




Winter Retreat



Our 2026 Annual Theme: Connections

During worship on December 29, the Vision Team shared an exciting look ahead to 2026 and introduced our congregational theme for the coming year: **Connections**. For those who were unable to be present, we wanted to offer a brief recap and invitation.

Over the past several months, the Vision Team has been reflecting on MCN's Vision and Welcome Statements and listening for ways to help our congregation live more fully into them. One of the insights that emerged was this: while our Vision is strong and meaningful, it can be difficult to keep it at the forefront of our shared life – especially across commissions, ministries, and seasons of change.

Rather than revising goals or creating new expectations, the Vision Team chose a simpler, more relational approach: a unifying annual theme that can guide our worship, planning, and life together in a natural and flexible way.

For 2026, that theme is **Connections**. The guiding phrase for the year will be: **"Deepening Connections with God, with Others, with Our Past, and with Our Future."**

This theme reflects who we already are as a nurturing, Christ-centered Anabaptist congregation – and who we hope to become. It draws inspiration from *1 John 4:12*, which reminds us that while no one has seen God, God's love becomes visible when we love one another. In other words, connection is not just something we value; it is one of the primary ways God's presence is made known among us.

Throughout 2026, you'll see this theme woven into many areas of church life: worship series and storytelling, opportunities for fellowship and spiritual growth, outreach and community partnerships, and reflections on our Anabaptist roots and congregational history. Our five commissions have already begun exploring how the theme can support and enrich the work they are already doing.

A simple visual symbol has also been created for the theme – a circle with a Celtic-style cross – representing the four directions of connection: God, Others, Our Past, and Our Future. You'll begin seeing this image appear in worship materials, the Midweek, and church visuals in the months ahead.

Our hope is that **Connections** becomes a shared language for MCN in 2026 – one that strengthens our sense of belonging, invites deeper relationships, and helps us recognize how God is already at work among us.

We look forward to walking this journey together.

JUST PEACE PILGRIMAGE


Sept. 8-22, 2026

Learning under threat: Semester school report February - June, 2025

The deal between Hamas and the Israeli state reminds us of the distance between relief and justice. Since its establishment in Al-Khalil/Hebron in 1995, [CPT Palestine](#) has remained committed to accompanying children, teachers, local residents, and school principals on the daily school run. Over nearly three decades, we have witnessed the gradual transformation of checkpoints, which began as a few large stones blocking a narrow passage and slowly expanded into permanent structures with layers of restrictions. In the past, CPT members were able to wear vests and clearly identify themselves as human rights observers. Over time, however, the situation changed step by step until we were no longer allowed to wear the vests at the checkpoints, and could only identify ourselves as local people trying to cross the checkpoints. Beyond paternalism: Misinformation, maturity and the self-theologizing trajectory of the Meserete Kristos Church

In the past few weeks, many people across the global Anabaptist family have followed the news that the [Meserete Kristos Church \(MKC\)](#) will no longer host the 2028 global assembly of [Mennonite World Conference \(MWC\)](#), and the [Meserete Kristos Seminary \(MKS\)](#) has ended its formal partnership with [Anabaptist Mennonite Biblical Seminary \(AMBS\)](#). The decision has stirred deep emotions, sparked debate and raised questions about partnership, doctrine, and the nature of unity in the global church. A [recent article](#) by Dr. Girma Bekele has circulated widely, offering a sharply critical interpretation not only of *the limited educational partnership* MK-Seminary had with AMBS but also of any formal and informal relationships MKC has had for years with MWC and [Mennonite Church Canada](#) (MC Canada). While Dr. Bekele raises important issues, his portrayal leaves out key facts and misses something essential about how MKC has navigated global relationships for decades: *MKC is not a fragile institution. It is a mature, self-governing church body that has exercised its agency wisely and consistently.* In this essay, I would like to acknowledge my biases: I am employed by AMBS and have worked closely with seasoned Ethiopian MKC leaders who joined and studied in the MATGA Ethiopia cohort program. As someone shaped by MKC, trained in both Ethiopian and North American seminaries, and working closely with Ethiopian students at AMBS, I want to offer a perspective grounded in lived experience rather than distant interpretation. **Read the rest of Henok T. Saying Yes to Transformation

2 Corinthians 5:17 – "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here!" To me, saying "yes" to God means saying "yes" to transformation. There isn't just a single time where I said "yes" to God and I was suddenly transformed. I say "yes" every day when I smile at someone on the street, choose to help out my neighbor, or take action for an important cause. Transformation through faith is a journey that never ends. In my own community in Washington DC, many people struggle to get by financially and the presence of ICE agents threaten the safety of my neighbors. There are many people who don't have a safe place to sleep at night, putting them at even higher risk. Every day there are more videos on social media of people being detained or brutalized by officers. There is intense pressure on marginalized groups to hide. Our forebears had forebears

Family albums tell who we are today and reveal a 1,500-year martyr genealogy. Pictures in a family album define our place in a larger story. Yet we might ask: Is the remote past relevant? How far does the story extend? Do our distant relatives matter? All of these questions apply to families of faith as well. In Anabaptism's 500th anniversary year, two new albums remind us how deep our family tree's roots have grown and how far its branches extend. The first is *Faith in Full Color: A Tapestry of Anabaptist Stories* (Herald Press) by Jeanne Zimmerly Jantzi. This striking hardcover belongs in places where people will notice it. Seventy-seven richly illustrated stories present a wide-ranging portrait of Anabaptism at the five-century mark. The second album, *Lessons from the Mirror* (Masthof Press), makes the artwork of Anabaptism's most iconic book accessible by separating it from the 1,141 pages of text in *Martyrs Mirror*. This 250-page softcover reproduces all 104 scenes that Dutch artist Jan Luyken etched on copper plates for the 1685 edition, plus 11 not included in that historic volume. 
