### Withdrawing from IMC

Through a vote in June of this year, the Mennonite Church of Normal (MCN) made a decision to withdraw from the Illinois Mennonite Conference (IMC) and affiliate solely with Central District Conference (CDC). A formal letter has been sent to the leadership sharing MCN's discernment process and resulting request to be released (that letter can be viewed here). The Vision Team (VT) and the Pastoral Team (PT) are coordinating with IMC on a respectful and thoughtful transition process. MCN leadership will participate in a brief "exit interview" with some members of the conference leadership, providing an opportunity to share our reflections and thoughts about our history with IMC. MCN will also plan to invite a representative from the conference to be present with us during a worship service, where we can acknowledge and express gratitude for our shared history and exchange blessings as we move forward. Though specific dates have not been set yet, the intention is to complete this process by the end of December, if possible. We welcome feedback, questions, and reflections from the congregation as we walk through this process together.

### MCN 50th Factoids

Bite-sized pieces of our shared history leading up to our 50th anniversary celebration (September 27, 2026).

In the 1970's women began to follow their pastoral callings in the Mennonite church. Emma Richards in 1973 (MC) and Marilyn Miller in 1976 (GCMC) were the first ordained in the Mennonite denominations that became Mennonite Church USA. In 1979, Mennonite Church of Normal hired Margaret Richer to be the Director of Christian Education. Beyond Christian education, she was encouraged to follow her gifts in worship planning, preaching, and pastoral care. Her title was changed to Minister of Christian Education to honor her calling. She now goes by Mag Richer Smith, and she has retired after decades in pastoral ministry. She and her husband Bob are members of Berkey Avenue Mennonite Fellowship in Goshen, IN. 
## Fall Worship: Sacred Pathways

## What shall we do with our grief and outrage?

Here's the thing: While every human heart has the capacity for hatred and violence, no human heart can contain them. Hatred and violence are universal acids. They eat away every heart in which they are stored. So, what is a Jesus-follower to do? I think the answer comes to us from the Apostle Paul. In times like these, he encourages us: "Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good" (Romans 12:21). Only good can conquer evil. ### Mennonite Action: Picket and Pray

#### Wednesdays in October on Zoom from 11-11:30AM CT

This past Wednesday, as I remarked with surprise that it's already October, I found myself suddenly welling with tears. What began as a simple remark about the swiftly changing seasons hit my heart with an overwhelming intensity. "It's October 2025," I repeated to myself. October 2025. For two years, we have livestreamed a genocide of our beloved Palestinian siblings in Gaza. I write to you today with grief, rage, and determination. I pray that all of us in this movement continue to find ways to take action for the people of Gaza, which is why Mennonite Action is joining our friends at Christians for a Free Palestine and Kirkridge Retreat and Study Center for a weekly 30 minute Zoom call for shared spiritual practice. We will be rooted in the Christian tradition and action to end the genocide and for a Free Palestine. Join us for Picket and Pray: Weekly Spiritual Practice and Action for Palestine, Wednesdays on Zoom from 11-11:30AM CT. Click here to register. Our time together will include a short program of check-in, prayer, and a collective digital action. No matter where you live, your age, ability, experience with activism, or level of risk you can take, these calls are for you. We invite you to join us and invite your friends and loved ones. For the past several weeks, I have been so inspired by our comrade, Paul Reid, who has been part of the Global Sumud Flotilla, and whose safe return to the U.S. we are still awaiting. It's a reminder to me that there is a space for all of us in this movement, and we must remain steadfast in the action we are called to take. Most of us aren't on the flotilla, but there is a space in prayer and communal action for us. I hope you'll consider joining.

P.S: We are grateful for the ways we are constantly learning from many movements and communities. These weekly calls were inspired by action hours led by Jewish Voice for Peace, American Friends Service Committee, Sabeel, and others. We also draw the name from Kirkridge Retreat and Study Center's original tagline in 1942 "Picket and Pray" as this group of Christians hungered for a place to take political action and hold spiritual practices together in community.

### Ethiopians need more than passive piety

In a nation fractured by war, where women's bodies have become battlegrounds and bulldozers have destroyed houses in the name of "development," Ethiopia's Meserete Kristos Church faces a reckoning. As the world's largest Mennonite denomination, MKC has long cultivated a culture of devout discipleship — three-hour Sunday services, fervent weeknight prayers and an unwavering commitment to making disciples. However, in the face of state violence, sexual violence as a weapon of war and mass displacement, the church's silence echoes louder than its sermons. A July 28 press release from MKC offers a glimmer of hope. In it, the church boldly calls for peace between the government of Ethiopia and the Tigray People's Liberation Front, urging an end to inflammatory rhetoric, international accountability for the Pretoria Peace Accord (which ended the Tigray war in 2022) and responsible media engagement. This statement demonstrates MKC's potential to embody the prophetic voice Ethiopia desperately needs. But why is such public leadership the exception rather than the pattern? A few months ago, MKC published an article by ordained minister Kebede Bekere and MKC President Desalegne Abebe affirming that "meeting the physical needs of people is part of God's reconciliation work in the world." They rightly asserted that the church's humanitarian and development efforts are grounded in spiritual conviction. But I am calling the church to go further: to confront the systems that perpetuate poverty and oppression. Read the rest of Hasset Shimeles Hailu's article for the Anabaptist World here.

### 'Make the problem into the solution'

Gleaners' food-rescue program diverts surplus produce from farms to people in need. Mashed Potatoes, meat loaf and salad were on the menu at the Light on Main Street weekly community lunch in Hanover, Ont., the day Lydia Dyck and Suraiya Foss-Phillips attended in June. The two young farmers were there to meet neighbors and see first-hand where the eight pounds of potatoes they gleaned that week ended up. Dyck and Foss-Phillips run a food rescue program that diverts surplus produce from farms to people in need. Looking around her in the noisy dining hall, Dyck was pleased to see people from all walks of life enjoying the potatoes together. "Wow," she thought, "this is a real community-building event." Getting food to people who need it is at the heart of her and Foss-Phillips' mission. So is connecting people to build more resilient communities. ### CAME: Twenty-five years of solidarity at the border

Earlier this summer, CAME (Centro de Atención al Migrante Exodus), the migrant shelter in Agua Prieta, Sonora, Mexico, celebrated its 25th anniversary. Established in 2000 by the Sagrada Familia Catholic Church, CAME has undergone several changes to meet the needs of the migrants who come to Agua Prieta. Originally located at the church, it moved to a larger location in 2021. Initially, hosting Mexican men sent back from the US by Border Patrol, CAME later received families and single people from Mexico, Central and South America, Cuba, and Russia who were waiting to request asylum in the US. When it began, it provided food and shelter; it now offers emotional, psychological, educational, and social support as well. The anniversary event lasted for five days and celebrated the accomplishments of CAME, the support of Sagrada Familia, and the contributions of the many volunteers and other organizations that have worked at the centre over the years. Beginning with a mass at the church on Sunday and ending on Thursday with a banquet at the shelter and the unveiling of a new mural, the celebration also included panel discussions, testimonials, and the premiere of Exodus.
