Alternative Gifts Fair

November 16 & 23

Newcomers to our church may be wondering what an Alternative Gifts Fair is. The first Alternative Gifts Fair, in 1980, was the idea of Harriet Prichard, Director of Children's Ministries at Pasadena Presbyterian Church in California. She wanted to model for the children a way of celebrating God's gift of love and joy at Christmas by giving gifts which could truly change lives. "Shoppers" shopped at booths or displays lovingly created by children and their parents highlighting a favorite project overseas. In return for their support of different projects, they chose cards and inserts describing the gifts being sent in honor of their loved ones. Our church has hosted an Alternative Gifts Fair every year since 2004, although it was online during Covid. The two agencies which choose and vet the projects we support are Alternative Gifts International and Mennonite Central Committee, organized in 1920 after the First World War. Our Fair will be held November 16 and 23 this year. Both Mennonite Central Committee and Alternative Gifts International giving catalogues are available on the library table. The AGI catalogue is available online here and the MCC one is available here. We hope for us all to consider setting up a booth to highlight a favorite project to lift up folks struggling in seemingly unsurmountable circumstances around the world.

To Build Our Courage Training




On Oct. 16, four members/friends of Mennonite Church of Normal participated in Mennonite Action's 'To Build Our Courage' training at First Mennonite Church of Champaign-Urbana. As most Mennonite gatherings do, the evening included breaking bread and singing hymns together. But its main purpose and focus were to prepare participants on why and how to engage in direct action against the occupation of Gaza and the Palestinian genocide, and against illegal and/or inhumane ICE raids and detentions and increasingly authoritarian acts here at home.

A Mennonite Action staff person walked us through their slide set, and then, with the leadership from local church members, we broke into small group discussions to figure out how to handle a potential local scenario. We then prepared in two groups for and enacted all together a role play of a protest action at a local high school. We ended the evening with some notes on next steps and some concluding rituals.

Overall, it was a good and much needed community-building activity in these difficult times. Mennonite Action encourages MCN and other Mennonite church communities across North America to form local chapters of Mennonite Action. The Champaign-Urbana congregation has not yet but is probably well on its way to becoming one. MCN members could join it or partner with them to make it a central IL branch, or form a separate Bloomington-Normal MA chapter that, perhaps, plans some common actions or activities with the Urbana group. While it's a 50 minute drive between us, the travel time can also be rich a community-building activity for participants as it was this time.

Bite-sized pieces of our shared history leading up to our 50th anniversary celebration (September 27, 2026).

Eugene G. Covington, a physician and surgeon, moved to Bloomington from Virginia in 1900 to establish a family practice. The Ku Klux Klan had widespread following in Bloomington-Normal in the early 1920s, which created many limits on where black people could live, eat, shop, and work. However, Covington had full privileges at Mennonite Hospital—home to the careers of many from MCN and the congregations that preceded it. You can read Bill Kemp's article about Covington here.

People I spoke with at the rally feel like this is very difficult, troubling time in our country. A time when we need to speak out wherever we can to get things going in a different direction. This was a wonderful world wide community event.
- Mennonite Action Several MCN people attended a "Build our Courage Tour" on October 16th in Urbana organized by Mennonite Action. - Community Peacemaker Teams Quinn will leave next week on a CPT Delegation to Palestine starting October 28th and ending on November 7th. After his return, Quinn will make a presentation about his trip at MCN at 7:00 pm on Wednesday, November 12th. And since he lives out of state and cannot make a presentation on a Sunday in November or December, he will make a second presentation on a Sunday evening in late January or early February 2026.
- **Widows' Cruse** In addition to the food donated in the grocery cart in the MCN library to the Mt. Pisgah Food Pantry, we also donated \$500.00. Cal and Vivian have coordinated this effort to feed people in need for MCN.
- Mennonite Disaster Service Please think about going on an MDS trip in 2026.
 MCN members went on an MDS trip to Ashville, NC on August 17th and shared their
 experiences on Sunday, October 19th at the MRC. This team was led by Gerry and
 Steve.
- MCC School Kits Louise led a successful MCC School Kits challenge again this year which provided 235 kits to MCC.
- Alternate Gifts Fair Meredith, Pam, and Mark are coordinating the Alternative Gifts Fair this year. It will take place on November 16th and 23rd.
- Home Sweet Home Bridge Project Matt Burgess, CEO of Home Sweet Home Ministries (HSHM), will do a presentation at the worship service on November 9th about their tiny homes project which is to build homes for people without homes. The challenge is for MCN to raise \$13,500 which is the cost to build one tiny home. We are asking people to make an out of budget contribution to MCN and designate it to "HSHM" for tiny homes.

CDC Coordinator of Church Safety

Central District Conference leadership is excited to welcome Kristin Thomas Sancken as our Coordinator of Church Safety. This is a new position serving approximately 8-10 hours per week. (The job description can be found here.) Kristin began on October 15. Kristin and her family live in Charlottesville, VA where they are currently members of an Episcopal Church. Her family formerly attended Charlottesville Mennonite and her spouse grew up at First Mennonite Church, Champaign-Urbana, a CDC congregation. Kristin has a Doctorate in Ministry from Western Theological Seminary (Holland, MI). Her thesis was, "Maternal Inheritance: Interrogating the Divine in Stories of Intergenerational Trauma and Sexual Abuse." Kristin also has a Master of Social Work degree from Virginia Commonwealth University (Richmond). Kristin spent part of her childhood in Central and South America and is fluent in Spanish. Kristin's role has two primary responsibilities:

- Kristin is our educator, resource person, and go-to person for Church Safety policies and procedures. She is available to review your church policies, train congregational leaders, and provide counsel and support.
- Kristin will work closely with MC USA leadership to follow up on all accusations of ministerial misconduct according to our new <u>Prevention and Accountability</u> <u>Resource</u>. The Human Rights Museum built on stolen land

Ambiguities of peacemaking

From the Vietnam War to social justice today, there's clarity and quandary.

Question: What would you fight for? Answer: Nothing. Jesus said his followers would not fight, because his kingdom was not of this world (John 18:36). So, I literally won't fight for anything, and using the word "fight" metaphorically often has dangerous connotations. But I am passionate about peace. I felt that God called me to go to Vietnam in 1968 as a peacemaker during the war there, but I ran like Jonah. Finally, I bargained with God to allow me to attend seminary first so I could more clearly know the biblical basis for my beliefs. Not a costume: facing ICE in Illinois

I rarely wear a shirt with a clerical collar — or anything else that indicates I'm ordained clergy. In my little Mennonite congregation, everyone knows I'm their pastor, and besides, among the priesthood of all believers, we are all called, and I don't want to look pretentious. But when a colleague from another church asked me to join her for a prayer vigil outside the Immigration and Customs Enforcement facility in Broadview, Ill., on Oct. 3, I understood the assignment. I put on a cross necklace and dug a clerical shirt out of the back of my dresser drawer. And I prepared a borrowed gas mask, just in case. For nearly 20 years, a small group of mostly Catholic Christians has gathered to pray outside the Broadview ICE building, located just outside Chicago, every Friday morning. But since September, when the president authorized the Operation Midway Blitz immigration enforcement initiative focused on the greater Chicagoland area, those faithful few have been joined by many others alarmed about the unjust and often terrifying treatment of our immigrant neighbors. **Read the rest of Kristin Loeks Jackson's article published by the** *Anabaptist World* here.

Policing at Bethel supports shalom

In April 2019, the Bethel College Board of Directors adopted the following vision statement: "Bethel College graduates students who increase human flourishing (shalom) in society by owning and enacting their faith, demonstrating compassion for the powerless, engaging in critical thought and bringing value to the workplace." Fast forward to one year ago, near the start of the fall 2024 semester. The Bethel campus was experiencing a series of disruptive events. Some were petty crime: breaking into cars, siphoning gas. A few, however, were clearly intended to threaten individuals or groups: loosening lug nuts on a car, vandalizing appliances in a residence hall, misogynistic graffiti scrawled in public spaces. Taken altogether, these incidents disrupted the "shalom" of the Bethel campus. Members of a community cannot flourish when they are concerned about their safety or the security of their belongings. For that reason, college leaders reached out to the North Newton, Kan., police to request an expansion of their normal drive-throughs to include foot patrols as well. This touched a nerve among Bethel stakeholders. Students organized protests and other campus engagement around the issue; board members received scores of emails and letters. Some alumni threatened to withhold contributions or to discourage their children from attending Bethel. More recently, AW writer Sarah Augustine devoted part of her August column to questioning the propriety of police on campus, and letter writers added their comments in the September issue. For these reasons, we are grateful to Anabaptist World for giving Bethel College this space to explain why we feel police patrols are consistent with our vision of shalom and our long-standing commitment to Anabaptist principles. MCC U.S. National Peace & Justice Ministries

After two years of genocide in Gaza, Mennonite Central Committee (MCC) welcomes the news that Israel and Hamas have signed a ceasefire deal. The deal brings new hope —but it must signify a new beginning and not a return to the status quo. A just peace will require Palestinians to have full self-determination. MCC has stood faithfully with our partners, working together to meet the immeasurable humanitarian needs caused by the genocide. We remain concerned that, under the current ceasefire plan, only those organizations approved by the Israeli government will be allowed to deliver humanitarian aid in Gaza. We will continue to urge U.S. policymakers to push Israel to make the ceasefire permanent, fully open humanitarian access into Gaza, and provide for a Palestinian-led reconstruction. Please continue to cry out with us for a lasting peace. Take action for peace: Continue to call for peace and restoration in Gaza and Rising violence in the West Bank.

MDS Canada appoints next executive director

Mennonite Disaster Service Canada has appointed Reynold Friesen to be its next executive director. He will succeed Ross Penner, who has served as executive director since 2015 and will retire in March. Friesen is director of alumni, church and donor relations at Canadian Mennonite University and will begin his new role at MDS Canada in February. Before taking his job at CMU in 2021, Friesen was agency manager at Harvest Manitoba, directing a staff and volunteer team supporting more than 200 food banks, soup kitchens and other non-profit agencies across Manitoba. Prior to that role, he was pastor of community ministry and pastor of youth and young adults at Bethel Mennonite Church in Winnipeg. He also served as director of Silver Lake Mennonite Camp in Ontario and as assistant pastor of the Vineland United Mennonite Church in Ontario. "I'm excited to be part of an organization which has a practical approach to living out faith," said Friesen, who served with MDS as a volunteer in Manitoba in 1997 and in Crisfield, Md., in 2015.
