Ethiopians cancel hosting 2028 world assembly, MWC leader says

Amid 'rumors and falsehoods,' MKC also ends its partnership with AMBS.

Ethiopian Anabaptist leaders have decided not to host the 2028 Mennonite World Conference assembly after conflict blew up on social media over links to North American churches that accept same-sex marriage, said César Garcia, Mennonite World Conference general secretary, on Nov. 26. "Due to the internal conflict, the church of Ethiopia doesn't consider it a blessing to host the assembly in 2028," Garcia told AW in an interview. "We are sad for that, but we understand the conflict the church is experiencing now, and we want to be a blessing for the church. In a Nov. 23 statement, the executive committee of the Meserete Kristos Church — the Ethiopian Anabaptist church, with more than 514,000 baptized members, the world's largest Mennonite conference — said that "associating with a conference that includes churches supporting homosexuality contradicts the core beliefs of our church."

The MKC has also ended its joint master's degree program with Anabaptist Mennonite Biblical Seminary. MKC leaders announced this decision in their Nov. 23 release, and AMBS confirmed it in a Nov. 24 statement. "In the last two months, a wave of misinformation has spread through social media in Ethiopia, targeting the partnership between MKC/S [MK Seminary] and AMBS and creating a volatile and challenging environment for students and church leaders," said David Boshart, AMBS president, in the statement. ". . . With deep lament, [MKC leaders] informed us that MKC has permanently suspended the program — not due to any loss of goodwill between MKC and AMBS, but because the spread of misinformation has created risks for their leaders and students and threatened the unity of the church." Faith history in many forms

German scholar comfortable with Anabaptism's contradictions and tensions.

Covering five centuries of Anabaptist history in one book is no small feat. In Anabaptism's 500th anniversary year, Astrid von Schlachta, a German historian, has stepped up to the challenge. An English translation of *Anabaptists: From the Reformation to the 21st Century* was published in late 2024 by Pandora Press. Publisher Maxwell Kennel edited Victor Thiessen's translation, which is Volume 10 in Pandora's Anabaptist and Mennonite Studies series. Kennel said von Schlachta's European approach to the span of Anabaptism's expressions and movements complements and contrasts with Troy Osborne's *North American Radicals and Reformers: A Survey of Global Anabaptist History*, published last year by Herald Press. "Troy's book is roughly chronological, while Astrid's is thematic, and both attempt to cover all 500 years up to the present," Kennel said. "*Anabaptists* has an interesting chapter at the end on Mennonites and the arts, which you don't see covered so much by historians." **Read the rest of Tim Huber's article published by the** *Anabaptist World* **here.**

Malawi just one of the destinations reached by MCC meat-canning efforts

Mennonite Central Committee meat canners started the 2025-26 canning season in October with strong motivation. Three of the four-member crew have met people in Malawi — prisoners and refugees — who needed the canned meat MCC's partners distributed. The fourth member of this year's crew is new. Every year, a group of three to four young men accompany MCC's mobile cannery to about 27 locations in 10 states. In each place, they work with hundreds of local volunteers to preserve chicken, turkey or pork in cans and pack them for shipping. MCC had 519,316 cans of meat to send to those in need throughout the world by the end of last canning season in April. The program is a public-private partnership that churches helped form in 1980. MDS involvement at former residential school "gives hope" for the future

The former Mohawk Institute Residential School in Brantford, Ont., where youth from across Canada served in 2019 as part of a Mennonite Disaster Service (MDS) summer youth project, officially opened on Sept. 30, 2025. What are today's politics of peace?

Nobel Prize winner aligned with harmful policies.

The Nobel Peace Prize was awarded this month to Venezuelan politician María Corina Machado for her "tireless work promoting democratic rights for the people of Venezuela and for her struggle to achieve a just and peaceful transition from dictatorship to democracy," according to the awarding committee. While this might sound like proper recognition of a leader seeking justice and peace, deeper questions arise from this decision. What are the politics of peace in today's world? International politics are moving along two distinct currents. On one side, there is a global agenda of privatization, military intervention, natural resource extraction, mass deportations, denial of climate change and the widening of socioeconomic inequality — all sustaining the expansion of capitalist economies. On the other is an opposing vision: prioritizing public investment and social welfare, pursuing demilitarization, conflict prevention, protecting human rights of immigrants and vulnerable communities, developing green energy, promoting dialogue and solidarity between nations and reducing the gap between rich and poor. **Read the rest of Juan Moya's article published by the Anabaptist World** here.

MC USA launches "Reimagining" initiative with discussion guide and churchwide survey

Mennonite Church USA launched a "Reimagining MC USA" web portal Nov. 4 with an invitation for constituents to engage in dialog about the future of the church and give input via a churchwide survey. The portal includes information about the Reimagining initiative, including the charter for a Structure Review Task Force, and the project's two-year timeline leading to a structure proposal at the next Delegate Assembly in July 2027.
