MCN 50th Factoids



Bite-sized pieces of our shared history leading up to our 50th anniversary celebration (September 27, 2026).

This Sunday, we formally end our dual conference affiliation by leaving Illinois Mennonite Conference. At the time our congregation was formed, this spanned two denominations and was a visual witness to unity in the church. In 1987, when such an arrangement was popular, there were about 60 dual conference affiliated congregations. In 2002, when the denominations merged to form Mennonite Church USA, there were 51, with about half of those ending over the following five years, leaving 26 in 2007 (21 from Central District Conference). There are currently 8 dual conference affiliated congregations remaining within Central District Conference. Among those, at least one other beside us (First Mennonite Church (Champaign-Urbana) is in the process of ending dual conference affiliation. As this symbol fades, we look for new ways to embody unity among Mennonites and the wider Church.

MWC drops MC USA member from consideration for representative role

Mennonite World Conference has decided not to appoint a Mennonite Church USA conference minister to a representative role after three MWC member denominations raised concerns. The unease stems from an LGBTQ-affirming resolution that MC USA delegates passed in 2022 and the possibility that an MC USA person would "represent MC USA theological positions," according to a letter from MWC. Stanley Green, executive conference minister of Pacific Southwest Mennonite Conference, "was due to be appointed" as MWC's regional representative for North America, according to a Nov. 13 letter [see below] from MC USA moderator Marty Lehman on behalf of the denomination's Executive Board. However, "questions were raised as to whether he would — inadvertently or by request of his church — carry or represent MC USA views in his MWC relationships," wrote Janet Plenert, MWC regional representative coordinator, in an Oct. 2 letter to MC USA executive director Glen Guyton and leaders of other North American MWC members. Mennonite Church USA, through her members, congregations and area conferences, remain strong supporters of MWC to this day through participation, service and generous contributions. As MC USA strives to live into the work of repentance, healing and transformation with our LGBTQIA+ siblings, we are also committed to MWC's Shared Convictions of Global Anabaptists which includes No. 7, "As a world-wide community of faith and life we transcend boundaries of nationality, race, class, gender, and language." We believe, along with MWC, that our Shared Convictions are sufficient for member bodies to walk in harmony while also allowing room for diverse approaches to other matters. Can Mennonites write art?

Anthology traces evolution of Mennonite thinking about literature.

The editor of a new anthology of Mennonite literary criticism penned over 150 years hopes a carefully curated resource about the past may inform the future of the field. The 736-page book was launched at the Mennonite/s Writing Conference in Winnipeg, Man., in June, a conference that features writers who are Anabaptists by faith and others of Mennonite heritage who are not. The same is true for the authors featured in In Search of a Mennonite Imagination: Key Texts in Mennonite Literary Criticism (Canadian Mennonite University Press). Robert Zacharias, an associate professor at Toronto's York University, has collected 53 texts by 44 authors. "The hope," he writes in his introduction, "is that this collection will serve as a meaningful record of where the critical conversation has been, and a resource for those who will extend it into the future." A Note from Mennonite Action

We've been organizing together for the past two years: mobilized by a moment of escalated violence against Palestinians, anchored by our Anabaptist tradition that has long taught us to stand on the side of the oppressed. Many of you have joined Mennonite Action as a continuation of your own commitment to Palestine and to action, buoyed perhaps by memories of your own experiences in the region. For others, stepping into bold faithful public action has been a new experience. Maybe you remember the moment, in the past two years, when you first realized you'd be willing to get arrested alongside your community, or you first wrestled with the idea of civil disobedience. The myriad of experiences across this organization gives us our shape, each one of you bringing your own story, motivation, and courage. Together, we find our strength. Our Mass Calls started from a place of urgency, needing to quickly rally together to discern how to rise to the occasion of the moment God saw fit to place our lives within. Now, they serve as a regular container for our time together. We've carried on with the ritual each month, as a valuable way to share stories, align ourselves to one another, and plan our next move. This month's call marks the two year anniversary of Mennonite Action, and feels especially significant. We'd love for you to join us on November 20th, 7 pm CST for our Anniversary Call. As much as we wish this work was no longer necessary, we're grateful that we have a community willing to respond to the need, for as long as it exists. Until Palestine is free, and the liberation of all God's children is realized.

Thriving in the Midst of War

Approximately a month after Russia invaded Ukraine in February 2022, Anabaptist World published the story "MCC workers evacuate Ukraine; churches respond to risk of war." The article referenced Prometheus, a special needs school in Zaporizhzhia serving 167 students. It was started 17 years ago by parents with the help of Mennonite Central Committee (MCC). The cover of that March 4, 2022, issue featured Dasha Bardus, an 11-year-old student, walking with arm crutches. Many students with special needs cannot attend public school in Ukraine, although the government provides the school building and some teachers. Harm handed down for generations

At a national event I attended this summer hosted by a mainline denomination, Indigenous young men shared around a fire at a reflective circle event. This provided the opportunity to share about their lives — and for others to listen and learn. Each shared about trauma they experienced as children and young men and the anger and despair that followed. I also could see how people might misinterpret what was shared. In the dominant narrative, "generational trauma" means something bad happened to a grandparent (like boarding school/residential school), and this negative experience impacted the grandparent's behavior as they raised their own children. This experience impacts not only how they parent but also how their children go on to parent. In this way of seeing things, experience and action are described at the individual level only. Trauma "trickles down." But this way of describing things does not acknowledge systemic harm — the harm caused by laws and policies that continue to oppress Indigenous people.
