A Note from AC

On September 7 Mary shared a Ministry Moment from the Administration Commission about the development of the 2026 Spending Plan. AC is taking a new approach. Previously, Commissions sent their input to AC. Now, AC may make adjustments to ensure we can cover all upcoming expenses because our current plan is in the red by \$49,000. The changes in the process include:

- 5% cut in Spending Plan per Commission,
- No substantive changes once the 2026 Spending Plan is presented in November, and
- All Commission spending plans must be received by October 5. If the Commission, doesn't have a meeting scheduled before October 5, they are strongly encouraged to add a meeting as the Spending Plan will be finalized soon after that date.

If Commissions haven't spent all of their funds to date, they are strongly encouraged not to spend quickly before the end of the year. Information was sent to all Commission chairs on September 14.

We have some good news as we received a number of bequests from previous members of the congregation. We plan to use money from Harvella to recover the sanctuary chairs.



Nostalgia's siren song

There's much to cherish in the past, but I want to look forward.

In this season of life (I'm 74), freeing myself from nostalgia is one of the biggest battles I face. It is a daily struggle — mental, emotional and spiritual. My wistful affection is not for the past as originally lived but as I reconstruct it now, often in rosier hues. My nostalgia doesn't take Sundays off. My wishful Mennonite mind can easily conjure a not-so-distant past of church pews filled, institutions thriving, marriages never ending in divorce. Now, there is nothing wrong with an occasional mental excursion into the past. Why would I teach history — an investigation into how the past has shaped the present — if it were not an instructive and enjoyable exercise? But nostalgia involves more than an outing to the past. It is an attempt to return and reside there, in what, I so quickly assume, had to be a simpler, better time than the messy present and uncertain future. Is there a place in Mosaic for me?

Nearly 10 years ago, I approached a conference minister in what was then Franconia Mennonite Conference about becoming a pastor. During those conversations I disclosed my queer/bisexual identity. I was met with sympathy and understanding, but I could tell my identity would be a big barrier in the ordination process. The conference minister said, in effect, "I wish I could change things, but I can't. I wish our conference was more inclusive, but it isn't." I left that meeting frustrated: If this leader can't do anything, who can? Who can I turn to? Is there a place for me in Mennonite Church USA? Yes, there was a place for me: in an affirming congregation in a different conference, halfway across the country. I grew and learned there for several years, through pandemic challenges and pastoral transitions. My co-pastor and I were the first out queer clergy ordained in Western District Conference. And, yet, that conversation haunts me. I am now employed by a church in Mosaic Mennonite Conference in an interim capacity. The uncertainty generated by that conversation remains, as it does for many queer and affirming clergy and laity in Mosaic. Is there a place for me, for all of me? For us? Mosaic Conference board recommends leaving Mennonite Church USA

Delegates to vote on proposal at Nov. 1 assembly.

The board of Mosaic Mennonite Conference is recommending the conference end its membership in Mennonite Church USA. Delegates will vote on the proposal Nov. 1. With about 7,500 members in 60 congregations, Mosaic is one of MC USA's largest conferences. Based in Lansdale, Pa., it has members from coast to coast. If Mosaic withdraws, it would be the sixth conference to do so — after Lancaster, Franklin, Southeast, North Central and South Central — since the denomination was formed in 2002 in a merger of two predecessors. The Mosaic board made the recommendation at its Sept. 15 meeting and announced it Sept. 18. A Mosaic release said the conference and MC USA "have been unable to reconcile significant differences around polity and intercultural practices." "Mosaic has been growing quickly, organically and in relational ways in Colombia, Mexico and beyond," Mosaic board member Haroldo Nunes said. "When we share these realities with MC USA, including the challenges that our non-English speaking pastors have, they are not readily responsive to our needs. By staying within this limiting structure and continuing to wait, our vision and mission is being impacted." Read the rest of Paul Schrag's article for the *Anabaptist World* here.
