taught me to love God, believe the Bible and live out Jesus' teachings. So imagine my astonishment to hear these same people proclaim 'Trump is doing amazing things' after cutting almost all U.S. nonmilitary foreign aid. When asked, 'But what about the hungry children?' they reply: 'Other countries need to figure it out. We can't solve the world's problems.' The Jesus I was introduced to in the 1980s taught: Do unto others. Love your neighbor as yourself. Sheep versus goats. Minister to the least of these. Apparently, in 2025, my role models follow a Jesus who tells the hungry, thirsty and naked to figure it out for themselves. Ten Thousand Villages closes 13 stores, pivots to online, wholesale strategy

Fair-trade retail organization Ten Thousand Villages closed its 13 company-owned stores earlier this year as it shifts its priorities to online sales and wholesale supply. Stores closed by the end of March in locations along the East Coast and in Texas. A network of 21 independent stores operated by local boards remains open in the U.S. "While closing stores and saying goodbye to talented staff is a difficult decision, it positions us to thrive in a modern marketplace and deepen our impact," said CEO Dan Alonso in a news release. Ten Thousand Villages is widely credited with starting the global fair-trade movement. It traces its roots to 1946, when Edna Ruth Byler wanted to sell crafts made by artisans she met in other countries. She sold items out of the trunk of her car and her Akron, Pa., basement. The business grew into Mennonite Central Committee's SELFHELP Crafts of the World, renamed Ten Thousand Villages in 1996. The first store opened in Altona, Man., in 1972, followed by the first U.S. store two years later in Bluffton, Ohio. **Read the rest of Tim Huber's article for the Anabaptist World here.**

MC USA Justice Fund seeks 2025 applicants, recognizes 2024 awardees

In 2020, amid COVID-19 shutdowns, the killing of George Floyd by a police officer ignited a wave of protests across the U.S. — and around the world — to draw attention to systemic racism. This moment provided individuals, organizations and churches an opportunity to renew efforts to dismantle racism, address police brutality, reimagine policing and combat poverty. During this critical time, Mennonite Church USA's Peace and Justice Ministry founded the Justice Fund, which provides seed money to MC USA congregations that are engaged in this peace and justice work. These grants, which range from \$500-\$2,500, can be used as start-up funds or to continue an existing ministry. Since 2020, this denominational ministry has awarded grants to more than 30 different congregations, many of which have also received additional grant funds in a subsequent year. Lorraine Stutzman Amstutz, MC USA's denominational minister for Peace and Justice, said, "The justice fund is a way for the denomination to assist churches that are actively engaged in their community and partnering with another church or organization that is working on significant justice issues within their communities." Accessibility services for Follow Jesus '25

For the fourth consecutive convention, Mennonite Church USA (MC USA) Follow Jesus '25 convention planners are working with Anabaptist Disabilities Network to create a welcoming and accessible convention for those with disabilities. Follow Jesus '25 will take place in Greensboro, North Carolina, July 8-12. The following accommodations are available, upon request, for the MC USA Women's Summit, the Follow Jesus '25 convention and the Delegate Assembly: convention-provided wheelchairs or scooters, assisted listening devices, accessible slide content for screen readers/tablets and guided walk-throughs of the convention center for those who have low vision or are blind, American Sign Language (ASL) interpretation, sound-reducing ear plugs, and a guiet/sensory room. Other needs may also be accommodated, if registrants indicate those needs on their registration form with enough advanced notice. It is imperative, though, that anyone who plans to take advantage of these offerings should register as early as possible and indicate the services they need on their registration form, to ensure that all their needs are fully met. During the worship services and delegate session, Spanish interpretation will be made available. At lunch, which is included with convention registration, gluten-free, vegan and vegetarian options will be provided, and for the duration of convention, there will be a private room for lactating mothers to nurse or pump.
