This Sunday, Kevin Chupp will preach a sermon titled *Volutus* using Philippians 4:10-13.



### Mennonite Action & Courage School

#### **Tuesdays in September**

If you weren't able to attend Mennonite Action's National Training in Raleigh this past July, you have the opportunity to engage with the same content through Courage School, a four week online course throughout September. Personally, I came to the training with no experience in community organizing or really in any sort of activism. I had been reading the news and feeling more and more sadness... and just felt stuck. I understood my faith calls me to action and to follow in the footsteps of Jesus, but I felt lost on what that looks like effectively and practically. I signed up for the Mennonite Action training spontaneously after church the Sunday it came to Raleigh, and am so glad I did. It equipped me with tangible, practical steps for how I individually, and as a member of a church community, can rise to the occasion of our current political and social crises. In my understanding of how to respond to the genocide in Gaza or ICE detainments happening in my own community, I shifted from overwhelm to feeling empowered, which was so surreal after feeling stuck for so long. I now have actionable steps to take and connections to people who care as deeply about these issues as I do. I have both community and knowledge on how to organize that community for crisis response. I'm so thankful for this training as a way to educate, uplift and empower those of us who want to help, but are unsure how we can be useful. Learn more and register for Courage School here. This camp will begin at Camp Friedenswald in Cassopolis, Michigan, November 1–4, diving deep into God's word, and into practical tools of peacebuilding, as we dream possibilities of shalom for our communities and gain tools for engaging conflict effectively. # Do police belong on campus?

Last Fall, the Bethel College administration invited more on-campus foot patrols by the North Newton, Kan., Police Department in response to incidents of vandalism. A range of community members voiced concern and opposition. Does having city police patrolling a college campus run counter to restorative justice? Is police enforcement conducive to racial justice? These questions make police patrols on a Mennonite campus particularly relevant to Indigenous justice. There is evidence that police disproportionately target and harass people of color, including students of color at colleges and universities across the nation. In her essay, "Mass Incarceration and Restorative justice," posted on the Mennonite Church USA blog in September 2022, Lorraine Stutzman Amstutz challenges us to acknowledge that our justice systems are experienced differently by those from the dominant culture than by people of color — and, further, that racial discrimination is baked into our government policies. **Read the rest of Sarah Augustine's article for the** *Anabaptist World's* here.

Set for release in 2026, the documentary series explores the impact of mission outreach on the growth of Anabaptism among Africans, African Americans, and Afro-Latinos. Wil LaVeist has interviewed and filmed over 30 diverse Anabaptist leaders, representing African, African American, and Afro-Latino communities across various ages, genders, denominations, and organizations. The series centers on people of African descent sharing their stories in their own voices. # Intentionality drives belonging at MC USA's most ethnically diverse convention

Of the 1,640 registrants — the highest turnout in three conventions — a record 17.2 percent (282 attendees) identified as Black, Indigenous or people of color. More importantly, BIPOC voices filled prominent leadership roles at the national convention. "Something shifted. This convention felt different," said Sue Park-Hur, MC USA's director of racial/ethnic engagement. # 'We do more than just rebuilding houses. We fix banjos too'

You don't really picture what Princeton's like until you get down into the town and actually look around. The town sits low, and there's these dikes where the two rivers come together, the Similkameen and the Tulameen. One of these dikes gave way. That water came in with force. The flood actually blew out the sliding patio doors in this one place where the rivers converged. You couldn't tell what was in what room. Furniture was upside down in deep, wet mud. Things were thrown around, high up on the cupboards and stuff. Climate change is changing what's happening across our country. MDS used to have small projects in Canada. We got national projects going every summer here now. It seems these things are occurring more and more. Things are melting. We canoe a lot and we hike. We go up to the glaciers, the water coming off of those is tremendous. The force and the volume coming down there in summer is unbelievable. You start to think, are we going to have a flood? We've gone back to Princeton, we've sandbagged in Grand Forks two times after we rebuilt it. It's never broken the dike again but two times we've gone in there to sandbag.
