

Administration Commission met on May 22. Discussions included April financials,

overage allocations, several estate monies received, Picture Directory update, and Central District Conference delegates.

- We noted that giving is definitely down in the April financials. We hope that the May financials will show improvement.
- We are very appreciative of those individuals who shared suggestions for how to use the overage. We made some initial decisions, but will wait until we receive recommendations from the Safety and Accommodation Committee (SAAC) before we make final decisions. We will send donations of \$1250 apiece to our Mennonite schools – AMBS, Eastern Mennonite Seminary, Goshen College, Bluffton University, Bethel College, Eastern Mennonite University, and Hesston College. These schools no longer receive funding through Mennonite Education Agency and therefore do not receive funds through our Unified Spending Plan.
- We received just money from Harvella Stutzman's estate. In conversation with her family we will use the monies to recover the sanctuary chairs. We will use an additional \$2500 from the overage. We will need to develop a plan to complete the work and choose the color as our current color is no longer available.
- We also received a check from Alice Swift's estate. We have not yet determined how those funds will be used.
- Updates on the Picture Directory have been in the Midweek.
- Delegates for the Central District Conference on June 22 through 24 at Bluffton University will be Lauren Satchwell and Mary Dyck.

The third annual Dismukes Gala Fundraiser will spotlight the amazing story of Dr. Henry Dodford Dismukes, an African American physician in Kimball, West Virginia, in the early 1900s. With the recent flooding that occurred in McDowell County, we are also dedicating a portion of funds raised towards flood clean-up through MCC's Appalachia Build program. 3,500 gather in Zurich to celebrate 500 years of Anabaptism

Worshipers 'rejoice in a journey of reconciliation' with Reformed, Lutherans, Catholics. "Bells pealed from the towers of the Grossmünster as Anabaptists from around the world streamed out of the 800-year-old church. Lingering at the Zwingliplatz, they stood in the long shadow of history, having just celebrated the 500th anniversary of their faith tradition in the city where it began. The estimated 3,500 Anabaptists who gathered in Zurich, Switzerland, on May 29 did more than praise the Radical Reformation and the global church it birthed. Along with the leaders of churches that once tried to crush the Anabaptist movement, they affirmed that faith in Jesus Christ now unites the spiritual heirs of former enemies. Symbolizing reconciliation, Anabaptist and Reformed Church leaders — César García, the general secretary of Mennonite World Conference, and Setri Nyomi, interim general secretary of the World Communion of Reformed Churches — washed each other's feet." MEA integration plan strengthens Anabaptist education in MC USA

The Mennonite Education Agency (MEA) board of directors and the Mennonite Church USA (MC USA) Executive Board recently approved an integration plan to better address the needs of the denomination by bringing the ministry of MEA into the governance and operational structure of MC USA. The plan, initiated by MEA, will fully integrate MEA into the organizational life of MC USA, effective August 1. "The integration plan brings the ministries of MEA and the educational priorities of the denomination into one structure," said Michael Danner, MC USA associate executive director and MEA executive director. "By streamlining our governance and operations, we can better steward our resources and direct more funding toward educational programming." The current MEA board will transition to an educational resource team, supporting existing programs and new initiatives. **Read the rest of Mennonite Church USA's announcement** here.

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Mennonite Action Mass Call Re-Cap

Thank you so much for gathering with us on Zoom for our May mass call along with hundreds of Mennonites and friends, all joined in this movement together. This is a critical moment– for those starving and suffering in Gaza, and for the devolving political climate in the U.S. We talked about what it looks like to form solidarity coalitions organizing against authoritarianism in the U.S. (with support from those of us in Canada). Fortunately, our Anabaptist history lays a beautiful foundation to build upon today. Our hope, powered by Spirit, is one that moves — and for the next few months, Mennonite Action is offering you a lot of ways to be involved in this movement.

- To kick things off, co-founders Adam and Nick will connect to our 500 years of Anabaptist movement by joining Mennonite World Conference for the May 29th gathering in Zurich, Switzerland. They will also lead a workshop on public action for the Global Youth Summit, inspiring the next generation of leaders worldwide, and learning from our shared but diverse history.
- Mennonite Action leadership team representatives will go on a solidarity delegation to the West Bank this June. We will learn from those in Palestine, strengthen our relationships with partners, and bring reminders to our Palestinian siblings that we are with them. As we trace the steps of Jesus, we will recommit ourselves to Sumud, or steadfastness.
- From June 29th to July 1st, we will return to D.C. with Interfaith Action for Palestine alongside our Muslim, Jewish, Hindu, Buddhist, and Indigenous friends. It's an excellent opportunity to offer a voice of collective liberation, and you can learn more about joining us here.
- We're excited to hold a national organizing training in North Carolina just before Mennonite Convention. We'll open with a worship service Sunday night, July 6th, and then host an all-day training on Monday, July 7th. We're investigating: how can we prepare churches to rise to the occasion of this political moment? How can we create in ourselves the courage to respond? The free training is open to all, and you can register here. Following the training, we'll also be attending the Mennonite Convention! Find us in the exhibit hall and via workshops. If you're planning to attend, we encourage you to wear a Mennonite Action t-shirt to help represent our movement.

To support these summer mobilizations, we need to raise \$50,000. If you're in a position to give, we would be so grateful for any donation. If you have the opportunity to ask your congregation to support our work, please feel free to reach out for resources or for us to make a formal ask. A Methodist Mennonite

"My Wesleyan Methodist family was loving and supportive, even as I rejected the church as a teenager. I had a profound religious experience the summer before college. While at college, I discovered one could have a strong faith and pursue serious intellectual questions. I was challenged to read the Sermon on the Mount in a new way. In 1969 I became a draft resister. A friend and spiritual mentor suggested I attend a gathering of evangelical writers and leaders at Buck Hill Falls, Pa. There I met several young Mennonite leaders, including Art Smoker, Walt Hackman and Roy Yoder. We quickly bonded. I was delighted to learn about Anabaptism as a faith tradition. As I struggled with my draft board and prepared for the consequences of refusing military induction, I received support from my new Mennonite friends and several church agencies, including Mennonite Central Committee Peace Section and Mennonite Board of Missions. Are you comfortable in church? Some aren't.

"As I enjoyed a way-too-expensive latte at a local coffee shop, a friend and I got to talking about church demographics. Who is showing up to church — and why? My friend mentioned how awkward he felt attending church because he doesn't have a college degree. This made me think about the churches I have been a part of. Many of them were privileged in many ways. They've had decent budgets — at least enough to hire a full-time pastor. They've typically been predominantly White. The majority of people had a stable income and at least some higher education. These are not bad things. I've benefited from them. I'm able to be a full-time pastor because people are giving financially and because I was able to go to seminary. Growing up in the church (not Mennonite), I became accustomed to the idea that we help the less fortunate. We have resources, and we are called to use them to help others. I have preached this very message. But I'm asking: Are the oppressed part of the church, or are they only helped by the church? Are those who do not fit the profile of a typical church member welcome? Who defines what is typical?" Read the rest of Jerrell Williams's article for the Anabaptist World here.

Heirloom nurtures legacy of healing

Sale of 'Ausbund' hymnal supports nursing scholarships in Nazareth, Israel.

"An old book from an old box in Pennsylvania is breathing new life into a Christian hospital in Israel by sitting on a shelf in Ohio. Robert and Nancy Martin went to Israel in 1965 to serve Nazareth Hospital and the surrounding predominantly Arab community. Through Mennonite Board of Missions (now Mennonite Mission Network), they served 18 years across three terms through 1995 at the hospital and Nazareth Academic School of Nursing, as detailed in the 2020 book Together in Galilee (Masthof Press). Robert Martin was going through a box of family heirlooms last year when he discovered an old hymnal — an Ausbund — that had been passed down in his family. The Ausbund is the oldest Anabaptist hymnal, still in use by Amish today. He knew his copy was old, and he knew it was rare.
