Sunday, November 23





MC USA awards scholarships for BIPOC students

Mennonite Church USA has announced the recipients of the 2025-26 Scholarship for BIPOC Students. Nine students received scholarships from three partner schools. The Scholarship for BIPOC Students was created to support students who identify as Black, Indigenous, and/or People of Color, who are members or active participants of an MC USA congregation, and who are attending or plan to attend an MC USA-affiliated Mennonite college, university or seminary. **Learn more about the recipients and scholarship** here.

Charges dropped against CPT Canada Coordinator

Community Peacemaker Teams celebrates the fact that charges have been dropped against our Canada Coordinator, Rachelle Friesen. Last September, Friesen was arrested for participating in nonviolent direct action against the genocide in Gaza. Toronto Police Services detained Friesen at Pearson International Airport while she was en route to visit a friend in the US. Now, after a year under threat of criminal proceedings, the Crown has dropped all charges against her. While we welcome the news, we are clear: this is not proof that the criminal justice system works. The charges against Friesen occurred in a broader context in which 135 people have been arrested for their Palestine solidarity work since October 2023. Police tactics have included the over-arrest of large numbers of people, dragging them through lengthy criminal proceedings, only for charges to be ultimately dropped. Of 135 such arrests, the Crown has dropped charges against 64 people, while 10 were found or pled guilty but received discharges. To date, nobody has been convicted. Instead, the constant delays and postponements are an attempt to harass and inhibit protesters. **Read the rest of Community Peacemaker Teams' press release** here.

Granola Mennonite, dancing furiously

In a Zoom session, faces are stacked in a grid with the bottom row smaller but centered. For the first years of the pandemic, we stayed home and lived in Zoom. Jason and I took shifts working in our guest room office and supervising the twins' Zoom school. People I loved died. And Jason's father Harold had his first stroke. We spent our weekends packing his things and renovating a damaged house next door to us so that he could move in. A septic system replacement turned our side yard and field into a pile of rocks from our cobbly soil. The towers I built there were huge and heavy, and I was afraid they would smash the children's toes if they fell awry, so I stopped. Instead, we danced. Each morning, I opened my laptop, and the girls and I added our faces and bodies to a grid of dancers from around the world. My colleague Katie Mansfield, who started this community, specializes in embodied strategies for building resilience. Years in, we still dance with Katie almost every day. As Isaiah said: Defend the oppressed

Learn to do right; seek justice. Defend the oppressed. — Isaiah 1:17, NIV. When the topic of justice is discussed in religious circles, Micah 6:8 is a passage that is often raised. The three-part instruction: "Act justly, love mercy, walk humbly with God" is catchy and resonates strongly in our highly individualistic society. Lately, however, I've found myself preferring to emphasize a similar, three-part instruction from Isaiah, Micah's contemporary. In particular, the New International Version's translation, "Defend the oppressed," leads us to a deeper analysis of our present situation. I also find a strong resonance with Jesus' first sermon in Luke 4, where he quotes Isaiah and expresses exactly what he has come to do — and, by implication, what we are to do as the church. Good news to the poor, freedom for prisoners, recovery of sight to the blind. And just in case we didn't understand those previous instructions as they relate to oppression, he con-cludes with "to set the oppressed free." MC USA reaffirms mission following Mosaic's withdrawal decision

On Nov. 1, 2025, Mosaic Mennonite Conference delegates voted to "discontinue membership in Mennonite Church USA." MC USA Executive Director Glen Guyton said, "This transition clarifies each body's sense of call. Our work now is to continue strengthening our witness, supporting our congregations and living into the commitments that shape us. We release this relationship with care and integrity, and we carry forward our mission with clarity and hope." Guyton affirmed the denomination's ongoing commitments, saying: "Our identity as MC USA is rooted in following Jesus together. We continue to prioritize safe and supportive environments for congregations, equip leaders across a wide range of cultural and ministry contexts, and sustain the educational and formation ministries that serve the wider church. These commitments guide our life together and will continue to shape our future."
