



Preacher this Sunday

Matt Burgess is the Chief Executive Officer at Home Sweet Home Ministries. He first joined HSHM in August 2009 with his bachelor's degree in Psychology, master's in Community Mental Health Counseling, and his license in Clinical Professional Counseling. Over the past 11 years with HSHM, Burgess has demonstrated his passion to help others by updating Home Sweet Home's service models to reinforce the dignity and worth of everyone the ministry serves. A prime example of this transformation is the conversion of HSHM's food pantry into the Bread For Life Food Co-op. He has also led the way in helping HSHM become a "trauma-informed" organization, providing the framework for a more sensitive approach to caring for individuals and families experiencing homelessness.

Matt Burgess will be joining us this Sunday from Home Sweet Home Ministries (HSHM), sharing about the "The Bridge"—their new shelter village which offers 48 sleeping cabins that will house up to 56 adults for periods of 3-6 months as a transition to permanent housing. There will be on-site resources for addressing substance abuse, mental health, primary medical care, housing assistance services, and employment support. You can learn more here. We hope that we can help fund one of the sleeping cabins (\$13,500) to show our love for the unhoused in our community. URGENT: Tell the Senate "No war with Venezuela"

Background: Since early September, the U.S. has conducted at least 14 air strikes on small vessels off the coast of Venezuela killing a total of 61 people. U.S. officials allege the boats were transporting large amounts of drugs, however they have yet to provide evidence for those claims. Latin American leaders have accused the U.S. of murdering innocent civilians. Such extrajudicial killings without due process are illegal under domestic and international law. The U.S. has reportedly moved a substantial number of warships, planes, and personnel into the Caribbean Sea and officials have confirmed the CIA is present in Venezuela, raising concerns that the goal is to oust Venezuelan president Nicolas Maduro. The history of U.S. intervention in the hemisphere demonstrates that such a regime change will likely lead to more conflict and chaos. While MCC does not have partners in Venezuela, there are Anabaptist churches—and the prospect of military violence anywhere in the world weighs heavily on our hearts. MCC partners in Colombia and throughout Latin America could also see an increase in migrants fleeing Venezuela if the situation continues to deteriorate. Violence is never a path to stability or long-term peace. A Senate resolution to reassert congressional authority over these strikes was narrowly rejected 48-51 in October. A new resolution to restrain the strikes (S.J. Res. 90) will be voted on this week.

Mosaic Conference leaves MC USA, seeks partnership

Recommendation to end denominational membership gets 74% support.

Mosaic Mennonite Conference delegates on Nov. 1 voted nearly 3-to-1 to leave Mennonite Church USA and to be a partner with it and other Anabaptists. "This was a both/and vote: to discontinue membership and to build healthy, mutual partnerships," said executive minister Stephen Kriss after the vote during Mosaic's annual assembly at Souderton Mennonite Church in Pennsylvania. "The work for us will be to stay at the table, to maintain and extend those relationships further." Of the 165 delegates, 64% voted "green" (affirm the recommendation), and 10% voted "yellow" (yield to it). Both categories counted as yes votes, for a total of 74%, exceeding the two-thirds required for a bylaw change. Twenty-three percent voted "red" (no) and 3% abstained (counted as no). Dream a Better Dream

I have been blessed with ADHD and as such my mind is a rabbit warren of thought trails. Normally, I run these tunnels by myself, but together we may glimpse the Spirit's movement. Starting at one of my favorite trailheads, we have the 2005 cinematic masterpiece, The Adventures of Shark Boy and Lava Girl in 3D, one of the best bad movies ever made. The Bible has many examples of people in crisis that could guide us towards our destination, but this tunnel leads us to the prophet Joel. Squeezed in between two of my favorite dens, Joel is easy to miss. One of the obscure prophets from the book of the Twelve, this small, three-chapter prophet packs a lot of crises into a small space. In his prophecy, Joel represents the crisis of exile and ethnic erasure as a crisis of environmental devastation. Joel's environmental crisis is all encompassing, touching not only every element of human life, but of creation domesticated and wild. This crisis in Joel is not just overwhelming, it is traumatic. I don't know about you, but I often feel overwhelmed by our world today. It's so easy to look around and see crisis at every corner, racial and economic crisis, heteropatriarchy and political crisis, climate change and extinction. Worship for Everybody

What if our Church gatherings were designed with everybody in mind – from toddlers to elders, from disabled folks to neurodivergent thinkers?

When we read Acts 2, how is worship portrayed? Is it in the apostles' teaching? Is it in the sharing of resources and caring for one another? Is it in the daily gathering and sharing of meals together? Yes, to all the above. When we read Acts 2, we see a picture of worship that is both embodied and communal in nature. Since the Reformation and the rise of literacy, Sunday mornings have become increasingly intellectualized. Sitting for a 20-minute sermon has become the main event and activity of Sunday morning worship. Teaching in this way can be vital to our faith formation, but it is not the only way that we can be formed as the Church. This model has unfortunately left out children, people with intellectual disability, and others who can't engage through sitting and listening quietly. We pray for justice on Toronto's streets

October has been a heavy month for the Turtle Island Solidarity Network. We watched from afar as our collaborator Mskwaasin Agnew, an Indigenous (Cree and Dene) harm reduction worker living in Toronto, sailed toward Gaza on the Conscience with the Freedom Flotilla. On 7 October, the Israeli military intercepted the vessel in international waters and detained everyone aboard, in violation of international law. Then, on 16 October, TISN members observed as municipal workers evicted unhoused people camped in the churchyard at the Church of St. Stephen-in-the-Fields, where CPT's Canada Office is located. For the past five years, the City of Toronto has repeatedly removed unhoused people and their belongings from the site, over the objections of the church. **Read the Community Peacemaker Teams' blog post here.**
