

Mid-Year Financial Report

Administration Commission continues to be grateful for those who have been faithful in their financial support of the 2025 Spending Plan. We are concerned, however, about the deficit between income and expenses through the month of June that has now grown to \$54,000.

50% of 2025 has passed, but our financial support is only at the 35% level, while expenses are running at the 48% level.

Actual 2025 financial support is comparable to the 2024 level of support. However, please remember that the 2025 Spending Plan increased by \$35,000 over the 2024 Spending Plan.

CDC Annual Meeting Report



Central District Conference was held June 19 through 21 at Bluffton University. There were three worship sessions and four delegate sessions. The theme was Listen! Wisdom is calling.

Grace Mennonite Church in Pandora hosted the Thursday evening worship session using the theme Wisdom from our Anabaptist History. Perry Bush shared about several Anabaptist martyrs and wisdom that could be drawn from their experiences. An ice cream social followed the worship.

The second worship session used the theme, Wisdom from our Churches Today. Each person was to bring a symbolic object representing something the Spirit has been doing among their congregation during the past year and share around tables.

Melissa Florer-Bixler preached at the third worship session using the theme, Wisdom for the Future Church. It was a timely sermon given our current situation. It can be found here, starting at 26:45.

The four delegate sessions had delegates assigned to tables to get acquainted with each other during discussion. The usual reports on the state of the conference, Camp Friedenswald, treasurer, and Missional Committee. There were several congregational stories presented from Assembly Mennonite Church, First Mennonite (Chicago), and Columbus Mennonite Church.

Mennonite Church USA (MC USA) has just developed a new resource titled, *Prevention* and Accountability Resource, and works together with A Shared Understanding of Ministerial Leadership, the polity manual. This Resource will be discussed this week at the national conference as MC USA will be encouraging all congregations to implement the resource and guidelines. The purpose of the new guideline is to provide resources to prevent abuse and respond to situations of abuse if they occur within MC USA congregations and conferences. Administration Commission plans to follow the guidelines in their employment processes. Recordings and records from the annual meeting can be found here.

Reportbacks from Palestine: July Mass Call

Thursday, July 24th at 7 pm CT

In the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Ramallah, Rev. Dr. Munther Isaac urged Mennonite Action's delegation to continue our work. He told us we must continue our organizing, and we must keep pushing other Christians to join the movement for a free Palestine. At the Tent of Nations, on a hill top southwest of Bethlehem next to the village of Nahalin, our delegation heard from the Nasser family, who have been farming the hillside land since 1916. We heard about their own work of Sumud, or steadfastness, as they continue to work their farm in the face of encroaching settlements. These are just two of the stories from Mennonite Action's solidarity delegation to Palestine over our two-week trip in June. Queer, wild congregation welcomed

Washington church, meeting outdoors and online, joins Pacific Northwest Conference. Community of Hope Mennonite Church, which defines itself as queer and wild, is the newest member of Mennonite Church USA's Pacific Northwest Conference. Delegates voted to welcome the church plant during their June 19-22 annual meeting at Flathead Lutheran Bible Camp near Kalispell, Mont. "Wild," which means outdoors, is a method of worship used by a growing number of Anabaptist faith groups in the U.S. and Canada. Lacking a building of its own, Community of Hope gathers once a month outdoors in parks and forests in and around Bellingham, Wash. Bible studies take place in cafes and pubs. It began as an online community during the Covid pandemic in 2020. Pastor Rachael Weasley said she began praying and speaking with conference leaders in 2017 about planting a church to serve LGBTQ+ people and allies by looking for where God is operating on the margins. From cult to cult

I should have been prepared when the Trump cult came calling.

"I grew up in sort of a cult: a Mennonite community in Lancaster, Pa., where bishops kept members in line with doctrine and cultural traditions. It was the 1960s, and most of us young people knew we were under the bishop's rule once we were baptized. Every part of our lives could be subject to his scrutiny, his will, his powerful personality. So I should have been prepared when the Trump cult came calling. The country I love is now in the hands of a wannabe dictator. Thanks to the onslaught of Executive Orders, DOGE and the narrowing of judicial options in lower courts, Americans are realizing that democracy may not be as unassailable as we thought — in things large and small. But when I honestly ask myself, why am I so uncomfortable? — in the middle of the obvious, unsettling series of national crises at home and the mounting realities of war around the world — I realize that my dis-ease has a familiar quality. Because along with the niggling in my brain when I hear the personal stories of government workers who have lost their jobs, I am experiencing the same discomfort I lived with in my childhood and teen years." Creation care's collective 'yes'

A sustainable future means affirming new things.

"I have been a climate advocate ever since I first learned about our slow-moving global crisis as a child. I've learned climate change is real. Polar ice sheets and glaciers are melting. Spring is coming earlier. Plants and animals are changing their patterns. Last year was the hottest in modern history. The 10 hottest years on record? The entire decade of 2015-2024. We know why it's happening. In 1856, the scientist Eunice Foote demonstrated that an atmosphere with higher concentrations of carbon dioxide will trap more heat. Burning fossil fuels has increased the carbon in our atmosphere to levels not seen for millions of years. But climate change presents a collective-action problem." "We shouldn't have to choose between church and our culture"

"I was born in Seattle, Washington, while my mother was in rehab. When I was three months old, we moved to the Yakama reservation. Two months after the move, my older sister and I were taken from my mother and my father and placed into a very loving foster-care family. I have multiple brothers and sisters through the foster-care system. To this day, I have a good relationship with my foster mother. My foster dad journeyed on [to the next world] in 2013. When I was about seven years old, we were at the long house, a traditional place of worship for the Yakama people. I joined others dancing on the dirt part of the floor. The dirt floor in the middle of the longhouse is a sacred place that connects us, as Native People, to the land. When we walk and pray on the earth, we are told by our elders that we are shaking hands with the Creator. While I was dancing and singing, giving all the glory to the Creator, a Yakama elder approached my grandmother and said, 'He can't be out there, because he is from the church.'" MCC U.S. National Peace & Justice Ministries: Staff Updates

- Sustainable Peace Networks conference: Charles Kwuelum participated in the Sustainable Peace Networks conference in Maryland, May 21-22, organized by the Focolare Forum for Dialogue and Culture. He facilitated a PodCafe roundtable conversation on MCC's work on inclusive and participatory peacebuilding processes in communities, especially relating to emancipatory elicitive religious peacebuilding.
- Oak Flat prayer walk: In June, Kirstin De Mello led an ecumenical group on a prayer walk around Washington, D.C., to pray for Apache Stronghold and the sacred lands of Oak Flat. The group walked 1.8 miles, the equivalent distance of the crater the proposed copper mine would create on the land. Watch a short video to learn more.
- MCC Burkina Faso in D.C.: In June, Charles Kwuelum hosted and arranged meetings for the MCC Burkina Faso country representative, Cyprien Nkoma, in D.C., to meet with staff of congressional offices and committees. Nkoma highlighted emerging dynamics in the country, MCC's work, and policy recommendations for the U.S. government, especially the need to protect lifesaving humanitarian assistance in the FY2026 federal budget.
- Global Anabaptist Peace Network (GAPN): In May, Nathan attended GAPN meetings in Germany, representing NPJM's peace education work. It was an opportunity to learn about and connect with other Anabaptist supported organizations and initiatives around the world. While global contexts are quite diverse, similar patterns of violence emerge. Sharing resources and showing solidarity is an important component of peacebuilding efforts.
- **Pentecost Witness for a Moral Budget:** Claire Hurst and Galen Fitzkee attended a vigil held on the Senate steps in Washington, D.C., to protest budget cuts to government-funded programs such as the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) and Medicaid. The event was organized by interfaith groups around the city and advocated for a moral budget that would support low-income families.
- Summer Service Leadership Conference: During the week of June 2-5, Daniela Lazaro-Manalo, alongside Abby Endashaw and Mahlet Mamo, facilitated sessions at the Summer Service Leadership conference for 27 participants. Participants learned transformative leadership skills rooted in contemplative practices, relationshipbuilding across divides, and restorative justice principles, enabling them to integrate peacebuilding into community service.
- Korea Peace Advocacy Week: Constituents across the U.S. participated in the annual Korea Peace Advocacy Week June 9-13. MCC is a co-sponsor of the event and helped to organize meetings for participants. A total of 151 individuals met with 133 congressional offices to advocate for H.R. 1841, the <u>Peace on the Korean Peninsula</u> Act.
- DC staff hosted MCC international program leaders: On June 23, NPJM staff hosted 14 MCC international program leaders in Washington, D.C., including area directors who had traveled from regions in Asia, Africa, and Latin America. The group visited several congressional offices and the U.S. Department of State to advocate on foreign assistance, climate change, gun trafficking and more.

This year's theme was "For the Beauty of the Earth." Tammy Duvanel Unruh, WDWM executive committee member, explored God's attitude toward nature and beauty and encouraged the group to take joy in our surroundings and each other. The remainder of the time was spent creating small floral bouquets. Each participant brought a small vessel from their home and flowers from their gardens to share if they wished. Most of the flowers were provided by local flower grower, Firebranch Farm. Rebecca Schrag, floral designer and executive committee member of WDWM, led the group through the basic principles of Ikebana. Ikebana, known simply as "the way of flowers," is a practice studied by the Japanese and historically used in altars and sacred dwellings.
