MCN 50th



On September 26, 1976, First Mennonite Church (Normal) and Bloomington Mennonite Church met separately one final time and voted unanimously to merge to form Mennonite Church of Normal. After that came our building and many other accomplishments, moments of celebration and grief, and acts of service and outreach among many other things. As we begin our 50th year as a church, we will celebrate this milestone with a Celebration Sunday on **September 27**th, **2026**. In preparation, we are looking to form a committee to plan and coordinate the 50th year celebration. Withdrawing from IMC

Through a vote in June of this year, the Mennonite Church of Normal (MCN) made a decision to withdraw from the Illinois Mennonite Conference (IMC) and affiliate solely with Central District Conference (CDC). A formal letter has been sent to the leadership sharing MCN's discernment process and resulting request to be released (that letter can be viewed here). The Vision Team (VT) and the Pastoral Team (PT) are coordinating with IMC on a respectful and thoughtful transition process. MCN leadership will participate in a brief "exit interview" with some members of the conference leadership, providing an opportunity to share our reflections and thoughts about our history with IMC. MCN will also plan to invite a representative from the conference to be present with us during a worship service, where we can acknowledge and express gratitude for our shared history and exchange blessings as we move forward. Though specific dates have not been set yet, the intention is to complete this process by the end of December, if possible. We welcome feedback, questions, and reflections from the congregation as we walk through this process together.

Dutch town seeks Dirk Willems martyr statue

A group is working to bring Dirk Willems back to his hometown. The Anabaptist martyr was born and eventually executed in Asperen, a village in the Netherlands. He became famous to Anabaptists around the world for escaping prison and then returning to rescue his pursuer who had fallen through ice. The price of loving his enemy was reimprisonment, torture and execution by burning at the stake on May 16, 1569. For centuries the most notable memorial to his life and sacrifice was in Martyrs Mirror — the story and picture of Willems reaching out in assistance to his jailer. A life-size bronze statue of the scene was dedicated in 2018 at Mennonite Heritage Village in Steinbach, Man. Plans are coming together to construct a similar statue in the very water where the iconic act took place, about a block away from the short, but nevertheless notable, Dirk Willems Street. **Read the rest of Tim Huber's article published by the** Anabaptist World here.

MCC U.S. National Peace & Justice Ministries E-Memo: Policy Updates

- U.S. war crime? In late August the Trump administration moved military assets including at least 8 warships into the Caribbean Sea. Soon after, the U.S. military conducted an air strike on a speedboat allegedly carrying 11 drug traffickers off the coast of Venezuela. Lawmakers and experts expressed concerns that these executions constitute war crimes, but administration officials indicate they plan to conduct more.
- **Haiti bill passes house:** The Haiti Criminal Collusion and Transparency Act (<u>H.R. 2643</u>) passed the House of Representatives by voice vote on September 2. If passed in the Senate, the bill would require the State Department to conduct a report detailing connections between criminal gangs and elites in Haiti and impose targeted travel restrictions and property sanctions on those individuals.
- Pocket rescissions: On August 28, President Trump sent another rescissions package to Congress requesting to withdraw \$4.9 billion in foreign assistance. The largest component targets \$3.2 billion of FY2024 development assistance, which includes \$24.6 million for climate resilience. This clawback of funds, like previous recissions, would negatively impact vulnerable populations. Take action: Ask Congress to support climate resiliency programs in the FY26 budget.

Not what but who

We find the way by walking together in the struggle.

The question grabs me: "What do you fight for?" But my heart pipes up, "That's not my first question!" Rather: "Who do I fight for?" Who has God placed in my path and needs me to stand with them? For a long time now, I have understood myself as an accompanier of people who are struggling. And that includes me. I have learned to let God, through others, come accompany me, too. It is a two-way street. I fight for others who are my kin in God's beloved kin-dom. And I fight with them — for a dignified life as one created in the image of God: for things like stable shelter, enough food and water, safety, access to assistance and the loving support of a beloved community. I live in the borderlands of Mexico and the United States, on the traditional lands of the Tohono O'odham peoples, in Tucson, Ariz. As I write this, Congress has just approved spending taxpayer money for massive increases in Immigration and Customs Enforcement hires and construction of more detention prisons. Rifqa Al-Hamalawi wins MCC's Michael J. Sharp Global Peacemaker Award

Mennonite Central Committee (MCC) has awarded Rifqa Al-Hamalawi the 2025 Michael J. Sharp Global Peacemaker Award, presented annually to an individual or organization that exemplifies MCC's commitment to peace and justice worldwide. Since October 2023, Al-Hamalawi and MCC's local partner Al-Najd Developmental Forum have distributed humanitarian assistance, including food baskets, bedding, shelter materials, clothing and cooking gas cylinders, to more than 73,000 people in Gaza. **See the difference Al-Hamalawi has made in Gaza** here-thanalawi has made in Gaza <a href="https://exemple.com/here-

Ask Congress to restore legal immigration pathways and create pathways to citizenship

Background: Since taking office, the Trump administration has restricted and ended numerous legal immigration pathways, including asylum, humanitarian parole, and temporary protected status. Additionally, early in 2025 flights to the U.S. for vulnerable refugees were **canceled**. Some relatives expecting to reunite with family in the U.S. are still stranded abroad despite rigorous vetting. Hundreds of thousands of people have been affected by these changes. Instead of restricting immigration, Congress should restore legal pathways and create new ones—smart immigration strategies can reduce irregular migration, reunite families, and provide economic opportunities. Reforms should include pathways to citizenship for undocumented immigrants, **over 80%** of whom have been in the U.S. for 10 years or longer, and who are members of our communities, churches, and families.
